9 AN ACT concerning lotteries; enacting the Kansas expanded lottery act;
10 authorizing operation of certain lottery gaming facilities, electronic
11 gaming machines, video lottery terminals and other lottery games at
12 certain locations; prohibiting certain acts and providing penalties for
13 violations; making appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30,
14 2006; amending K.S.A. 74-8702, 74-8705, 74-8710, 74-8716, 74-8723,
15 74-8830 and 74-8832, K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 74-8711 and K.S.A. 2004
16 Supp. 19-101a, as amended by section 1 of 2005 Senate Bill No. 298,
17 and repealing the existing sections.

19 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:*

20 Section 1. K.S.A. 74-8702 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-
21 8702. As used in the Kansas lottery act, unless the context otherwise
22 requires:

23 (a) "Commission" means the Kansas lottery commission.

24 (b) "Executive director" means the executive director of the Kansas
25 lottery.

26 (c) ~~"Gaming equipment" means any electric, electronic or mechanical~~
27 ~~device or other equipment unique to the Kansas lottery used directly in~~
28 ~~the operation of any lottery and in the determination of winners pursuant~~
29 ~~to this act. "Gaming equipment" means any electric, electronic, comput-~~
30 ~~erized or electromechanical machine, mechanism, supply or device or any~~
31 ~~other equipment, which is: (1) Unique to the Kansas lottery and used~~
32 ~~pursuant to the Kansas lottery act; and (2) integral to the operation of an~~
33 ~~electronic gaming machine, lottery facility game or video lottery terminal;~~
34 ~~and (3) affects the results of an electronic gaming machine, lottery facility~~
35 ~~game or video lottery terminal by determining win or loss.~~

36 (d) "Kansas lottery" means the state agency created by this act to op-
37 erate a lottery or lotteries pursuant to this act.

38 (e) "Lottery retailer" means any person with whom the Kansas lottery
39 has contracted to sell lottery tickets or shares, or both, to the public.

40 (f) "Lottery" or "state lottery" means the lottery or lotteries operated
41 pursuant to this act.

42 (g) (1) "Major procurement" means any gaming product or service,
43 including but not limited to facilities, advertising and promotional serv-

1 ices, annuity contracts, prize payment agreements, consulting services,
2 equipment, tickets and other products and services unique to the Kansas
3 lottery, but not including materials, supplies, equipment and services
4 common to the ordinary operations of state agencies.

5 (2) “Major procurement” shall not mean any product, service or other
6 matter covered by or addressed in the Kansas expanded lottery act or a
7 management contract executed pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery
8 act.

9 (h) “Person” means any natural person, association, *limited liability*
10 *company*, corporation or partnership.

11 (i) “Prize” means any prize paid directly by the Kansas lottery pursuant
12 to *it’s the Kansas lottery act or the Kansas expanded lottery act or any*
13 *rules and regulations adopted pursuant to either act.*

14 (j) “Share” means any intangible manifestation authorized by the Kan-
15 sas lottery to prove participation in a lottery game, *except as provided by*
16 *the Kansas expanded lottery act.*

17 (k) “Ticket” means any tangible evidence issued by the Kansas lottery
18 to prove participation in a lottery game *other than a lottery facility game.*

19 (l) “Vendor” means any person who has entered into a major procure-
20 ment contract with the Kansas lottery.

21 (m) “Returned ticket” means any ticket which was transferred to a
22 lottery retailer, which was not sold by the lottery retailer and which was
23 returned to the Kansas lottery for refund by issuance of a credit or
24 otherwise.

25 (n) “Video lottery machine” means any electronic video game machine
26 that, upon insertion of cash, is available to play or simulate the play of a
27 video game authorized by the commission, including but not limited to
28 bingo, poker, black jack and keno, and which uses a video display and
29 microprocessors and in which, by chance, the player may receive free
30 games or credits that can be redeemed for cash.

31 (o) (1) “Lottery machine” means any machine or device that allows a
32 player to insert cash or other form of consideration and may deliver as
33 the result of an element of chance, regardless of the skill required by the
34 player, a prize or evidence of a prize, including, but not limited to:

35 (A) Any machine or device in which the prize or evidence of a prize is
36 determined by both chance and the player’s or players’ skill, including,
37 but not limited to, any machine or device on which a lottery game or
38 lottery games, such as poker or blackjack, are played;

39 (B) any machine or device in which the prize or evidence of a prize is
40 determined only by chance, including, but not limited to, any slot machine
41 or bingo machine; or

42 (C) any lottery ticket vending machine, such as a keno ticket vending
43 machine, pull-tab vending machine or an instant-bingo vending machine.

1 (2) “Lottery machine” shall not mean:

2 (A) Any food vending machine defined by K.S.A. 36-501, and amend-
3 ments thereto;

4 (B) any nonprescription drug machine authorized under K.S.A. 65-650,
5 and amendments thereto;

6 (C) any machine which dispenses only bottled or canned soft drinks,
7 chewing gum, nuts or candies; ~~or~~

8 (D) any machine excluded from the definition of gambling devices
9 under subsection (d) of K.S.A. 21-4302, and amendments thereto; or

10 (E) *any electronic gaming machine, lottery facility game or video lottery*
11 *terminal operated in accordance with the provisions of the Kansas ex-*
12 *anded lottery act.*

13 (p) “Electronic gaming machine” means any electronic, electromechan-
14 ical, video or computerized device, contrivance or machine authorized by
15 the Kansas lottery which, upon insertion of cash, tokens, electronic cards
16 or any consideration, is available to play, operate or simulate the play of
17 a game authorized by the Kansas lottery pursuant to the Kansas expanded
18 lottery act, including, but not limited to, bingo, poker, blackjack, keno and
19 slot machines, and which may deliver or entitle the player operating the
20 machine to receive cash, tokens, merchandise or credits that may be re-
21 deemed for cash. Electronic gaming machines may use bill validators and
22 may be single-position reel-type, single or multi-game video and single-
23 position multi-game video electronic game, including but not limited to,
24 poker, blackjack and slot machines. Electronic gaming machines shall be
25 directly linked to a central computer at a location determined by the
26 executive director for purposes of security, monitoring and auditing. Elec-
27 tronic gaming machines may be linked to the central video lottery terminal
28 computer system.

29 (q) “Progressive electronic game” means a game played on an electronic
30 gaming machine for which the payoff increases uniformly as the game is
31 played and for which the jackpot, determined by application of a formula
32 to the income of independent, local or interlinked electronic gaming ma-
33 chines, may be won.

34 (r) “Token” means a representative of value, of metal or other material,
35 which is not legal tender, redeemable for cash only by the issuing lottery
36 gaming facility manager and which is issued and sold by a lottery gaming
37 facility manager for the sole purpose of playing an electronic gaming
38 machine or lottery facility game.

39 (s) “Lottery gaming facility” means that portion of a building, including
40 the real and personal property, that is owned or leased by the state for
41 the purposes of operating, managing and maintaining lottery facility
42 games.

43 (t) “Lottery gaming enterprise” means an entertainment enterprise

- 1 *which includes a lottery gaming facility authorized pursuant to the Kansas*
2 *expanded lottery act and ancillary lottery gaming operations that have a*
3 *common business or marketing strategy. A lottery gaming enterprise shall*
4 *be designed to attract to its lottery gaming facility consumers who reside*
5 *outside the immediate area of such enterprise.*
- 6 (u) *“Lottery gaming facility manager” means a corporation, limited*
7 *liability company or other business entity authorized to construct and*
8 *manage, or manage alone, pursuant to a management contract with the*
9 *Kansas lottery, and on behalf of the state, a lottery gaming enterprise and*
10 *lottery gaming facility.*
- 11 (v) *“Accelerated lottery gaming facility net payment” means the ad-*
12 *vanced payment to the state treasurer of a portion of the state’s future*
13 *share of residual lottery gaming facility revenues upon approval of a man-*
14 *agement contract with a lottery gaming facility manager for the devel-*
15 *opment or construction of a lottery gaming facility and management of a*
16 *lottery gaming enterprise pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act.*
- 17 (w) *“Lottery gaming facility revenues” means the total revenues from*
18 *lottery facility games at a lottery gaming facility after all related prizes*
19 *are paid.*
- 20 (x) *“Residual lottery gaming facility revenues” means the balance of the*
21 *lottery gaming facility revenues in each account in the lottery gaming*
22 *facility fund established in subsection (a) of section 8, and amendments*
23 *thereto, after the transfer to an operating account for the payment of*
24 *lottery gaming facility expenses and interest on financing approved in the*
25 *management contract, as described in subsection (b) of section 8, and*
26 *amendments thereto.*
- 27 (y) *“Lottery gaming facility expenses” means normal business expenses,*
28 *as defined in the management contract pursuant to generally accepted*
29 *accounting principles (GAAP), associated with the ownership and oper-*
30 *ation of a lottery gaming facility, payments to any city or county and*
31 *payments to the problem gambling grant fund.*
- 32 (z) *“Lottery facility games” mean any electronic gaming machines and*
33 *any other lottery games in the form of Class II or III gaming which, as*
34 *of May 1, 2004, are authorized to be conducted or operated at a tribal*
35 *gaming facility, as defined in K.S.A. 74-9802, and amendments thereto,*
36 *located within the boundaries of this state.*
- 37 (aa) *“Ancillary lottery gaming facility operations” means additional*
38 *non-lottery facility game products and services not owned and operated*
39 *by the state which may be included in the overall development associated*
40 *with the lottery gaming facility. Such operations may include, but are not*
41 *limited to, restaurants, hotels, motels, museums or entertainment facilities.*
42 *Such operations conducted on state-owned property shall pay reasonable*
43 *compensation to the state for the use of the space.*

1 (bb) “Certificate of authorization” means a written approval of the
2 executive director authorizing a prospective lottery gaming facility man-
3 ager to proceed with approval under section 4, and amendments thereto,
4 and any applicable county or city planning and zoning requirements for
5 the establishment of a lottery gaming facility pursuant to the Kansas ex-
6 panded lottery act. No prospective lottery gaming facility manager shall
7 seek the approval under section 4, and amendments thereto, unless such
8 prospective manager holds a certificate or temporary certificate of
9 authorization.

10 (cc) “Management contract” means a contract, subcontract or collateral
11 agreement between the state and a lottery gaming facility manager for the
12 management of a lottery gaming facility owned and operated by the state,
13 negotiated and signed by the executive director on behalf of the state.
14 Management contracts shall not be subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 75-
15 3738 through 75-3744, and amendments thereto, or to any statutory pro-
16 vision regulating major procurements.

17 (dd) “Parimutuel licensee” means a facility owner licensee or facility
18 manager licensee under the Kansas parimutuel racing act.

19 (ee) “Parimutuel licensee location” means the racetrack facility, as de-
20 fined in K.S.A. 74-8802, and amendments thereto, owned or managed by
21 the parimutuel licensee. A parimutuel licensee location may include any
22 existing structure at such racetrack facility or any structure that may be
23 constructed on real estate where such racetrack facility is located.

24 (ff) “Destination development zone” means one of the following zones
25 where one or more lottery gaming facilities may be operated pursuant to
26 the Kansas expanded lottery act as a part of an overall strategy of creating
27 regional tourism destinations to enhance the local and state economy
28 through increased tourism opportunities:

29 (1) The northeast Kansas development zone, which consists of Wyan-
30 dotte county; and

31 (2) the southeast Kansas development zone, which consists of Crawford
32 and Cherokee counties.

33 (gg) “Gray machine” means any mechanical, electro-mechanical or
34 electronic device, capable of being used for gambling, that is: (1) Not
35 authorized by the Kansas lottery, (2) not linked to a lottery central com-
36 puter or the central video lottery terminal computer system, (3) available
37 to the public for play and (4) capable of simulating a game played on a
38 video lottery terminal or any similar gambling game authorized pursuant
39 to the Kansas expanded lottery act.

40 New Sec. 2. (a) Sections 2 through 46, and amendments thereto, shall
41 be known and may be cited as the Kansas expanded lottery act. The
42 Kansas expanded lottery act shall be part of and supplemental to the
43 Kansas lottery act.

1 (b) If any provision of this act or the application thereof to any person
2 or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect any other
3 provision or application of the act which can be given effect without the
4 invalid provision or application.

