1 AN ACT concerning the open records act; relating to public records;
2 continuing in existence certain exceptions to the disclosure thereof;
3 amending K.S.A. 9-512, 40-4308, 40-4350, 45-229, 65-177, 65-28b08,
4 74-5611a, 75-7240 and 75-7242 and repealing the existing sections.

6 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:*

7 Section 1. K.S.A. 9-512 is hereby amended to read as follows: 9-512.

8 (a) The commissioner, after notice and an opportunity for hearing, may
9 issue an order to address any violation of this act or rules and regulations
10 adopted pursuant thereto:

11 (1) Assessing a fine against any person who violates this act, or rules
12 and regulations adopted *pursuant* thereto, in an amount not to exceed
13 \$5,000 per violation;

14 (2) assessing the agency's operating costs and expenses for
15 investigating and enforcing this act;

16 (3) requiring the person to pay restitution for any loss arising from
17 the violation or requiring the person to disgorge any profits arising from
18 the violation;

19 (4) barring the person from future application for licensure pursuant
20 to the act; and

21 (5) requiring such affirmative action as in the judgment of the
22 commissioner ~~which~~ *that* will carry out the purposes of this act.

23 (b) The commissioner may enter into a consent order at any time with
24 a person to resolve a matter arising under this act, rules and regulations
25 adopted *pursuant* thereto; or an order issued pursuant to this act.

26 (c) The commissioner may enter into an informal agreement at any
27 time with a person to resolve a matter arising under this act, rules and
28 regulations adopted pursuant thereto; or an order issued pursuant to this
29 act. The adoption of an informal agreement authorized by this subsection
30 shall not be subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 77-501 et seq., and
31 amendments thereto, or K.S.A. 77-601 et seq., and amendments thereto.
32 Any informal agreement authorized by this subsection shall not be
33 considered an order or other agency action; and shall be considered
34 confidential examination material pursuant to K.S.A. 9-513c, and
35 amendments thereto. All such examination material shall also be
36 confidential by law and privileged, shall not be subject to the open records

1 act, K.S.A. 45-215 et seq., and amendments thereto, shall not be subject to
2 subpoena and shall not be subject to discovery or admissible in evidence in
3 any private civil action. ~~The provisions of this subsection shall expire on~~
4 ~~July 1, 2023, unless the legislature reviews and reenacts this provision~~
5 ~~pursuant to K.S.A. 45-229, and amendments thereto, prior to July 1, 2023.~~

6 (d) Any person who knowingly violates any provision of this act shall
7 be guilty of a severity level 9, nonperson felony. Each transaction in
8 violation of this act and each day that a violation continues shall be a
9 separate offense. Whenever a corporation violates any provision of this
10 act, such violation shall be attributed to individual directors, officers and
11 agents who have authorized, ordered or performed any of the acts
12 constituting such violation.

13 (e) A corporation and its directors, officers and agents may each be
14 prosecuted separately for violations of this act, and the acquittal or
15 conviction of one such director, officer or agent shall not abate the
16 prosecution of the others.

17 (f) Whenever it appears that a person has violated, or is likely to
18 violate, this act, rules and regulations adopted thereunder, or an order
19 issued pursuant to this act, then the commissioner may bring an action for
20 injunctive relief to enjoin the violation or enforce compliance, regardless
21 of whether or not criminal proceedings have been instituted. Any person
22 who engages in activities that are regulated and require a license under this
23 act shall be considered to have consented to the jurisdiction of the courts
24 of this state for all actions arising under this act.

25 Sec. 2. K.S.A. 40-4308 is hereby amended to read as follows: 40-
26 4308. (a) Whenever the commissioner deems ~~it~~ necessary, but at least once
27 every three years, the commissioner may make, or direct to be made, a
28 financial examination of any captive insurance company in the process of
29 organization, or applying for admission or doing business in Kansas. The
30 commissioner may engage in continuous analysis for the preparation of the
31 examination. In addition, at the commissioner's discretion, the
32 commissioner may make, or direct to be made, a market regulation
33 examination of any insurance company doing business in Kansas.