5 (c) (1) The court shall require the plaintiff in any civil action challenging
6 the constitutionality of the Kansas expanded lottery act to file with the
7 court a surety bond or other financial security approved by the court,
8 conditioned on and in an amount determined by the court as sufficient
9 to provide for payment of any economic damages to the state or others
10 resulting from delay of implementation of such act if the action is dis-
11 missed or, if judgment is entered for the state, payment in full of amounts
12 awarded by the court under paragraph (2).

13 (2) The court in any action challenging the constitutionality of the Kan-
14 sas expanded lottery act may award to the state and others damages for
15 economic harm to the state and others, as well as costs and reasonable
16 attorney fees.

17 (3) The decision of the district court in any action challenging the con-
18 stitutionality of the Kansas expanded lottery act shall be subject to auto-
19 matic review by and appeal to the supreme court of Kansas in the manner
20 provided by applicable statutes and rules of the supreme court governing
21 appellate procedure. The review and appeal shall be expedited in every
22 manner consistent with the proper presentation thereof and given priority
23 pursuant to the statutes and rules of the supreme court governing ap-
24 pellate procedure.

25 New Sec. 3. (a) The executive director shall issue a certificate of au-
26 thorization to each prospective lottery gaming facility manager which
27 meets the necessary requirements established by the executive director
28 and as set forth herein. The executive director shall select as prospective
29 lottery gaming facility managers only such entities as the executive direc-
30 tor deems best able to serve the interests of the state of Kansas, the public
31 good and convenience. In the selection of lottery gaming facility man-
32 agers, the executive director shall consider factors such as financial re-
33 sponsibility, integrity, reputation, experience and such other factors as
34 the executive director deems appropriate.

35 (b) The executive director may charge an administrative application
36 fee. Such fee shall be submitted with the application for a certificate of
37 authorization and shall be reasonably related to the actual costs of proc-
38 essing the application.

39 (c) To receive a certificate of authorization, a prospective lottery gam-
40 ing facility manager shall, at a minimum:

41 (1) Have sufficient access to financial resources to support the activities
42 required of a lottery gaming facility manager under the Kansas expanded
43 lottery act;

1 (2) be current in filing all applicable tax returns and in payment of all
2 taxes, interest and penalties owed to the state of Kansas and any taxing
3 subdivision where such prospective manager is located in the state of
4 Kansas, excluding items under formal appeal pursuant to applicable stat-
5 utes; and

6 (3) have three consecutive years' experience in the management of class
7 III gaming, as defined in K.S.A. 46-2301, and amendments thereto, op-
8 erated pursuant to state or federal law. A prospective lottery gaming fa-
9 cility manager shall not be deemed to meet the requirements of this
10 paragraph (3) by virtue of having employed, after June 30, 2002, person-
11 nel with such experience in the management of class III gaming.

12 (d) Any certificate of authorization issued to a parimutuel licensee
13 which proposes to establish a lottery gaming facility at a parimutuel li-
14 censee location shall be contingent upon approval by the Kansas racing
15 and gaming commission of a plan for compliance with the requirements
16 for live racing and purse supplements established pursuant to sections 29
17 and 36, and amendments thereto. Upon application of a parimutuel li-
18 censee, the Kansas racing and gaming commission shall open a proceed-
19 ing to consider such licensee's proposal for development of a lottery gam-
20 ing facility at the parimutuel licensee location. Such proposal shall include
21 provisions for:

22 (1) Compliance with the requirements of section 29, and amendments
23 thereto;

24 (2) payment of purse supplements from the appropriate funds estab-
25 lished by section 36, and amendments thereto; and

26 (3) a plan for protecting and promoting live racing in Kansas. The
27 Kansas racing and gaming commission shall hear evidence and testimony
28 from all interested parties. Upon a finding by the Kansas racing and gam-
29 ing commission that the proposal is in the best interest of live racing in
30 Kansas and more beneficial to live racing than placement of video lottery
31 terminals at such parimutuel licensee location, the Kansas racing and
32 gaming commission may approve such proposal and recommend issuance
33 of a certificate of authorization by the executive director of the Kansas
34 lottery pursuant to this section.

35 (e) Subject to the requirements of this section, a certificate of author-
36 ization shall not be unreasonably withheld. The executive director shall
37 issue a temporary certificate of authorization to a prospective lottery gam-
38 ing facility manager if:

39 (1) The executive director believes such manager will meet the appro-
40 priate requirements for a certificate of authorization;

41 (2) the prospective manager and the principals, officers and directors,
42 of such prospective manager, have completed acceptable background in-
43 vestigations by federal or state authorities; and

1 (3) a complete review of the application for a certificate cannot be
2 completed within 30 days of the application filing.

3 New Sec. 4. (a) The lottery commission shall adopt rules and
4 regulations:

5 (1) Establishing a procedure to receive, consider and approve proposed
6 management contracts for lottery gaming facilities, including provisions
7 for review of competitive proposals within a destination development
8 zone; and

9 (2) promoting the integrity of the gaming and finances of lottery gaming
10 facilities, which rules and regulations shall apply to all management con-
11 tracts, shall meet or exceed industry standards for monitoring and con-
12 trolling the gaming and finances of gaming facilities and shall give the
13 executive director sufficient authority to monitor and control the gaming
14 operation and to ensure its integrity and security.

15 (b) The executive director, with the approval of the Kansas lottery com-
16 mission, may enter into a management contract with a prospective lottery
17 gaming facility manager holding a certificate of authorization to construct
18 and manage, or manage alone, on behalf of the state of Kansas, a lottery
19 gaming facility or lottery gaming enterprise at specified destination lo-
20 cations within the northeast and southeast Kansas development zones
21 where the executive director determines the operation of such facility
22 would promote tourism and economic development. Any such specified
23 destination location must be in a county where a proposition submitted
24 pursuant to section 5, and amendments thereto, has been approved by
25 the voters of such county. Action on a management contract shall be taken
26 within 60 days of submission of the management contract proposal, unless
27 extended by agreement of the proposed manager and the commission.

28 (c) In determining whether to enter into a management contract with
29 a prospective lottery gaming facility manager to manage a lottery gaming
30 facility or lottery gaming enterprise pursuant to this section, the com-
31 mission shall take into consideration the following factors: The size of the
32 proposed facility; the geographic area in which such facility is to be lo-
33 cated; the proposed facility's location as a tourist and entertainment des-
34 tination; the estimated number of tourists that would be attracted by the
35 proposed facility; the number and type of lottery facility games to be
36 operated at the proposed facility; and agreements related to ancillary lot-
37 tery gaming facility operations.

38 (d) (1) No management contract shall be awarded for a lottery gaming
39 facility located within Wyandotte county to any owner, operator or man-
40 ager of a casino or other gaming establishment which is in operation and
41 located in Buchanan, Cass, Clay, Jackson, Johnson, Lafayette, Platte or
42 Ray county, Missouri.

43 (2) No management contract shall be awarded for a lottery gaming

1 facility located within Cherokee or Crawford county to any owner, op-
2 erator or manager of a casino or other gaming establishment which is in
3 operation and located in: (A) Barry, Barton, Cedar, Dade, Jasper,
4 Lawrence, McDonald, Newton or Vernon county, Missouri; (B) Craig,
5 Delaware, Mayes or Ottawa county, Oklahoma; or (C) Benton county,
6 Arkansas.

7 (e) The commission shall not approve a management contract unless:

8 (1) The commission determines that the proposed development: (A)
9 Constitutes a lottery gaming enterprise; and (B) demonstrates through a
10 market study that, considering all other competing gaming and entertain-
11 ment venues, the proposed development would: (i) Be economically fea-
12 sible, (ii) be profitable for the state and (iii) not render economically
13 infeasible any other lottery gaming enterprise; and

14 (2) the commission determines that the proposed development: (A)
15 Consists of an investment in infrastructure, including ancillary lottery
16 gaming facility operations, of at least \$150,000,000 for the northeast Kan-
17 sas development zone; or (B) consists of an investment in infrastructure,
18 including ancillary lottery gaming facility operations, of at least
19 \$90,000,000 and demonstrates through a market study that at least 25%
20 of its gaming consumers would reside outside the state of Kansas for the
21 southeast Kansas development zone.

22 (f) All management contracts authorized under this section shall:

23 (1) Have a maximum initial term of 15 years from the date of opening
24 of the lottery gaming facility. At the end of the initial term, the contract
25 may be renewed by mutual consent of the state and the lottery facility
26 gaming manager;

27 (2) specify the percentage, not to exceed 22%, of residual lottery gam-
28 ing facility revenues to be paid to the lottery gaming facility manager;

29 (3) establish a mechanism to facilitate payment of lottery gaming facility
30 expenses, payment of the lottery gaming facility manager's share of the
31 residual lottery gaming facility revenues and distribution of the state's
32 share of the residual lottery gaming facility revenues;

33 (4) establish the types of lottery facility games to be installed in such
34 facility;

35 (5) establish the maximum construction cost or purchase cost of the
36 lottery gaming facility and the mechanism for recovering those costs from
37 the state's share of the residual lottery gaming facility revenues and trans-
38 fer of ownership of such facility to the state, if the lottery gaming facility
39 is owned by the state;

40 (6) specify the terms of the lease including, but not limited to, terms
41 which establish state control of the lottery gaming facility and that any
42 lease payments shall be treated as an operating expense, if the lottery
43 gaming facility is leased by the state;

- 1 (7) calculate the accelerated lottery gaming facility net payment by
2 multiplying the maximum number of electronic gaming machines au-
3 thorized for and located in the facility by \$15,000 per machine;
- 4 (8) specify the mechanism for recovering the accelerated lottery gam-
5 ing facility net payment from the state's share of the residual lottery gam-
6 ing facility revenues;
- 7 (9) specify that financing for construction and operation of the lottery
8 gaming facility on behalf of the state and of the payment to the state of
9 other sums required by the management contract is to be arranged by
10 the lottery gaming facility manager and that the state shall cooperate in
11 the financing by executing all necessary security interests for the construc-
12 tion, equipping and operation of the lottery gaming facility;
- 13 (10) incorporate terms and conditions for the ancillary lottery gaming
14 facility operations;
- 15 (11) designate as key employees, subject to approval of the executive
16 director, any employees or contractors providing services or functions
17 which are related to lottery facility games authorized by a management
18 contract;
- 19 (12) include financing commitments for construction;
- 20 (13) include a resolution of endorsement from the city, if the proposed
21 facility is within the corporate limits of a city, or from the county if the
22 proposed facility is located in the unincorporated area of the county;
- 23 (14) include for parimutuel licensee location a requirement that any
24 parimutuel licensee developing a destination casino pursuant to this act
25 comply with all orders and rules and regulations of the Kansas racing and
26 gaming commission with regard to the conduct of live racing, including
27 the same minimum days of racing as specified in section 29, and amend-
28 ments thereto, for operation of video lottery terminals at parimutuel li-
29 censee locations;
- 30 (15) (A) if the lottery gaming facility is located in a destination devel-
31 opment zone comprised of one county and is not located within a city,
32 include for services, as determined by the management contract, payment
33 of an amount equal to not more than 4% of the lottery gaming facility
34 revenues to the county in which the lottery gaming facility is located; or
35 (B) if the lottery gaming facility is located in a destination development
36 zone comprised of one county and is located within a city, include for
37 services, as determined by the management contract, payment of an
38 amount equal to not more than 2% of the lottery gaming facility revenues
39 to the city in which the lottery gaming facility is located and an amount
40 equal to not more than 2% of such revenues to the county in which such
41 facility is located. Such payment shall be deemed to be an expense of the
42 lottery gaming facility;
- 43 (16) (A) if the lottery gaming facility is located in a destination devel-

1 opment zone comprised of more than one county and is not located within
2 a city, include for services, as determined by the management contract,
3 payment of an amount equal to not more than 3% of the lottery gaming
4 facility revenues to the county in which the lottery gaming facility is lo-
5 cated and an aggregate amount equal to not more than 1% of such rev-
6 enues to other counties in the destination development zone, divided
7 equally among such counties; or (B) if the lottery gaming facility is located
8 in a destination development zone comprised of more than one county
9 and is located within a city, include for services, as determined by the
10 management contract, payment of an amount equal to not more than
11 1.5% of the lottery gaming facility revenues to the city in which the lottery
12 gaming facility is located, an amount equal to not more than 1.5% of such
13 revenues to the county in which such facility is located and an aggregate
14 amount equal to not more than 1% of such revenues to other counties in
15 the destination development zone, divided equally among such counties.
16 Such payment shall be deemed to be an expense of the lottery gaming
17 facility;

18 (17) allow the lottery gaming facility manager to operate the lottery
19 gaming facility in a manner consistent with this act, but shall place full,
20 complete and ultimate ownership and control of the gaming operation of
21 the lottery gaming facility with the Kansas lottery. The Kansas lottery
22 shall retain the ability to overrule any significant gaming decision without
23 notice required prior to taking such action. The Kansas lottery shall retain
24 full control over all decisions concerning lottery gaming facility games;
25 and

26 (18) include an enforceable provision: (A) Prohibiting the state from
27 entering into management contracts for more than two lottery gaming
28 facilities, one to be located in the northeast Kansas development zone
29 and one to be located in the southeast Kansas development zone, before
30 July 1, 2010; and (B) requiring the state to repay to the lottery gaming
31 facility manager any accelerated lottery gaming facility net payment paid
32 by such manager, plus a penalty equal to any such accelerated payment,
33 if the state violates the prohibition provision described in (A).

34 (h) Any management contract under which the accelerated lottery gam-
35 ing facility net payment has not been paid to the state treasurer within
36 30 days after the date of approval of the management contract shall be
37 null and void.

38 (i) Management contracts authorized by this section may include pro-
39 visions relating to:

40 (1) Accounting procedures to determine the lottery gaming facility rev-
41 enues, unclaimed prizes and credits;

42 (2) minimum requirements for a lottery gaming facility manager to
43 provide qualified oversight, security and supervision of the lottery facility

- 1 games including the use of qualified personnel with experience in appli-
2 cable technology;
- 3 (3) eligibility requirements for employees, contractors or agents of a
4 lottery gaming facility manager who will have responsibility for or involve-
5 ment with actual gaming activities or for the handling of cash or tokens;
- 6 (4) background investigations to be performed by the Kansas lottery;
- 7 (5) licensure requirements of any employee, contractor or agent as
8 provided by the Kansas expanded lottery act or rules and regulations
9 adopted pursuant thereto;
- 10 (6) provision for termination of the management contract by either
11 party for cause; and
- 12 (7) any other provision deemed necessary by the parties, including such
13 other terms and restrictions as necessary to conduct any lottery facility
14 game in a legal and fair manner.
- 15 (j) A management contract shall not constitute property, nor shall it be
16 subject to attachment, garnishment or execution, nor shall it be alienable
17 or transferable, except upon approval by the executive director, nor shall
18 it be subject to being encumbered or hypothecated. No interest in the
19 management contract shall descend by the laws of testate or intestate
20 devolution, but any interest shall cease and expire upon the death of the
21 lottery gaming facility manager or all interest holders in such manager,
22 except that executors, administrators or representatives of the estate of
23 any deceased lottery gaming facility manager and the trustee of any in-
24 solvent or bankrupt lottery gaming facility manager may continue to op-
25 erate pursuant to the management contract under order of the approp-
26 riate court for no longer than one year after the death, bankruptcy or
27 insolvency of such manager.
- 28 (k) (1) The Kansas lottery shall be the licensee and owner of all software
29 programs used at a lottery gaming facility for any lottery facility game.
- 30 (2) A lottery gaming facility manager, on behalf of the state, shall pur-
31 chase or lease for the Kansas lottery all lottery facility games. The lottery
32 gaming facility manager shall be entitled to reimbursement from the state
33 for all out-of-pocket expenses related to purchasing, leasing and installing
34 such games. The Kansas lottery shall be the owner of all lottery facility
35 games, except for those leased by the state or leased by the lottery gaming
36 facility manager on behalf of the state, and all lottery facility games shall
37 be subject to the ultimate control of the Kansas lottery in accordance with
38 this act.
- 39 (l) A lottery gaming facility shall comply with any planning and zoning
40 regulations of the city or county in which it is to be located. The executive
41 director shall not contract with any prospective lottery gaming facility
42 manager for the operation and management of such lottery gaming facility
43 unless such manager first receives any necessary approval under planning

1 and zoning requirements of the city or county in which it is to be located.
2 New Sec. 5. (a) Before the lottery commission may approve a manage-
3 ment contract for operation of any lottery gaming facility in a county, the
4 qualified voters of the county where the lottery gaming facility is proposed
5 to be located must approve the operation of lottery gaming facilities
6 within the county as provided by this section. Once the question has been
7 submitted to and approved by the voters of the county, subsequent elec-
8 tions shall not be required for the approval of the operation of additional
9 lottery gaming facilities in such county.

10 (b) (1) The board of county commissioners of any county may submit,
11 by resolution, and shall submit upon presentation of a petition filed in
12 accordance with this section, to the qualified voters of the county a prop-
13 osition to permit the operation of lottery gaming facilities within the
14 county pursuant to this section. The proposition shall be submitted to the
15 voters either at a special election called by the board of county commis-
16 sioners for that purpose and held not less than 90 days after the resolution
17 is adopted or the petition is filed or at the next general election, as shall
18 be specified by the board of county commissioners or as specified in the
19 petition, as the case may be.

20 (2) A petition to submit a proposition pursuant to this section shall be
21 filed with the county election officer. The petition shall be signed by
22 qualified voters of the county equal in number to not less than 10% of
23 the voters of the county who voted for the office of secretary of state at
24 the last preceding general election at which such office was elected. The
25 following shall appear on the petition: "We request an election to deter-
26 mine whether the Kansas lottery shall be authorized to operate a lottery
27 gaming facility in _____ county."

28 (3) Upon the adoption of a resolution or the submission of a valid
29 petition calling for an election pursuant to this section, the county election
30 officer shall cause the following proposition to be placed on the ballot at
31 the election called for that purpose: "Shall the Kansas lottery be author-
32 ized to operate a lottery gaming facility in _____ county?"

33 (4) If a majority of the votes cast and counted at such election is in
34 favor of approving the operation of lottery gaming facilities within the
35 county and the county is located within the northeast Kansas or southeast
36 Kansas destination development district, the lottery commission may ac-
37 cept applications for operation of lottery gaming facilities within the
38 county pursuant to this act. If a majority of the votes cast and counted at
39 an election under this section is against permitting the operation of lottery
40 gaming facilities within the county, the lottery commission shall not ap-
41 prove management contracts for the operation of lottery gaming facilities
42 within the county. The county election officer shall transmit a copy of the
43 certification of the results of the election to the executive director.

1 (5) The election provided for by this subsection (b) shall be conducted,
2 and the votes counted and canvassed, in the manner provided by law for
3 question submitted elections of the county.

4 (c) The lottery commission may consider qualified proposals for lottery
5 gaming facility management contracts for developments in a county
6 where the commission finds that after March 1, 2005, the county has held
7 an election of qualified voters pursuant to the county's home rule au-
8 thority if the county is in the northeast Kansas or southeast Kansas de-
9 velopment district and the commission determines that the ballot ques-
10 tion was in substantial compliance with the requirements of subsection
11 (b)(3) and the election was administered by the county election officer in
12 a manner consistent with the requirements of state election law.

13 (d) The question of the operation of a lottery gaming facility in a county
14 may be submitted at the same election as the question of placement of
15 video lottery terminals in the county under section 25, and amendments
16 thereto.

17 (e) A ballot question submitted prior to April 15, 2005, which uses the
18 phrase "destination casino" shall be deemed valid for the purposes of this
19 section.

20 New Sec. 6. (a) Electronic gaming machines operated pursuant to this
21 act, including those operated as lottery facility games, shall:

22 (1) Pay out an average of not less than 87% of the amount wagered
23 over the life of the machine;

24 (2) be directly linked to a central lottery communications system to
25 provide monitoring, auditing and other available program information to
26 the Kansas lottery;

27 (3) be on-line and in constant communication with a central computer
28 situated at a location determined by the executive director and specified
29 in the management contract; and

30 (4) be subject to deactivation at any time by order of the executive
31 director.

32 (b) The communications systems selected by the executive director
33 shall not limit participation to only one electronic gaming machine man-
34 ufacturer, distributor, supplier or provider. The lottery gaming facility
35 manager shall lease or purchase for the Kansas lottery and at the lottery
36 gaming facility's expense all equipment necessary to implement such cen-
37 tral communications and auditing functions.

38 (c) No employee, contractor or other person who has any legal affilia-
39 tion with a lottery gaming facility manager shall loan money to or other-
40 wise extend credit to patrons of a location where electronic gaming ma-
41 chines or lottery facility games are situated.

42 New Sec. 7. (a) Each specific type of electronic gaming machine and
43 lottery facility game shall be approved by the Kansas lottery. The Kansas

1 lottery shall examine prototypes of electronic gaming machines and lot-
2 tery facility games and shall notify the lottery gaming facility manager
3 which types of electronic gaming machines or lottery facility games are
4 in compliance with the requirements of this act. The use of progressive
5 electronic gaming machines is expressly permitted.

6 (b) No electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game shall be op-
7 erated pursuant to this act unless the executive director first issues a
8 certificate for such machine or game authorizing its use at a specified
9 location. Each electronic gaming machine and lottery facility game shall
10 have such certificate prominently displayed thereon. Any electronic gam-
11 ing machine or lottery facility game which does not display the certificate
12 required by this section is contraband and a public nuisance subject to
13 confiscation by any law enforcement officer.

14 (c) The executive director shall require any manufacturer, supplier,
15 provider, lottery gaming facility manager or other person seeking the
16 examination and certification of electronic gaming machines or lottery
17 facility games to pay the anticipated actual costs of the examination in
18 advance. After the completion of the examination, the executive director
19 shall refund any overpayment or charge and collect amounts sufficient to
20 reimburse the executive director for any underpayment of actual costs.
21 The executive director may contract for the examination of electronic
22 gaming machines and lottery facility games required by this section, and
23 may rely upon testing done by or for other states regulating electronic
24 gaming machines or lottery facility games, if the executive director deems
25 such testing to be reliable and in the best interest of the state of Kansas.

26 New Sec. 8. (a) There is hereby established in the state treasury the
27 lottery gaming facility fund (LGFF). A separate account for each lottery
28 gaming facility manager shall be maintained in the LGFF for receipt of
29 lottery gaming facility revenues from each respective manager. The lot-
30 tery gaming facility manager shall remit daily all lottery gaming facility
31 revenues to the state treasurer. Upon receipt of the remittance, the state
32 treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in the state treasury and credit
33 it to the respective account maintained for such manager in the LGFF.

34 (b) Upon receipt of each remittance under subsection (a), the state
35 treasurer shall immediately transfer 50% of the lottery gaming facility
36 revenues received from the remitting facility manager into a separate state
37 lottery gaming facility operating account (LGFOA) to be used by the state
38 for the payment of all lottery gaming facility expenses, including all in-
39 terest on financing. For a lottery gaming facility that is owned by the
40 state, a transfer in the amount of the monthly interest then due on such
41 approved financing shall occur from the LGFOA to the debt retirement
42 account established in subsection (d). On a monthly basis, a transfer in
43 an amount equal to 1% of the lottery gaming facility revenues shall occur

1 from the LGFOA to the problem gambling grant fund established by
2 K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 79-4805, and amendments thereto.

3 The executive director or the executive director's designee shall remit
4 payment for all expenses as provided by the management contract ap-
5 proved by the lottery gaming facility manager within three days of sub-
6 mission of documentation evidencing the expense to the executive direc-
7 tor or the executive director's designee.

8 (c) On a monthly basis, the treasurer shall transfer the residual lottery
9 gaming facility revenues in each account in the LGFF as follows:

10 (1) To the lottery gaming facility manager, a percentage specified in
11 the management contract, but not more than 22% of residual lottery
12 gaming facility revenues; and

13 (2) to the Kansas education opportunity trust fund established pursuant
14 to section 37, and amendments thereto, not less than 78% of residual
15 lottery gaming facility revenues or 24% of lottery gaming facility revenues,
16 whichever is greater.

17 (d) The state shall maintain for each lottery gaming facility a lottery
18 gaming facility debt retirement account (LGFDR) for the payment of
19 financing obligations related to the lottery gaming facility. Interest shall
20 be payable from the LGFDRA out of the funds transferred from the
21 LGFOA pursuant to subsection (b). If principal on financing obligations
22 related to the lottery gaming facility remains unpaid, the state treasurer
23 first shall transfer to the LGFDRA out of the state's share of the residual
24 lottery gaming facility revenues, provided for in subsection (c)(2), such
25 sums as are necessary to pay scheduled principal then due, to the extent
26 such transfer does not reduce the amount available for transfer to the
27 Kansas education opportunity trust fund below the minimum required
28 by subsection (c)(2). Thereafter, the balance of the residual lottery gam-
29 ing facility revenues shall be transferred to the Kansas education oppor-
30 tunity trust fund.