34 (b) In scheduling and determining the nature, scope and frequency of
35 examinations of financial condition, the commissioner shall consider such
36 matters as the results of financial statement analyses and ratios, changes in
37 management or ownership, actuarial opinions, reports of independent
38 certified public accountants and other criteria as set forth in the examiner's
39 handbook adopted by the national association of insurance commissioners
40 in effect when the commissioner exercises discretion under this subsection.

41 (c) The commissioner shall have free access to the books and papers
42 of any such company that relate to its business and to the books and papers
43 kept by any of its agents and may examine under oath, which the

1 commissioner shall be empowered to administer, the directors, officers,
2 agents or employees of any such company in relation to its affairs,
3 transactions and condition.

4 (d) For the purpose of such analysis, the commissioner may require
5 reports and other documents be filed with the commissioner.

6 (e) The commissioner may also examine or investigate any person, or
7 the business of any person, insofar as such examination or investigation is,
8 in the sole discretion of the commissioner, necessary or material to the
9 examination of the company, but such examination or investigation shall
10 not infringe upon or extend to any communications or information
11 accorded privileged or confidential status under any other laws of this
12 state.

13 (f) Upon determining that an examination should be conducted, the
14 commissioner or the commissioner's designee shall appoint one or more
15 examiners to perform the examination and instruct ~~them~~ *such examiners* as
16 to the scope of the examination. The commissioner may also employ such
17 other guidelines or procedures as the commissioner may deem appropriate.

18 (g) When making an examination under this act, the commissioner
19 may retain attorneys, appraisers, independent actuaries, independent
20 certified public accountants or other professionals and specialists as
21 examiners, the reasonable cost of which shall be ~~borne~~ *paid* by the
22 company that is the subject of the examination.

23 (h) (1) ~~No~~ *Not* later than 30 days following completion of the
24 examination or at such earlier time as the commissioner shall prescribe,
25 the examiner in charge shall file with the department a verified written
26 report of examination under oath. ~~No~~ *Not* later than 30 days following
27 receipt of the verified report, the department shall transmit the report to the
28 company examined, together with a notice that shall afford such company
29 examined a reasonable opportunity of not more than 30 days to make a
30 written submission or rebuttal with respect to any matters contained in the
31 examination report.

32 (2) Within 30 days of the end of the period allowed for the receipt of
33 written submissions or rebuttals, the commissioner shall fully consider and
34 review the report, together with any written submissions or rebuttals and
35 any relevant portions of the examiners' workpapers, and enter an order:

36 (A) Adopting the examination report as filed or with modification or
37 corrections. If the examination report reveals that the company is operating
38 in violation of any law, rule and regulation or prior order of the
39 commissioner, the commissioner may order the company to take any
40 action the commissioner considers necessary and appropriate to cure such
41 violations;

42 (B) rejecting the examination report with directions to the examiners
43 to reopen the examination for purposes of obtaining additional data,

1 documentation or information; or

2 (C) call for and conduct a fact-finding hearing in accordance with
3 K.S.A. 40-281, and amendments thereto, for purposes of obtaining
4 additional documentation, data, information and testimony.

5 (3) All orders entered as a result of revelations contained in the final
6 examination report shall be accompanied by findings and conclusions
7 resulting from the commissioner's consideration and review of the
8 examination report, relevant examiner work papers and any written
9 submissions or rebuttals. Within 30 days of the issuance of the adopted
10 report, the company shall file affidavits executed by each of its directors
11 stating under oath that they have received a copy of the adopted report and
12 related orders.

13 (4) Upon the adoption of the examination report of an association
14 captive insurance company, the commissioner shall hold the content of the
15 examination report as private and confidential as to the pure captive
16 insurance company. Nothing contained in this act shall be construed to
17 limit the commissioner's authority to use and, if appropriate, to make
18 public any final or preliminary examination report in the furtherance of
19 any legal or regulatory action that the commissioner may, in the
20 commissioner's discretion, deem appropriate.