31 (e) On a monthly basis, the executive director and the lottery gaming
32 facility manager shall reconcile the amounts deposited into the LGFOA
33 for the lottery gaming facility manager's payment of the projected lottery
34 gaming facility expenses and approved financing interest with the actual
35 lottery gaming facility expenses and interest accrued. After completion of
36 the reconciliation, the state shall transfer any amount remaining in the
37 LGFOA to the LGFF to be distributed in the manner provided in sub-
38 section (c). If funds in the LGFOA are insufficient to pay lottery gaming
39 facility expenses and interest accrued, the state and the lottery gaming
40 facility manager shall transfer to the LGFOA the sums necessary to rec-
41 oncile such insufficiency and balance the LGFOA. Such transfer shall be
42 in the respective shares provided in subsection (c) to the extent such
43 transfer does not reduce the amount available for transfer to the Kansas

1 education opportunity trust fund below the minimum required by sub-
2 section (c)(2).

3 New Sec. 9. The Kansas lottery, through rules and regulations, shall
4 establish:

5 (a) A certification requirement, and enforcement procedure, for offi-
6 cers, directors, key employees and persons directly or indirectly owning
7 a 0.5% or more interest in a lottery gaming facility manager. Such certi-
8 fication requirement shall include compliance with such security, fitness
9 and background investigations and standards the executive director
10 deems necessary to determine whether such person's reputation, habits
11 or associations pose a threat to the public interest of the state or to the
12 reputation of or effective regulation and control of the lottery gaming
13 facility. Any person convicted of any felony, a crime involving gambling
14 or a crime of moral turpitude prior to applying for a certificate as such
15 sales agent or at any time thereafter shall be deemed unfit. The Kansas
16 lottery shall conduct the security, fitness and background checks required
17 pursuant to this subsection;

18 (b) a certification requirement, and enforcement procedure, for those
19 persons, including electronic gaming machine manufacturers, technology
20 providers and computer system providers, who propose to contract with
21 a lottery gaming facility manager or the state for the provision of goods
22 or services related to a lottery gaming facility, including management
23 services. Such certification requirements shall include compliance with
24 such security, fitness and background investigations and standards of of-
25 ficers, directors, key gaming employees and persons directly or indirectly
26 owning a 0.5% or more interest in such entity, the executive director
27 deems necessary to determine whether such person's reputation, habits
28 and associations pose a threat to the public interest of the state or to the
29 reputation of or effective regulation and control of the lottery gaming
30 facility. Any person convicted of any felony, a crime involving gambling
31 or a crime of moral turpitude prior to applying for a certificate hereunder
32 or at any time thereafter shall be deemed unfit. If the executive director
33 determines the certification standards of another state are comprehen-
34 sive, thorough and provide similar adequate safeguards, the executive
35 director may certify an applicant already certified in such state without
36 the necessity of a full application and background check. The Kansas
37 lottery shall conduct the security, fitness and background checks required
38 under this subsection;

39 (c) provisions for revocation of a certification required by paragraph
40 (a) or (b) upon a finding that the certificate holder, an officer or director
41 thereof or a person directly or indirectly owning a 0.5% or more interest
42 therein: (1) Has knowingly provided false or misleading material infor-
43 mation to the Kansas lottery or its employees; or (2) has been convicted

1 of a felony, gambling related offense or any crime of moral turpitude; and
2 (d) provisions for suspension, revocation or nonrenewal of a certifica-
3 tion required by paragraph (a) or (b) upon a finding that the certificate
4 holder, an officer or director thereof or a person directly or indirectly
5 owning a 0.5% or more interest therein: (1) Has failed to notify the Kansas
6 lottery about a material change in ownership of the certificate holder, or
7 any change in the directors or officers thereof; (2) is delinquent in re-
8 mitting money owed to the Kansas lottery; (3) has violated any provision
9 of any contract between the Kansas lottery and the certificate holder; or
10 (4) has violated any provision of the Kansas expanded lottery act or any
11 rule and regulation adopted hereunder.

12 New Sec. 10. (a) The executive director, or the executive director's
13 designee, may observe and inspect all electronic gaming machines, lottery
14 facility games, lottery gaming facilities and all related equipment and fa-
15 cilities operated by a lottery gaming facility manager.

16 (b) In addition to the powers granted pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8704 and
17 sections 3 and 4, and amendments thereto, the executive director shall
18 have the power to:

19 (1) Examine, or cause to be examined by any agent or representative
20 designated by the executive director, any books, papers, records or mem-
21 oranda of any lottery facility gaming manager, or of any business involved
22 in electronic gaming machines or lottery facility games authorized pur-
23 suant to the Kansas expanded lottery act, for the purpose of ascertaining
24 compliance with any provision of the Kansas lottery act, the Kansas ex-
25 panded lottery act, or any rules and regulations adopted thereunder;

26 (2) investigate alleged violations of the Kansas expanded lottery act and
27 alleged violations of any rules and regulations, orders and final decisions
28 of the commission or the executive director;

29 (3) request a court to issue subpoenas to compel access to or for the
30 production of any books, papers, records or memoranda in the custody
31 or control of any lottery gaming facility manager related to the manage-
32 ment of the lottery gaming facility, or to compel the appearance of any
33 lottery gaming facility manager for the purpose of ascertaining compli-
34 ance with the provisions of the Kansas lottery act and the Kansas ex-
35 panded lottery act or rules and regulations adopted thereunder;

36 (4) inspect and approve, prior to publication or distribution, all adver-
37 tising by a lottery gaming facility manager which includes any reference
38 to the Kansas lottery; and

39 (5) take any other action as may be reasonable or appropriate to enforce
40 the provisions of the Kansas expanded lottery act and any rules and reg-
41 ulations, orders and final decisions of the executive director or the
42 commission.

43 (c) Appropriate security measures shall be required in any and all areas

1 where electronic gaming machines and other lottery facility games au-
2 thorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act are located or op-
3 erated. The executive director shall approve all such security measures.

4 (d) The executive director shall require an annual audit of the elec-
5 tronic gaming machine operations and lottery facility games of each lot-
6 tery gaming facility manager contracting with the Kansas lottery. Such
7 audit shall be conducted by a licensed accounting firm approved by the
8 executive director. Such audit shall be conducted at the expense of the
9 lottery.

10 (e) None of the information disclosed pursuant to this section shall be
11 subject to disclosure under the Kansas open records act, K.S.A. 45-216
12 et seq., and amendments thereto.

13 New Sec. 11. (a) Wagers shall be received only from a person at the
14 location where the electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game is
15 authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act. No person pres-
16 ent at such location shall place or attempt to place a wager on behalf of
17 another person who is not present at such location.

18 (b) Violation of this section is a class A nonperson misdemeanor upon
19 a conviction for a first offense. Violation of this section is a severity level
20 9, nonperson felony upon conviction for a second or subsequent offense.

21 New Sec. 12. (a) Except as authorized in subsection (c), it is unlawful
22 for any lottery gaming facility manager, or its employees or agents, to
23 allow any person to play electronic gaming machines or lottery facility
24 games or share in winnings of a person knowing such person to be:

25 (1) Under 21 years of age;

26 (2) the executive director, a member of the commission or an employee
27 of the Kansas lottery;

28 (3) an employee or agent of the lottery gaming facility manager;

29 (4) an officer or employee of a vendor contracting with the Kansas
30 lottery to supply gaming equipment to the Kansas lottery for use in the
31 operation of any electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game con-
32 ducted pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act;

33 (5) a spouse, child, stepchild, brother, stepbrother, sister, stepsister,
34 parent or stepparent of a person described in subsection (a)(2), (a)(3) or
35 (a)(4); or

36 (6) a person who resides in the same household as any person described
37 by subsection (a)(2), (a)(3) or (a)(4).

38 (b) Violation of subsection (a) is a class A nonperson misdemeanor upon
39 conviction for a first offense. Violation of subsection (a) is a severity level
40 9, nonperson felony upon conviction for a second or subsequent offense.

41 (c) The executive director may authorize in writing any employee of
42 the Kansas lottery and any employee of a lottery vendor to play an elec-
43 tronic gaming machine or a lottery facility game authorized pursuant to

1 the Kansas expanded lottery act to verify the proper operation thereof
2 with respect to security and contract compliance. Any prize awarded as
3 a result of such play shall become the property of the Kansas lottery and
4 be added to the prize pools of subsequent lottery games. No money or
5 merchandise shall be awarded to any employee of the Kansas lottery play-
6 ing an electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game pursuant to this
7 subsection.

8 New Sec. 13. A person under age 21 shall not be permitted in an area
9 of any location where any electronic gaming machine or lottery facility
10 game authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act is being
11 operated or conducted, except for a person at least 18 years of age who
12 is an employee of the lottery gaming facility manager. No employee under
13 age 21 shall perform any function involved in gaming by patrons. No
14 person under age 21 shall be permitted to make a wager on an electronic
15 gaming machine or lottery facility game authorized pursuant to the Kan-
16 sas expanded lottery act.

17 New Sec. 14. Except for persons acting in accordance with rules and
18 regulations of the Kansas lottery or by written authority of the executive
19 director in performing installation, maintenance, inspection and repair
20 services, any person who, with the intent to manipulate the outcome, pay
21 out or operation of an electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game,
22 manipulates the outcome, pay out or operation of an electronic gaming
23 machine or lottery facility game by physical, electrical or mechanical
24 means shall be guilty of a severity level 8, nonperson felony.

25 New Sec. 15. (a) Except in accordance with rules and regulations of
26 the Kansas lottery or by written authority from the executive director in
27 performing installation, maintenance, inspection and repair services, it is
28 a class A nonperson misdemeanor for the executive director, the com-
29 mission or any employee or agent of the commission, or the lottery gam-
30 ing facility manager or any employee of such manager, to knowingly, while
31 in Kansas, place a wager on or bet or play an electronic gaming machine
32 or other lottery facility game authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded
33 lottery act.

34 (b) It is a severity level 8, nonperson felony for any person playing or
35 using any electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game in Kansas
36 knowingly to:

37 (1) Use other than a lawful coin or legal tender of the United States of
38 America, or to use coin not of the same denomination as the coin intended
39 to be used in an electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game; except
40 that in the playing of any electronic gaming machine, lottery facility game
41 or similar gaming device, it shall be lawful for any person to use gaming
42 billets, tokens or similar objects therein which are approved by the Kansas
43 lottery;

1 (2) use gaming billets, tokens or similar objects in a lottery gaming
2 facility other than in the facility for which the billet, token or similar object
3 was approved;

4 (3) possess or use, while on the premises of a lottery gaming facility,
5 or any location where electronic gaming machines or other lottery facility
6 games are authorized pursuant to this act, any cheating or thieving device,
7 including, but not limited to, tools, wires, drills, coins attached to strings
8 or wires or electronic or magnetic devices to facilitate removing from any
9 electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game or any money or con-
10 tents thereof;

11 (4) possess or use while on the premises of a lottery gaming facility, or
12 any location where electronic gaming machines or other lottery facility
13 games are authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act, any
14 key or device designed for the purpose of, or suitable for, opening or
15 entering any electronic gaming machine, lottery facility game or similar
16 gaming device or drop box.

17 (c) Any duly authorized agent or employee of the commission or a
18 lottery gaming facility manager may possess and use any of the devices
19 described in paragraphs (3) and (4) of subsection (b) in furtherance of
20 inspection or testing as provided in the Kansas expanded lottery act or in
21 furtherance of such person's employment at any location where electronic
22 gaming machines, lottery facility games or other lottery games are au-
23 thorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act.

24 New Sec. 16. Each lottery gaming facility manager shall post one or
25 more signs at the location where such manager operates electronic gam-
26 ing machines or lottery facility games to inform patrons of the toll-free
27 number available to provide information and referral services regarding
28 compulsive or problem gambling. The text shall be determined by the
29 secretary of the department of social and rehabilitation services. Failure
30 by a lottery gaming facility manager to post and maintain such signs shall
31 be cause for the imposition of a fine not to exceed \$500 per day.

32 New Sec. 17. No taxes, fees, charges, transfers or distributions, other
33 than those provided for in the Kansas expanded lottery act, shall be made
34 or levied by any city, county or other municipality from or against net
35 machine income or lottery gaming facility revenue derived from elec-
36 tronic gaming machines and lottery facility games operated pursuant to
37 this act.

38 New Sec. 18. All sales of electronic gaming machine games and lottery
39 facility games authorized by the Kansas expanded lottery act shall be
40 exempt from sales taxes imposed pursuant to K.S.A. 12-187 et seq. and
41 79-3601 et seq., and amendments thereto.

42 New Sec. 19. Each lottery gaming facility manager shall hold the ex-
43 ecutive director, the commission and the state harmless from and defend

1 any and all claims which may be asserted against the executive director,
2 the commission and the state, or the agents or employees thereof, arising
3 from the operation of electronic gaming machines, lottery facility games
4 or other lottery-type games pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act.
5 This section may be satisfied by procurement of insurance as a lottery
6 gaming facility expense of the lottery gaming facility naming the executive
7 director, the commission and the state as additional insured parties. The
8 provisions of this section shall not apply to any claims arising from a
9 negligent act or omission or willful or malicious misconduct of the execu-
10 tive director, the commission or the state, or the agents or employees
11 thereof.

12 New Sec. 20. As a condition precedent to contracting for the privilege
13 of being a lottery gaming facility manager, such manager shall file with
14 the secretary of state of this state a written and irrevocable consent that
15 any action or garnishment proceeding may be commenced against such
16 manager in the proper court of any county in this state by the service of
17 process on a resident agent, and stipulating and agreeing that such service
18 shall be valid and binding as if service had been made upon such manager.
19 Such written consent shall state that the courts of this state have juris-
20 diction over the person of the lottery gaming facility manager and are the
21 proper and convenient forum for such action and shall waive the right to
22 request a change of jurisdiction or venue to a court outside this state and
23 that all actions arising under this act and commenced by such manager
24 shall be brought in this state's courts as the proper and convenient forum.
25 Such consent shall be executed by the lottery gaming facility manager
26 and, if a corporation, by the president and secretary of such corporate
27 manager. Such consent shall be accompanied by a certified copy of the
28 order or resolution of the board of directors, trustees or managers au-
29 thORIZING the president and secretary to execute the same.

30 New Sec. 21. The Kansas expanded lottery act, lottery gaming facility
31 managers and management contracts under the Kansas expanded lottery
32 act shall not be subject to the provisions of and restrictions on major
33 procurement contracts, including, but not limited to, the provisions of
34 K.S.A. 74-8705, and amendments thereto.

35 New Sec. 22. The sale or service by lottery gaming facility managers
36 or ancillary lottery gaming facility operations and the consumption by
37 patrons of lottery gaming facilities of alcohol, liquor, wine, spirits, cereal
38 malt beverages and other intoxicating liquors is hereby permitted upon
39 and in lottery gaming facilities and ancillary lottery gaming facility oper-
40 ations. The provisions of K.S.A. 41-719, and amendments thereto, relating
41 to alcoholic liquor shall not be applicable to lottery gaming facilities and
42 ancillary lottery gaming facility operations.

43 New Sec. 23. As used in the Kansas expanded lottery act, unless the

1 context otherwise requires:

2 (a) “Accelerated video lottery net payment” means the advanced pay-
3 ment to the state treasurer of a portion of the state’s future share of net
4 video lottery terminal income pursuant to the final management contract
5 between the executive director and a video lottery parimutuel sales agent
6 for the operation of video lottery terminals at a parimutuel licensee
7 location.

8 (b) “Central video lottery terminal computer system” means the central
9 computer system, which monitors the operations of all video lottery ter-
10 minals, approved by the Kansas lottery and which is provided by the
11 central video lottery terminal computer system provider in accordance
12 with this act.

13 (c) “Central video lottery terminal computer system provider” means
14 a person with whom the executive director has contracted for the purpose
15 of providing and maintaining a central video lottery terminal computer
16 system and the related management facilities with respect to operating
17 and servicing the video lottery terminals.

18 (d) “Net video lottery terminal income” means all cash or other con-
19 sideration utilized to play a video lottery terminal, less all cash or other
20 consideration paid out to winning players as prizes.

21 (e) “Organization licensee” has the meaning provided by K.S.A. 74-
22 8802, and amendments thereto.

23 (f) “Progressive video lottery game” means any game whose jackpot
24 grows and accumulates as it is being played on a video lottery terminal
25 and whose outcome is randomly determined by the play of video lottery
26 terminals linked to the central video lottery terminal computer system.

27 (g) “Video lottery” means any lottery conducted with a video lottery
28 terminal or, with respect to a progressive game, a network of linked video
29 lottery terminals.

30 (h) “Video lottery game” means any electronically simulated game of
31 chance, including but not limited to video poker, keno, line-up, or black-
32 jack, displayed and played on a video lottery terminal.

33 (i) “Video lottery parimutuel sales agent” means a parimutuel licensee
34 specifically certified by the Kansas lottery to become a certified video
35 lottery parimutuel sales agent and offer video lottery terminals for play
36 at the parimutuel licensee location.

37 (j) “Video lottery terminal” means any electronic, electromechanical,
38 video or computerized device, contrivance or machine authorized by the
39 Kansas lottery which, upon insertion of cash, tokens, electronic cards or
40 any consideration, is available to play, operate or simulate the play of a
41 game authorized by the Kansas lottery pursuant to the Kansas gaming
42 act, including, but not limited to, bingo, poker, blackjack, keno and slot
43 machines, and which may deliver or entitle the player operating the ma-

1 chine to receive cash, tokens, merchandise or credits that may be re-
2 deemed for cash. Video lottery terminals may use bill validators and may
3 be single-position reel-type, single or multi-game video and single-posi-
4 tion multi-game video electronic games, including, but not limited to,
5 poker, blackjack and slot machines. Video lottery terminals shall be linked
6 directly to a central computer at a location determined by the executive
7 director for purposes of security, monitoring and auditing.

8 (k) "Video lottery terminal associated equipment" means any propri-
9 etary device, machine or part used in the manufacture, operation or main-
10 tenance of a video lottery terminal.

11 (l) "Video lottery terminal management contract" means an agreement
12 between the Kansas lottery and a video lottery parimutuel sales agent
13 which governs the placement and operation of video lottery terminals,
14 including allocation and payment of expenses, management fee and net
15 lease, recovery of any accelerated video lottery net payment and the
16 state's share of net video terminal income which shall not be less than
17 40% of net video lottery terminal income. A video lottery terminal man-
18 agement contract shall not constitute property, nor shall it be subject to
19 attachment, garnishment or execution, nor shall it be alienable or trans-
20 ferable, except upon approval by the executive director, nor shall it be
21 subject to being encumbered or hypothecated. No interest in the man-
22 agement contract shall descend by the laws of testate or intestate devo-
23 lution, but any interest shall cease and expire upon the death of the video
24 lottery parimutuel sales agent or all interest holders in such agent, except
25 that executors, administrators or representatives of the estate of any de-
26 ceased video lottery parimutuel sales agent and the trustee of any insol-
27 vent or bankrupt video lottery parimutuel sales agent may continue to
28 operate pursuant to the management contract under order of the approp-
29 riate court for no longer than one year after the death, bankruptcy or
30 insolvency of such video lottery parimutuel sales agent.

31 (m) "Video lottery terminal manufacturer" means any individual, firm,
32 corporation or other legal entity certified by the Kansas lottery to assem-
33 ble or produce video lottery terminals or video lottery terminal associated
34 equipment for sale or use in this state.

35 (n) "Voucher" means a bearer instrument in the form of a printed ticket
36 or facsimile issued by a video lottery terminal to a player that represents
37 the existing credit balance accumulated by a player of the video lottery
38 terminal. A voucher is a secure document that carries a unique identifier
39 in the form of a serial number and bar code issued by the central video
40 lottery terminal computer system.

41 New Sec. 24. (a) The Kansas lottery shall implement a video lottery
42 program whereby the Kansas lottery places video lottery terminals at par-
43 imutuel licensee locations.

1 (b) The Kansas lottery shall not place video lottery terminals at any
2 parimutuel licensee location unless the commission has adopted rules and
3 regulations as provided in sections 23 through 46, and amendments
4 thereto.

5 (c) The Kansas lottery shall not place video lottery terminals at pari-
6 mutuel licensee locations in a county unless the question of the placement
7 of video lottery terminals in such county has been submitted to and ap-
8 proved by the voters of such county as provided in section 25, and amend-
9 ments thereto.

10 New Sec. 25. (a) Before the Kansas lottery places any video lottery
11 terminals in a county, the qualified voters of the county must approve the
12 placement of video lottery terminals in the county as provided by this
13 section.

14 (b) (1) The board of county commissioners of any county may submit
15 by resolution, and shall submit upon presentation of a petition filed in
16 accordance with this section, to the qualified voters of the county a prop-
17 osition to permit the placement of video lottery terminals in the county
18 pursuant to this subsection. The proposition shall be submitted to the
19 voters either at a special election called by the board of county commis-
20 sioners for that purpose and held not less than 90 days after the resolution
21 is adopted or the petition is filed or at the next general election, as shall
22 be specified by the board of county commissioners or as specified in the
23 petition, as the case may be.

24 (2) A petition to submit a proposition pursuant to this subsection shall
25 be filed with the county election officer. The petition shall be signed by
26 qualified voters of the county equal in number to not less than 10% of
27 the voters of the county who voted for the office of secretary of state at
28 the last preceding general election at which such office was elected. The
29 following shall appear on the petition: "We request an election to deter-
30 mine whether the Kansas Lottery shall be authorized to place video lot-
31 tery terminals in _____ county."

32 (3) Upon the adoption of a resolution or the submission of a valid
33 petition calling for an election pursuant to this section, the county election
34 officer shall cause the following proposition to be placed on the ballot at
35 the election called for that purpose: "Shall the Kansas Lottery be au-
36 thorized to place video lottery terminals in _____ county?"

37 (4) If a majority of the votes cast and counted at such election is in
38 favor of approving the placement of video lottery terminals in the county,
39 the executive director may enter into video lottery terminal management
40 contracts for placement of video lottery terminals in the county as pro-
41 vided by this act. If a majority of the votes cast and counted at an election
42 under this section is against placement of video lottery terminals in the
43 county, the executive director shall not enter into video lottery terminal

1 management contracts for placement of video lottery terminals in the
2 county. The county election officer shall transmit a copy of the certifi-
3 cation of the results of the election to the executive director.

4 (5) The election provided for by this section shall be conducted, and
5 the votes counted and canvassed, in the manner provided by law for
6 question submitted elections of the county.

7 (c) The lottery commission may place video lottery terminals in a
8 county where the commission finds that after March 1, 2005, the county
9 has held an election of qualified voters pursuant to the county's home
10 rule authority if the commission determines that the ballot question was
11 in substantial compliance with the requirements of subsection (b)(3) and
12 the election was administered by the county election officer in a manner
13 consistent with the requirements of state election law.

14 (d) The question of the placement of video lottery terminals in a county
15 may be submitted at the same election as the question of operation of
16 lottery gaming facilities in the county under section 5, and amendments
17 thereto.