21 (i) Nothing contained in this act shall be construed to limit the
22 commissioner's authority to terminate or suspend any examination in order
23 to pursue other legal or regulatory action pursuant to the insurance laws of
24 this state.

25 (j) All examination reports, preliminary examination reports or
26 results, working papers, recorded information, documents and copies
27 thereof produced by, obtained by, or disclosed to the commissioner or any
28 other person in the course of an examination made under this section are
29 confidential and are not subject to subpoena and may not be made public
30 by the commissioner or an employee or agent of the commissioner without
31 the written consent of the company, except to the extent provided in this
32 subsection. Nothing in this subsection shall prevent the commissioner
33 from using such information in furtherance of the commissioner's
34 regulatory authority under this act. The commissioner may grant access to
35 such information to public officers having jurisdiction over the regulation
36 of insurance in any other state or country; or to law enforcement officers of
37 Kansas or any other state or agency of the federal government at any time.
38 Access may also be granted to the national association of insurance
39 commissioners and its affiliates; and the international association of
40 insurance supervisors and its affiliates. Persons receiving such information
41 must agree in writing prior to receiving the information to provide to it the
42 same confidential treatment as required by this section, unless the prior
43 written consent of the company to which it pertains has been obtained.

1 (k) The commissioner may receive documents, materials or
2 information, including otherwise confidential and privileged documents,
3 materials or information, from the national association of insurance
4 commissioners, and its affiliates and subsidiaries, and from regulatory and
5 law enforcement officials of other foreign or domestic jurisdictions; and
6 shall maintain as confidential or privileged any document, material or
7 information received with notice or the understanding that it is confidential
8 or privileged under the laws of the jurisdiction that is the source of the
9 document, material or information. Documents received pursuant to this
10 section shall not be subject to disclosure pursuant to the open records act,
11 K.S.A. 45-215 et seq., and amendments thereto. ~~The provisions of this~~
12 ~~subsection shall expire on July 1, 2023, unless the legislature reviews and~~
13 ~~reenacts this provision pursuant to K.S.A. 45-229, and amendments~~
14 ~~thereto, prior to July 1, 2023.~~

15 Sec. 3. K.S.A. 40-4350 is hereby amended to read as follows: 40-
16 4350. (a) Documents, materials or other information obtained by or
17 disclosed to the commissioner pursuant to K.S.A. 40-4332 through 40-
18 4352, and amendments thereto, shall:

19 (1) Be confidential and privileged, except as provided in K.S.A. 40-
20 4347, and amendments thereto; and

21 (2) not be subject to disclosure under the Kansas open records act,
22 K.S.A. 45-215 et seq., and amendments thereto. ~~The provisions of this~~
23 ~~subsection shall expire on July 1, 2023, unless the legislature reviews and~~
24 ~~reenacts this provision pursuant to K.S.A. 45-229, and amendments~~
25 ~~thereto, prior to July 1, 2023.~~

26 (b) The commissioner shall not otherwise make the documents,
27 materials or other information public without the prior written consent of
28 the insurer to which it pertains unless the commissioner, after giving the
29 insurer and its affiliates that would be affected thereby notice and
30 opportunity to be heard in accordance with the provisions of the Kansas
31 administrative procedure act, determines that the interests of
32 policyholders, shareholders or the public would be served by the
33 publication thereof, in which event, the commissioner may publish all or
34 any part thereof in such a manner as the commissioner may deem
35 appropriate. In making such determination, the commissioner of insurance
36 also shall take into consideration any potential adverse consequences of
37 the disclosure thereof.

38 (c) Neither the commissioner of insurance nor any person who
39 received documents, materials or other information while acting under the
40 authority of the commissioner of insurance or with whom such documents,
41 materials or other information are shared pursuant to this section shall be
42 permitted or required to testify in any private civil action concerning any
43 confidential documents, materials or information subject to subsection (a).