18 New Sec. 26. (a) In accordance with rules and regulations adopted by
19 the commission, the executive director shall have general responsibility
20 for the implementation and administration of the provisions of this act
21 relating to video lottery, including, without limitation, the responsibility
22 to:

23 (1) Establish a statewide video lottery terminal network in accordance
24 with the provisions of this act;

25 (2) review and determine promptly and in reasonable order all certifi-
26 cate applications or proceedings for suspension or revocation of
27 certificates;

28 (3) perform all duties required of the executive director under the
29 provisions of this act relating to video lottery;

30 (4) collect all fees imposed pursuant to sections 23 through 46, and
31 amendments thereto;

32 (5) certify net video lottery terminal income by inspecting records,
33 conducting audits, having agents of the Kansas lottery on site or by any
34 other reasonable means;

35 (6) assist the commission in the promulgation of rules and regulations
36 concerning the operation of a statewide video lottery terminal network,
37 which rules and regulations shall include, without limitation, the
38 following:

39 (A) The denomination of all bills, coins, tokens or other media needed
40 to play video lottery terminals;

41 (B) payout from video lottery terminals, provided that such payouts
42 shall not be less than 87% of the amount wagered over the life of the
43 video lottery terminal;

1 (C) a certification requirement and enforcement procedure for officers,
2 directors, board members and key employees, specified by the executive
3 director, of video lottery parimutuel sales agents, which certification re-
4 quirement shall include compliance with such security, fitness and back-
5 ground standards as the executive director may deem necessary relating
6 to competence, honesty and integrity, such that a person's reputation,
7 habits and associations do not pose a threat to the public interest of the
8 state or to the reputation of or effective regulation and control of the
9 video lottery; it being specifically understood that any person convicted
10 of any felony, a crime involving gambling or a crime of moral turpitude
11 prior to applying for a certificate as such sales agent or at any time there-
12 after shall be deemed unfit. The Kansas lottery shall conduct the security,
13 fitness and background checks required pursuant to such rules and
14 regulations;

15 (D) a certification requirement and enforcement procedure for those
16 persons or entities, including video lottery terminal manufacturers and
17 the central video lottery terminal computer system providers, who pro-
18 pose to contract with a video lottery parimutuel sales agent or the state
19 for the provision of goods or services related to the video lottery, including
20 management services, which certification requirements shall include
21 compliance with such security, fitness and background standards of offi-
22 cers, directors, key employees specified by the executive director and
23 persons who own, directly or indirectly, 5% or more of such entity, as the
24 executive director may deem necessary relating to competence, honesty
25 and integrity, such that a person's reputation, habits and associations do
26 not pose a threat to the public interest of the state or to the reputation
27 of or effective regulation and control of the video lottery; it being specifi-
28 cally understood that any person convicted of any felony, a crime involv-
29 ing gambling or a crime of moral turpitude prior to applying for a certifi-
30 cate hereunder or at any time thereafter shall be deemed unfit. The
31 executive director may determine whether the certification standards of
32 another state are comprehensive, thorough, and provide similar adequate
33 safeguards and, if so, may in the executive director's discretion certify an
34 applicant already certified in such state without the necessity of a full
35 application and background check. The Kansas lottery shall conduct the
36 security, fitness and background checks required under this rule and
37 regulation;

38 (E) the number of video lottery terminals permitted in each parimutuel
39 licensee location, subject to the following: The total number of video
40 lottery terminals shall not exceed 2,000 at a parimutuel licensee location
41 in Wyandotte county; 1,500 at a parimutuel licensee location in Sedgwick
42 county; 1,500 at a parimutuel licensee location in Crawford county; and
43 an aggregate of 500 at parimutuel licensee locations in Greenwood and

1 Harper counties;

2 (F) standards for advertising, marketing and promotional materials
3 used by video lottery parimutuel sales agents;

4 (G) the registration, kind, type, number and location of video lottery
5 terminals at any parimutuel licensee location;

6 (H) the on-site security arrangements for the video lottery terminals;

7 (I) rules and regulations and procedures for the accounting and re-
8 porting of the payments required from video lottery parimutuel sales
9 agents under section 31, and amendments thereto, including the calcu-
10 lations required for such payments;

11 (J) requiring the reporting of information about any video lottery par-
12 imutuel sales agent, its employees, vendors and finances necessary or
13 desirable to ensure the security of the video lottery system. None of the
14 information disclosed pursuant to this subsection shall be subject to dis-
15 closure under the Kansas open records act; and

16 (K) the reporting and auditing of financial information of video lottery
17 parimutuel sales agents, including, but not limited to, the reporting of
18 profits or losses incurred by video lottery parimutuel sales agents and the
19 reporting of such other information as the executive director may require
20 to determine compliance with the Kansas expanded lottery act and the
21 rules and regulations adopted hereunder. None of the information dis-
22 closed pursuant to this subsection shall be subject to disclosure under the
23 Kansas open records act.

24 (b) In addition to any other powers granted pursuant to the Kansas
25 lottery act or the Kansas expanded lottery act, the executive director shall
26 have the power to:

27 (1) Examine, or cause to be examined by any agent or representative
28 designated by the executive director, any books, papers, records or mem-
29 oranda of any video lottery parimutuel sales agent, or of any business
30 involved in video lottery terminals or video lottery games authorized pur-
31 suant to the Kansas expanded lottery act, for the purpose of ascertaining
32 compliance with any provision of the Kansas lottery act or the Kansas
33 expanded lottery act, or any rules and regulations adopted thereunder;

34 (2) investigate alleged violations of the Kansas lottery act and alleged
35 violations of any rules and regulations, orders and final decisions of the
36 commission or the executive director;

37 (3) request a court to issue subpoenas to compel access to or for the
38 production of any books, papers, records or memoranda in the custody
39 or control of any video lottery parimutuel sales agent related to the man-
40 agement or operation of video lottery terminals, or to compel the ap-
41 pearance of any video lottery parimutuel sales agent for the purpose of
42 ascertaining compliance with the provisions of the Kansas lottery act and
43 the Kansas expanded lottery act, and rules and regulations adopted

1 thereunder;

2 (4) inspect and approve, prior to publication or distribution, all adver-
3 tising by a video lottery parimutuel sales agent which includes any ref-
4 erence to the Kansas lottery; and

5 (5) take any other action as may be reasonable or appropriate to enforce
6 the provisions of the Kansas expanded lottery act and any rules and reg-
7 ulations, orders and final decisions of the executive director or the
8 commission.

9 (c) Appropriate security measures shall be required in any and all areas
10 where video lottery terminals authorized pursuant to the Kansas ex-
11 panded lottery act are located or operated. The executive director shall
12 approve all such security measures.

13 (d) The executive director shall require an annual audit of the video
14 lottery terminal operations of each video lottery parimutuel sales agent.
15 Such audit shall be conducted by a licensed accounting firm approved by
16 the executive director. Such audit shall be conducted at the expense of
17 the lottery.

18 (e) None of the information disclosed pursuant to subsection (b) or (d)
19 shall be subject to disclosure under the Kansas open records act.

20 (f) The Kansas lottery shall operate the video lottery terminal network
21 through the central video lottery terminal computer system. The central
22 video lottery terminal computer system shall be capable of auditing the
23 operation, financial data and program information of the video lottery
24 terminal network. All equipment or devices required for operation of the
25 central video lottery terminal computer system shall be included in any
26 contract made for the purpose of providing or operating such system.

27 (g) The central video lottery terminal computer system shall be used
28 for the operation of the video lottery terminal network and shall incor-
29 porate electronic fund transfer procedures to facilitate the collection of
30 revenue, be capable of disabling any video lottery terminal from play, and
31 be capable of communicating with all video lottery terminals approved
32 by the Kansas lottery. The central video lottery terminal computer system
33 provider shall provide certified manufacturers with the protocol docu-
34 mentation and the audit information and controls necessary to enable the
35 manufacturers' video lottery terminals to communicate with the Kansas
36 lottery's central video lottery terminal computer system. The central video
37 lottery terminal computer system shall not limit participation to only one
38 manufacturer of video lottery terminals or video lottery terminal associ-
39 ated equipment.

40 (h) The executive director may remove from play and confiscate any
41 video lottery terminal or gray machine that does not comply with the
42 requirements of the Kansas expanded lottery act. Any video lottery ter-
43 minal that the executive director determines has been modified or the

1 design of which has been modified without the consent of the executive
2 director may be removed from play, confiscated by the executive director
3 and disposed of in any manner allowed by law.

4 (i) With regard to minutes and records of the commission:

5 (1) The Kansas lottery shall keep and maintain a list of all applicants
6 for certification under the Kansas expanded lottery act, together with a
7 record of all actions taken with respect to such applicants. A file and
8 record of the Kansas lottery's actions shall be open to public inspection
9 pursuant to the Kansas open records act, but the information regarding
10 any applicant whose certificate has been denied, revoked or not renewed
11 shall be removed from such list five years after the date certification was
12 denied, revoked or not renewed.

13 (2) All information and data required by the Kansas lottery to be fur-
14 nished to it, or which may otherwise be obtained, relative to the finances,
15 earnings or revenue, except the net video lottery terminal income, of any
16 vendor shall be considered confidential and shall not be revealed in whole
17 or in part without permission of the vendor, except in the course of the
18 necessary administration of the Kansas expanded lottery act, or upon the
19 lawful order of a court of competent jurisdiction, or with the approval of
20 the attorney general, to a duly authorized law enforcement agency.

21 (3) All information and data pertaining to an applicant's criminal rec-
22 ord, family and background furnished to or obtained by the Kansas lottery
23 from any source shall be considered confidential and shall not be revealed,
24 in whole or part. Such information shall be released upon the lawful order
25 of a court of competent jurisdiction or, with the approval of the attorney
26 general, to a duly authorized law enforcement agency.

27 (4) Notice of the contents of any information released, except to a duly
28 authorized law enforcement agency pursuant to this subsection (i), shall
29 be given to any applicant, certificate holder or vendor in a manner pre-
30 scribed by the rules and regulations adopted by the commission.

31 New Sec. 27. (a) The executive director may issue, suspend, revoke
32 and renew certificates for video lottery terminal manufacturers, video
33 lottery terminals or video lottery parimutuel sales agents pursuant to rules
34 and regulations adopted by the commission.

35 (b) Any individual, firm, corporation or other legal entity seeking to
36 obtain a certificate pursuant to rules and regulations adopted by the com-
37 mission shall apply to the executive director for such certificate on forms
38 provided by the executive director.

39 (c) The executive director shall notify an applicant who is found, for
40 any reason, to be unfit for certification, of the specific reasons therefor
41 which constitute the basis for the finding.

42 (d) No certificate issued pursuant to this section shall be assignable or
43 transferable.

- 1 (e) The executive director may examine any or all accounts, bank ac-
2 counts, financial statements and records of the vendor in a vendor's pos-
3 session or under its control in which it has an interest and the vendor
4 must authorize all third parties, including parents, subsidiaries or related
5 entities, in possession or control of the accounts or records of the vendor
6 to allow examination of any or all of those accounts or records by the
7 executive director.
- 8 (f) A certificate shall be revoked upon a finding that the certificate
9 holder, or an officer, director or board member thereof:
- 10 (1) Has knowingly provided false or misleading material information to
11 the Kansas lottery or its employees; or
- 12 (2) has been convicted of a felony, gambling related offense or any
13 crime of moral turpitude.
- 14 (g) A certificate may be suspended, revoked or not renewed for any of
15 the following causes:
- 16 (1) Failure to notify the Kansas lottery about a material change in own-
17 ership of the certificate holder, or any change in the directors, officers or
18 board members thereof;
- 19 (2) a delinquency in remitting money owed to the Kansas lottery;
- 20 (3) any violation of any provision of any contract between the Kansas
21 lottery and the certificate holder; or
- 22 (4) any violation of any provision of the Kansas expanded lottery act or
23 any rule and regulation adopted by the commission.
- 24 New Sec. 28. (a) Every certified video lottery terminal manufacturer
25 shall submit a training program for the service and maintenance of such
26 video lottery terminals and associated equipment for approval by the Kan-
27 sas lottery. The training program shall include an outline of the training
28 curriculum, a list of instructors and their qualifications, a copy of the
29 instructional materials and the dates, times and location of training clas-
30 ses. No service and maintenance program shall be held until approved by
31 the Kansas lottery.
- 32 (b) Every service employee shall complete the requirements of the
33 manufacturer's training program before such employee performs service,
34 maintenance and repairs on video lottery terminals or video lottery ter-
35 minal associated equipment. Upon the successful completion by a service
36 employee of the training program required by this section, the Kansas
37 lottery shall issue a certificate authorizing such employee to service, main-
38 tain and repair video lottery terminals and video lottery terminal associ-
39 ated equipment. No certificate of completion shall be issued to any serv-
40 ice employee until the Kansas lottery has ascertained that such employee
41 has completed the required training program. Any person certified as a
42 service employee under this section shall pass a background investigation
43 under the rules and regulations of the commission. The Kansas lottery

1 may revoke certification upon finding a service employee in violation of
2 any provision of the Kansas expanded lottery act or a commission rule
3 and regulation.

4 New Sec. 29. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b):

5 (1) No video lottery terminals shall be operated at a parimutuel licensee
6 location in Sedgwick county unless, during the first full calendar year and
7 each year thereafter in which video lottery terminals are operated at such
8 location, the parimutuel licensee conducts at such location at least 100
9 live greyhound races each calendar week for the number of weeks raced
10 during calendar year 2003 with at least 13 live races conducted each day
11 for not less than five days per week.

12 (2) No video lottery terminals shall be operated at a parimutuel licensee
13 location in Wyandotte county unless, during the first full calendar year
14 and each year thereafter in which video lottery terminals are operated at
15 such location, the parimutuel licensee conducts live horse racing pro-
16 grams for at least 60 days, with at least 10 live races conducted each
17 program, and must offer and make a reasonable effort to conduct a min-
18 imum number of three live races restricted for quarter horses each day
19 and seven live thoroughbred races each day, of which not less than two
20 races each day shall be limited to registered Kansas-bred horses appor-
21 tioned in the same ratio that live races are offered, except that the licensee
22 shall not be required to conduct the second live race restricted to Kansas-
23 bred horses unless there are at least seven qualified entries for such race,
24 and with at least 100 live greyhound races each calendar week for at least
25 the same number of weeks raced during 2003, with at least 13 live races
26 conducted each day for not less than five days per week.

27 (3) No video lottery terminals shall be operated at a parimutuel licensee
28 location in Crawford county unless, during the first full calendar year and
29 each year thereafter in which video lottery terminals are operated at such
30 location, the parimutuel licensee conducts at such location at least 85 live
31 greyhound races each calendar week for the number of weeks raced dur-
32 ing calendar year 2003 in Sedgwick county with at least 12 live races
33 conducted each day for not less than five days per week.

34 (4) If a parimutuel licensee has not held live races pursuant to a sched-
35 ule approved by the Kansas racing and gaming commission in the pre-
36 ceding 12 months, the Kansas racing and gaming commission shall hold
37 a hearing to determine the number of days of live racing required for the
38 remaining days of the first calendar year of operation to qualify for op-
39 eration of video lottery terminals. At such hearing, the commission shall
40 receive testimony and evidence from affected breed groups, the licensee
41 and others, as the Kansas racing and gaming commission deems appro-
42 priate concerning the schedule of live race days. The operation of video
43 lottery terminals shall not commence more than 90 days prior to the start

1 of live racing at such facility.

2 (5) No video lottery terminals shall be operated at a parimutuel licensee
3 location in Greenwood county at Eureka Downs unless, during the first
4 full calendar year and each year thereafter in which video lottery terminals
5 are operated, the parimutuel licensee conducts at least 20 days of live
6 horse racing.

7 (6) No video lottery terminals shall be operated at a parimutuel licensee
8 location in Harper county at Anthony Downs unless, during the first full
9 calendar year and each year thereafter in which video lottery terminals
10 are operated, the parimutuel licensee conducts at least 20 days of live
11 horse racing.

12 (7) The Greenwood County Fair Association and Anthony Fair Asso-
13 ciation shall qualify as fair associations pursuant to the provisions of this
14 section and shall be required to comply with all provisions of K.S.A. 74-
15 8814, and amendments thereto.

16 (b) The Kansas racing and gaming commission may not grant excep-
17 tions to the requirements of subsection (a) for a parimutuel licensee con-
18 ducting live racing unless such exception is in the form of an agreement
19 which: (1) Is between the parimutuel licensee and the affected recognized
20 greyhound or recognized horsemen's group, as defined in K.S.A. 74-8802,
21 and amendments thereto; (2) has been approved by the appropriate of-
22 ficial breed registering agencies; and (3) has been submitted to and ap-
23 proved by the commission. In the case of emergencies, weather related
24 issues or immediate circumstances beyond the control of the licensee,
25 the Kansas racing and gaming commission may grant an exception.

26 (c) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsections (a) and (b) of K.S.A.
27 74-8836, and amendments thereto, the Kansas racing and gaming com-
28 mission shall authorize simulcasting on any day the operation of video
29 lottery terminals is authorized at the race track facility at Eureka Downs
30 and the race track facility at Anthony Downs. Rules and regulations of
31 the Kansas racing and gaming commission shall provide that the video
32 lottery terminals shall not be operated at Eureka Downs or Anthony
33 Downs on days when simulcasting signals are not available at the track.

34 New Sec. 30. (a) Video lottery terminals shall not be offered for use or
35 play in this state unless approved by the Kansas lottery. Video lottery
36 terminals may only offer video lottery games authorized by the Kansas
37 lottery.

38 (b) Video lottery terminals approved for use or play in this state shall:

39 (1) Be incapable of manipulation to effect the random probability of
40 winning plays;

41 (2) have one or more mechanisms that accept coins, tokens or other
42 media approved by the Kansas lottery in exchange for game credits and
43 a voucher evidencing said credits, or if approved by the Kansas lottery be

1 capable of paying cash directly to the player, and such mechanisms shall
2 be designed to prevent players from obtaining credits or cash by means
3 of physical tampering;

4 (3) be capable of suspending play as a result of physical tampering until
5 reset at the direction of the executive director or the executive director's
6 designee;

7 (4) be linked directly to a central lottery communications system to
8 provide auditing and other program information as approved by the Kan-
9 sas lottery and specified in the video lottery terminal management con-
10 tract; and

11 (5) be on-line and in constant communication with a central computer
12 located at a location determined by the executive director pursuant to the
13 video lottery terminal management contract.

14 New Sec. 31. (a) Net video lottery terminal income shall be distributed
15 as follows:

16 (1) To the video lottery parimutuel sales agent, an amount equal to
17 22% of net video lottery terminal income as a management fee and net
18 lease for facilities used for the operation of video lottery terminals at the
19 parimutuel licensee location;

20 (2) 7% of net video lottery terminal income shall be credited to the
21 live horse racing purse supplement fund established by section 36, and
22 amendments thereto;

23 (3) 7% of net video lottery terminal income shall be credited to the
24 live greyhound racing purse supplement fund established by section 36,
25 and amendments thereto;

26 (4) 1.5% of net video lottery terminal income shall be remitted to the
27 city, if any, and 1.5% of net video lottery terminal income shall be re-
28 mitted to the county where the parimutuel licensee location is located,
29 except that 3% of net video lottery terminal income shall be remitted to
30 such county if the parimutuel licensee location is not located in a city;

31 (5) 1% of net video lottery terminal income shall be credited to the
32 problem gambling grant fund established by K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 79-4805,
33 and amendments thereto;

34 (6) amounts determined pursuant to the video lottery terminal man-
35 agement contract for direct expenses of the Kansas lottery attributable to
36 implementation, administration and enforcement of the provisions of sec-
37 tions 23 through 46, and amendments thereto, and implementation, over-
38 sight and monitoring of video lottery pursuant to the provisions of such
39 sections shall be credited to the video lottery oversight fund established
40 by section 35, and amendments thereto;

41 (7) for a parimutuel licensee location other than a parimutuel licensee
42 location in Crawford county, an amount determined by an agreement
43 which is entered into by the video lottery parimutuel sales agent and the

1 organization licensee at the parimutuel licensee location and which has
2 been approved by the executive director;

3 (8) for a parimutuel licensee location located in Crawford county, 2%
4 of net video lottery terminal income shall be paid to the organization
5 licensee at the parimutuel licensee location; and

6 (9) not less than 40% of net video lottery terminal income shall be
7 credited to the Kansas education opportunity trust fund.

8 (b) A video lottery terminal management contract shall establish an
9 accelerated video lottery net payment of \$15,000 per video lottery ter-
10 minal installed at a parimutuel licensee location. Such payment shall be
11 due and payable upon execution of the management contract. The ac-
12 celerated video lottery net payment shall be recovered by the video lottery
13 parimutuel sales agent pursuant to the terms of the video lottery terminal
14 management contract.

15 (c) A video lottery management contract may include provisions for a
16 parimutuel licensee or any other entity to pay the parimutuel licensee's
17 expenses related to video lottery terminals, as the executive director
18 deems appropriate, subject to the requirements of subsection (a)(9).

19 New Sec. 32. The Kansas lottery commission, upon the recommen-
20 dation of the executive director, shall adopt rules and regulations neces-
21 sary to carry out the purposes of this act. Temporary rules and regulations
22 may be adopted by the commission without being subject to the provi-
23 sions and requirements of K.S.A. 77-415 through 77-438, and amend-
24 ments thereto, but shall be subject to approval by the attorney general as
25 to legality and shall be filed with the secretary of state and published in
26 the Kansas register.

27 New Sec. 33. (a) All video lottery terminals shall be leased or owned
28 by the Kansas lottery or by an authorized video lottery parimutuel sales
29 agent on behalf of the Kansas lottery pursuant to the terms of a video
30 lottery terminal management contract and shall be obtained from video
31 lottery terminal manufacturers certified pursuant to the Kansas expanded
32 lottery act and the rules and regulations adopted by the commission.

33 (b) The executive director shall contract with an independent labora-
34 tory to test video lottery terminals and associated equipment on a periodic
35 basis to ensure that the terminals and equipment comply with the require-
36 ments of the Kansas expanded lottery act and any other applicable stan-
37 dards and rules and regulations. The video lottery terminal manufacturer
38 providing such terminals and equipment shall pay all costs associated with
39 such testing.

40 (c) Each video lottery parimutuel sales agent shall hold the executive
41 director, the commission, and this state harmless from and defend and
42 pay for the defense of any and all claims which may be asserted against
43 the executive director, the commission, the state or the employees

1 thereof, arising from the participation in the video lottery system; specif-
2 ically excluding, however, any claims arising from the negligence or willful
3 misconduct of the executive director, the commission, the state or the
4 employees thereof.

5 (d) Each video lottery parimutuel sales agent shall provide access to all
6 records of the video lottery parimutuel sales agent and the physical prem-
7 ises of the locations where the video lottery activities are conducted for
8 the purpose of monitoring and inspecting the activities of the video lottery
9 parimutuel sales agent and video lottery games, video lottery terminals
10 and associated equipment.

11 New Sec. 34. (a) There is hereby established in the state treasury the
12 video lottery revenues fund. Separate accounts shall be maintained in
13 such fund for receipt of moneys from each video lottery parimutuel sales
14 agent. All expenditures from the fund shall be made in accordance with
15 appropriation acts upon warrants of the director of accounts and reports
16 issued pursuant to vouchers approved by the executive director for the
17 purposes set forth in this act.

18 (b) All net video lottery terminal income shall be paid daily and elec-
19 tronically to the executive director. The executive director shall remit all
20 moneys received therefrom to the state treasurer in accordance with
21 K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments thereto. Upon receipt of the remit-
22 tance, the state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in the state
23 treasury and credit it to the respective account maintained for the video
24 lottery parimutuel sales agent in the video lottery revenues fund.

25 (c) The executive director shall certify weekly to the director of ac-
26 counts and reports the percentages or amounts to be transferred from
27 each account maintained in the video lottery revenues fund to the video
28 lottery oversight fund, the live horse racing purse supplement fund, the
29 live greyhound racing purse supplement fund and the problem gambling
30 grant fund, as provided by section 31, and amendments thereto. Upon
31 receipt of the certification, the director of accounts and reports shall
32 transfer amounts from each such account in accordance with the certifi-
33 cation of the executive director. Once each week, the executive director
34 shall cause amounts from each such account to be paid to cities, counties
35 and video lottery parimutuel sales agents in accordance with section 31,
36 and amendments thereto.

37 (d) Amounts remaining in the video lottery revenues fund after trans-
38 fers and payments pursuant to subsection (c) shall be transferred to the
39 Kansas education opportunity trust fund established pursuant to section
40 37, and amendments thereto.

41 New Sec. 35. (a) There is hereby created in the state treasury the video
42 lottery oversight fund.

43 (b) Moneys in the video lottery oversight fund shall be expended to

1 pay for the expenses of the Kansas lottery attributable to implementation,
2 administration and enforcement of the provisions of sections 23 through
3 46, and amendments thereto, and implementation, oversight and moni-
4 toring of operations of video lottery parimutuel sales agents pursuant to
5 such sections.

6 (c) On or before the 10th of each month, the director of accounts and
7 reports shall transfer from the state general fund to the video lottery
8 oversight fund interest earnings based on:

9 (1) The average daily balance of moneys in the video lottery oversight
10 fund for the preceding month; and

11 (2) the net earnings rate for the pooled money investment portfolio for
12 the preceding month.

13 (d) All expenditures from the video lottery oversight fund shall be made
14 in accordance with appropriation acts upon warrants of the director of
15 accounts and reports issued pursuant to vouchers approved by the exec-
16 utive director for the purposes set forth in the Kansas expanded lottery
17 act.

18 New Sec. 36. (a) (1) There is hereby established in the state treasury
19 the live horse racing purse supplement fund.