1 (d) In order to assist in the performance of the commissioner's duties,
2 the commissioner of insurance may:

3 (1) Share documents, materials or other information, including the
4 confidential and privileged documents, materials or information subject to
5 subsection (a), with federal and international regulatory agencies; and the
6 NAIC and its affiliates, ~~provided that~~ *if* the recipient agrees in writing to
7 maintain the confidentiality and privileged status of the document,
8 material or other information; and has verified in writing the legal
9 authority to maintain confidentiality;

10 (2) receive documents, materials or information, including otherwise
11 confidential and privileged documents, materials or information from the
12 national association of insurance commissioners, and its affiliates and
13 subsidiaries, and from regulatory and law enforcement officials of other
14 foreign or domestic jurisdictions; and shall maintain as confidential or
15 privileged any document, material or information received with notice or
16 the understanding that it is confidential or privileged under the laws of the
17 jurisdiction that is the source of the document, material or information.
18 Documents received pursuant to this section shall not be subject to
19 disclosure pursuant to the open records act, K.S.A. 45-215 et seq., and
20 amendments thereto. ~~The provisions of this paragraph shall expire on July~~
21 ~~1, 2023, unless the legislature reviews and reenacts this provision pursuant~~
22 ~~to K.S.A. 45-229, and amendments thereto, prior to July 1, 2023; and~~

23 (3) Sharing agreements provided for in subsection (d) shall:

24 (A) Specify procedures and protocols regarding the confidentiality
25 and security of information shared with the national association of
26 insurance commissioners and its affiliates and subsidiaries pursuant to this
27 act, including procedures and protocols for sharing by the national
28 association of insurance commissioners with other state, federal or
29 international regulators;

30 (B) specify that ownership of information shared with the NAIC and
31 its affiliates and subsidiaries pursuant to this act remains with the
32 commissioner, and the NAIC's use of the information is subject to the
33 direction of the commissioner;

34 (C) require prompt notice to be given to an insurer and its affiliates
35 whose confidential information in the possession of the NAIC; pursuant to
36 this act; *that such information* is subject to a request or subpoena to the
37 NAIC for disclosure or production; and

38 (D) require the NAIC and its affiliates and subsidiaries to consent to
39 intervention by an insurer in any judicial or administrative action in which
40 the NAIC and its affiliates and subsidiaries may be required to disclose
41 confidential information about the insurer and its affiliates shared with the
42 NAIC and its affiliates and subsidiaries pursuant to this act. Documents,
43 materials or other information in the possession or control of the national

1 association of insurance commissioners shall be confidential by law and
2 privileged, shall not be subject to the open records act, K.S.A. 45-215 et
3 seq., and amendments thereto, shall not be subject to subpoena, and shall
4 not be subject to discovery or admissible in evidence in any private civil
5 action. ~~The provisions of this paragraph shall expire on July 1, 2023,~~
6 ~~unless the legislature reviews and reenacts this provision pursuant to~~
7 ~~K.S.A. 45-229, and amendments thereto, prior to July 1, 2023.~~

8 (e) The sharing of information by the commissioner of insurance,
9 pursuant to this act, shall not constitute a delegation of regulatory authority
10 or rulemaking authority, and the commissioner of insurance is solely
11 responsible for the administration, execution and enforcement of the
12 provisions of this act.

13 (f) No waiver of any applicable privilege or claim of confidentiality
14 in the documents, materials or information shall occur as a result of
15 disclosure to the commissioner of insurance under this act or as a result of
16 sharing as authorized in subsection (d).

17 Sec. 4. K.S.A. 45-229 is hereby amended to read as follows: 45-229.

18 (a) It is the intent of the legislature that exceptions to disclosure under the
19 open records act shall be created or maintained only if:

20 (1) The public record is of a sensitive or personal nature concerning
21 individuals;

22 (2) the public record is necessary for the effective and efficient
23 administration of a governmental program; or

24 (3) the public record affects confidential information.