20 (2) Twenty-five percent of all moneys credited to the live horse racing
21 purse supplement fund shall be transferred to the Kansas horse breeding
22 development fund created pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8829, and amendments
23 thereto. Two percent of the moneys credited to the live horse racing purse
24 supplement fund shall be distributed to the official registering agency
25 designated pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8830, and amendments thereto, to be
26 used for horse registration, administration, development, representation
27 and promotion of the Kansas horse racing and breeding industries. A
28 complete financial accounting for the use of the funds received pursuant
29 to this subsection shall be provided annually to the Kansas racing and
30 gaming commission. Fifty percent of the moneys credited to the Kansas
31 horse breeding development fund pursuant to this section shall be used
32 as purse supplements for registered Kansas-bred foals and distributed
33 based upon recommendation from the official horse breed registering
34 agency and approval of the Kansas racing and gaming commission. The
35 balance of funds credited to the Kansas horse breeding development fund
36 pursuant to this section shall be used as breed awards for registered Kan-
37 sas-bred broodmares and stallions. The Kansas racing and gaming com-
38 mission shall distribute such moneys credited to the Kansas horse breed-
39 ing development fund in accordance with K.S.A. 74-8829, and
40 amendments thereto.

41 (3) Based on the contribution to the Kansas horse racing and breeding
42 industries in Kansas, the balance in the live horse race purse supplement
43 fund shall be distributed in accordance with rules and regulations adopted

1 by the Kansas racing and gaming commission with recommendations by
2 the official registering agency designated pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8830, and
3 amendments thereto.

4 (b) There is hereby established in the state treasury the live greyhound
5 racing purse supplement fund. Moneys available in such fund shall be
6 paid to the parimutuel licensees for distribution as purse supplements in
7 accordance with rules and regulations of the Kansas racing and gaming
8 commission. Such rules and regulations shall provide that 25% of the total
9 amount credited to such fund shall be transferred to the credit of the
10 Kansas greyhound breeding development fund, created pursuant to
11 K.S.A. 74-8831, and amendments thereto. Funds transferred into the
12 Kansas greyhound breeding development fund pursuant to this section
13 shall be used to supplement special stake races and enhance the amount
14 per point paid to the owners of Kansas-whelped greyhounds which win
15 live races at Kansas greyhound tracks in accordance with Kansas racing
16 and gaming commission rules and regulations. Upon the recommendation
17 of the official greyhound breed registry, the Kansas racing and gaming
18 commission may transfer funds from the Kansas greyhound breeding de-
19 velopment fund to the live greyhound racing purse supplement fund.

20 (c) All purse supplements paid pursuant to this act shall be according
21 to the point schedule in effect on January 1, 2003, at the respective par-
22 imutuel licensee locations. All purse supplements paid pursuant to this
23 section shall be in addition to purses and supplements paid under K.S.A.
24 74-8801 et seq., and amendments thereto.

25 New Sec. 37. (a) There is hereby established in the state treasury the
26 Kansas education opportunity trust fund. Amounts deposited in such fund
27 shall be expended solely for the purpose of supplementing the state's
28 obligation to fund preschool, kindergarten, elementary, secondary and
29 postsecondary education programs. Expenditures from the Kansas edu-
30 cation opportunity trust fund shall be made pursuant to appropriations
31 acts.

32 (b) Such funding shall be supplemental to, and not in lieu of, any state
33 revenues appropriated during the 2005 regular legislative session to fund
34 educational programs for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006.

35 (c) Unless the payment or transfer has been authorized pursuant to a
36 separate appropriations act which has been approved by a majority vote
37 of the members of the house of representatives and a majority vote of
38 the members of the senate, the state treasurer shall not make transfers
39 or payments pursuant to an appropriation for any purpose other than
40 supplementing the funding of education programs as described in sub-
41 section (a). Such payment or transfer shall be made only upon certifica-
42 tion of the governor that such payment meets the requirements of this
43 section.

1 New Sec. 38. (a) Wagers shall be received only from a person at the
2 location where the video lottery game is authorized pursuant to the Kan-
3 sas expanded lottery act. No person present at such location shall place
4 or attempt to place a wager on behalf of another person who is not present
5 at such location.

6 (b) No employee or contractor of a video lottery parimutuel sales agent
7 shall loan money to or otherwise extend credit to patrons of the pari-
8 mutuel licensee.

9 (c) Violation of this section is a class A nonperson misdemeanor upon
10 a conviction for a first offense. Violation of this section is a severity level
11 9, nonperson felony upon conviction for a second or subsequent offense.

12 New Sec. 39. (a) A person less than 21 years of age shall not be per-
13 mitted in an area where video lottery games are being conducted, except
14 for a person at least 18 years of age who is an employee of the video
15 lottery parimutuel sales agent. No employee under age 21 shall perform
16 any function involved in gaming by the patrons.

17 (b) No person under age 21 shall play or make a wager on a video
18 lottery game.

19 New Sec. 40. (a) Except as when authorized in accordance with sub-
20 section (c), it is unlawful for any video lottery parimutuel sales agent, or
21 any employee or agent thereof, to allow any person to play video lottery
22 games pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act, or share in winnings
23 of such person, knowing such person to be:

24 (1) Less than 21 years of age;

25 (2) the executive director, a member of the commission or an employee
26 of the Kansas lottery;

27 (3) an officer or employee of a vendor contracting with the Kansas
28 lottery to supply gaming equipment or tickets to the Kansas lottery for
29 use in the operation of any lottery conducted pursuant to the Kansas
30 expanded lottery act;

31 (4) a spouse, child, stepchild, brother, stepbrother, sister, stepsister,
32 parent or stepparent of a person described by subsection (a)(2) or (a)(3);
33 or

34 (5) a person who resides in the same household as any person described
35 by subsection (a)(2) or (a)(3).

36 (b) Violation of subsection (a) is a class A nonperson misdemeanor upon
37 conviction for a first offense. Violation of subsection (a) is a severity level
38 9, nonperson felony upon conviction for a second or subsequent offense.

39 (c) The executive director may authorize in writing any employee of
40 the Kansas lottery and any employee of a lottery vendor to play a video
41 lottery game to verify the proper operation thereof with respect to se-
42 curity and contract compliance. Any prize awarded as a result of such
43 ticket purchase shall become the property of the Kansas lottery and be

1 added to the prize pools of subsequent video lottery games. No money
2 or merchandise shall be awarded to any employee playing a video lottery
3 game pursuant to this subsection.

4 New Sec. 41. Except for persons acting in accordance with rules and
5 regulations of the Kansas lottery in performing installation, maintenance
6 and repair services, any person who, with the intent to manipulate the
7 outcome, pay out or operation of a video lottery game, manipulates by
8 physical, electrical or mechanical means the outcome, pay out or operation
9 of such game shall be guilty of a severity level 8, nonperson felony.

10 New Sec. 42. (a) It is a class A nonperson misdemeanor for the executive
11 director, any member of the lottery commission or any employee
12 of the Kansas lottery to place a wager on or bet or play a video lottery
13 game while in Kansas.

14 (b) It is a severity level 8, nonperson felony for any person playing or
15 using any electronic gaming machine or video lottery terminal in Kansas
16 knowingly to:

17 (1) Use other than a lawful coin or legal tender of the United States of
18 America, or to use coin not of the same denomination as the coin intended
19 to be used in an electronic gaming machine or video lottery terminal,
20 except that in the playing of any electronic gaming machine, video lottery
21 terminal or similar gaming device, it shall be lawful for any person to use
22 gaming billets, tokens or similar objects therein which are approved by
23 the Kansas lottery;

24 (2) possess or use, while on premises where video lottery games are
25 authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act, any cheating or
26 thieving device, including, but not limited to, tools, wires, drills, coins
27 attached to strings or wires or electronic or magnetic devices to facilitate
28 removing from any electronic gaming machine or video lottery terminal
29 any money or contents thereof, except that a duly authorized agent or
30 employee of the Kansas lottery or video lottery parimutuel sales agent
31 may possess and use any of the foregoing only in furtherance of the agent's
32 or employee's employment at the parimutuel licensee location; or

33 (3) possess or use while on the premises of any video lottery parimutuel
34 sales agent any key or device designed for the purpose of or suitable for
35 opening or entering any video lottery terminal or similar gaming device
36 or drop box, except that a duly authorized agent or employee of the
37 Kansas lottery or video lottery parimutuel sales agent may possess and
38 use any of the foregoing only in furtherance of the agent's or employee's
39 employment at the parimutuel licensee location.

40 New Sec. 43. It shall be a severity level 9, nonperson felony for any
41 individual, firm, corporation or other legal entity to place in operation or
42 continue to have in place any gray machine for use by members of the
43 public at any location in this state.

1 New Sec. 44. Each person subject to a background check pursuant to
2 the Kansas expanded lottery act shall be subject to a state and national
3 criminal history records check which conforms to applicable federal stan-
4 dards for the purpose of verifying the identity of the applicant and
5 whether the person has been convicted of any crime that would disqualify
6 the person from engaging in activities pursuant to this act. The executive
7 director is authorized to use the information obtained from the national
8 criminal history record check to determine the person's eligibility to en-
9 gage in such activities.

10 New Sec. 45. (a) No taxes, fees, charges, transfers or distributions,
11 other than those provided for in the Kansas expanded lottery act, shall be
12 made or levied by any city, county or other municipality from or against
13 net video lottery revenue.

14 (b) All sales of games on video lottery terminals authorized by the
15 Kansas expanded lottery act shall be exempt from sales taxes imposed
16 pursuant to K.S.A. 12-187 et seq., and 79-3601 et seq., and amendments
17 thereto.

18 New Sec. 46. Pursuant to section 2 of the federal act entitled "An Act
19 to Prohibit Transportation of Gambling Devices in Interstate and Foreign
20 Commerce," 15 U.S.C. 1171 through 1777, the state of Kansas, acting by
21 and through the duly elected and qualified members of the legislature,
22 does hereby in this section, and in accordance with and in compliance
23 with the provisions of section 2 of such federal act, declare and proclaims
24 that it is exempt from the provision of section 2 of such federal act to the
25 extent that such gambling devices as described therein are being trans-
26 ported to or from the Kansas lottery or to or from a lottery gaming facility
27 managed or a video lottery sales agent at a location within the state of
28 Kansas where such gambling devices are authorized pursuant to the Kan-
29 sas expanded lottery act.

30 Sec. 47. K.S.A. 74-8705 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-8705.

31 (a) Major procurement contracts shall be awarded in accordance with
32 K.S.A. 75-3738 through 75-3744, and amendments thereto, or subsection

33 (b), as determined by the *executive* director, except that:

34 (1) The contract or contracts for the initial lease of facilities for the
35 Kansas lottery shall be awarded upon the evaluation and approval of the
36 *executive* director, the secretary of administration and the director of ar-
37 chitectural services;

38 (2) The commission shall designate certain major procurement con-
39 tracts or portions thereof to be awarded, in accordance with rules and
40 regulations of the commission, solely to minority business enterprises.

41 (b) The *executive* director may award any major procurement contract
42 by use of a procurement negotiating committee. Such committee shall
43 be composed of: (1) The executive director or a Kansas lottery employee

1 designated by the executive director; (2) the chairperson of the commis-
2 sion or a commission member designated by the chairperson; and (3) the
3 director of the division of purchases or an employee of such division
4 designated by the director. Prior to negotiating a major procurement con-
5 tract, the committee shall solicit bids or proposals thereon. The division
6 of purchases shall provide staff support for the committee's solicitations.
7 Upon receipt of bids or proposals, the committee may negotiate with one
8 or more of the persons submitting such bids or proposals and select from
9 among such persons the person to whom the contract is awarded. Such
10 procurements shall be open and competitive and shall consider relevant
11 factors, including security, competence, experience, timely performance
12 and maximization of net revenues to the state. If a procurement negoti-
13 ating committee is utilized, the provisions of K.S.A. 75-3738 through 75-
14 3744, and amendments thereto, shall not apply. Meetings conducted by
15 the procurement negotiating committee shall be exempt from the pro-
16 visions of the Kansas open meeting act, K.S.A. 75-4317 through 75-4320a,
17 and amendments thereto.

18 (c) Before a major procurement contract is awarded, the executive
19 director shall conduct a background investigation of: (1) The vendor to
20 whom the contract is to be awarded; (2) all officers and directors of such
21 vendor; (3) all persons who own a 5% or more interest in such vendor;