25 The maintenance or creation of an exception to disclosure must be
26 compelled as measured by these criteria. Further, the legislature finds that
27 the public has a right to have access to public records unless the criteria in
28 this section for restricting such access to a public record are met and the
29 criteria are considered during legislative review in connection with the
30 particular exception to disclosure to be significant enough to override the
31 strong public policy of open government. To strengthen the policy of open
32 government, the legislature shall consider the criteria in this section before
33 enacting an exception to disclosure.

34 (b) Subject to the provisions of subsections (g) and (h), any new
35 exception to disclosure or substantial amendment of an existing exception
36 shall expire on July 1 of the fifth year after enactment of the new
37 exception or substantial amendment, unless the legislature acts to continue
38 the exception. A law that enacts a new exception or substantially amends
39 an existing exception shall state that the exception expires at the end of
40 five years and that the exception shall be reviewed by the legislature
41 before the scheduled date.

42 (c) For purposes of this section, an exception is substantially
43 amended if the amendment expands the scope of the exception to include

1 more records or information. An exception is not substantially amended if
2 the amendment narrows the scope of the exception.

3 (d) This section is not intended to repeal an exception that has been
4 amended following legislative review before the scheduled repeal of the
5 exception if the exception is not substantially amended as a result of the
6 review.

7 (e) In the year before the expiration of an exception, the revisor of
8 statutes shall certify to the president of the senate and the speaker of the
9 house of representatives, by July 15, the language and statutory citation of
10 each exception that will expire in the following year that meets the criteria
11 of an exception as defined in this section. Any exception that is not
12 identified and certified to the president of the senate and the speaker of the
13 house of representatives is not subject to legislative review and shall not
14 expire. If the revisor of statutes fails to certify an exception that the revisor
15 subsequently determines should have been certified, the revisor shall
16 include the exception in the following year's certification after that
17 determination.

18 (f) "Exception" means any provision of law that creates an exception
19 to disclosure or limits disclosure under the open records act pursuant to
20 K.S.A. 45-221, and amendments thereto, or pursuant to any other
21 provision of law.

22 (g) A provision of law that creates or amends an exception to
23 disclosure under the open records law shall not be subject to review and
24 expiration under this act if such provision:

- 25 (1) Is required by federal law;
26 (2) applies solely to the legislature or to the state court system;
27 (3) has been reviewed and continued in existence twice by the
28 legislature; or
29 (4) has been reviewed and continued in existence by the legislature
30 during the 2013 legislative session and thereafter.

31 (h) (1) The legislature shall review the exception before its scheduled
32 expiration and consider as part of the review process the following:

- 33 (A) What specific records are affected by the exception;
34 (B) whom does the exception uniquely affect, as opposed to the
35 general public;
36 (C) what is the identifiable public purpose or goal of the exception;
37 (D) whether the information contained in the records may be obtained
38 readily by alternative means and how it may be obtained;
39 (2) an exception may be created or maintained only if it serves an
40 identifiable public purpose and may be no broader than is necessary to
41 meet the public purpose it serves. An identifiable public purpose is served
42 if the legislature finds that the purpose is sufficiently compelling to
43 override the strong public policy of open government and cannot be

1 accomplished without the exception and if the exception:

2 (A) Allows the effective and efficient administration of a
3 governmental program that would be significantly impaired without the
4 exception;

5 (B) protects information of a sensitive personal nature concerning
6 individuals, the release of such information would be defamatory to such
7 individuals or cause unwarranted damage to the good name or reputation
8 of such individuals or would jeopardize the safety of such individuals.
9 Only information that would identify the individuals may be excepted
10 under this paragraph; or

11 (C) protects information of a confidential nature concerning entities,
12 including, but not limited to, a formula, pattern, device, combination of
13 devices, or compilation of information that is used to protect or further a
14 business advantage over those who do not know or use it, if the disclosure
15 of such information would injure the affected entity in the marketplace.

16 (3) Records made before the date of the expiration of an exception
17 shall be subject to disclosure as otherwise provided by law. In deciding
18 whether the records shall be made public, the legislature shall consider
19 whether the damage or loss to persons or entities uniquely affected by the
20 exception of the type specified in paragraph (2)(B) or (2)(C) would occur
21 if the records were made public.
