SENATE CHAMBER, TOPEKA, KANSAS Thursday, February 1, 2001—2:30 p.m.

The Senate was called to order by President Dave Kerr. The roll was called with thirty-eight senators present.

Senators Hensley and Praeger were excused.

President Kerr introduced as guest chaplain, Rev. Kasey Crosby, First United Methodist Church, Stafford, Kansas, who delivered the invocation:

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION No. 1608—

By Committee on Public Health and Welfare

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the Secretary of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment to review the effect of obesity in both adults and children on costly health complications such as diabetes, hypertension, heart disease and stroke, and health complications in children, and to report on current programs of the state designed to improve awareness of the problem of obesity and its treatment and to make recommendations to the Legislature for additions and improvements to the state programs prior to the convening of the 2002 session of the Legislature.

WHEREAS, The Kansas Department of Health and Environment maintains several multi-agency programs to improve the health of Kansans, young and old; and

WHEREAS, The Kansas Department of Health and Environment's Healthy Kansans 2000 1996 report recognized obesity among the known risk factors contributing to serious health consequences; and

WHEREAS, A casual relationship exists between obesity and a number of serious disorders, including hypertension, dyclipedemia, cardiovascular disease, diabetes (Type II), gallbladder disease, respiratory dysfunction, gout, and osteoarthritis; and

WHEREAS, Nearly seventy percent of diagnosed cases of cardiovascular diseases are related to obesity, and obesity more than doubles a person's chances of developing high blood pressure, and almost half of breast cancer cases are diagnosed among obese women, and forty-two percent of colon cancer cases are among obese individuals; and

WHEREAS, Obesity ranks second only to smoking as a preventable cause of death and results in some three hundred thousand deaths annually; and

WHEREAS, It is estimated that thirty-five percent of the adult population is obese and the prevalence of obesity grew a staggering thirty-four percent during the past ten years; and

WHEREAS, There is also great concern regarding what effect obesity in children may have on overall health in children, health care costs for children, and treatment to address the problem of obesity in children; and

WHEREAS, Insurance industry studies indicate that the total direct costs of obesity-related diseases in the United States is as much as \$45.8 billion; and

WHEREAS, There is a significant potential for a reduction in health care expenditures through obesity prevention efforts; and WHEREAS, There is an urgent need for state health care agencies and medical profes-

WHEREAS, There is an urgent need for state health care agencies and medical professionals to place obesity at the top of Kansas' health care agenda; and

WHEREAS, The National Institute of Health, the American Society for Bariatric Surgery, and the American Obesity Association recommend that patients who are morbidly obese receive responsible, affordable medical treatment for their obesity; and

WHEREAS, The recent breakthroughs in drug therapy can treat obesity successfully;

WHEREAS, A review by the Secretary of Health and Environment is critical to raise the awareness of the public and private sectors that obesity is a disease of epidemic proportions, that is treatable and that proper treatment will reduce health care costs and improve the quality of life for a large number of our citizens: Now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Kansas, the House of Representatives concurring therein: That we urge the Secretary of the Department of Health and Environment to review the effect of obesity in both adults and children on costly health complications such as diabetes, hypertension, heart disease and stroke, and health complications in children, and to report on current programs of the state designed to improve awareness of the problem of obesity and its treatment and to make recommendations to the Legislature for additions and improvements to the state programs prior to the convening of the 2002 session of the Legislature; and

Be it further resolved: That the Secretary of State be directed to send a copy of this resolution to the Secretary of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

INTRODUCTION OF HOUSE BILLS AND CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS

HB 2004, HB 2017, HB 2048, HB 2146, HB 2147, HB 2148 were thereupon introduced and read by title.

INTRODUCTION OF ORIGINAL MOTIONS AND SENATE RESOLUTIONS

Senator Wagle introduced the following Senate resolution, which was read:

SENATE RESOLUTION No. 1814—

A RESOLUTION in recognition of volunteer dentists in Kansas.

WHEREAS, The members of the Kansas Dental Association, through the Kansas Donated Dental Services Program, have been providing donated dental treatment to disabled and aged Kansans since its inception on July 1, 1997; and

WHEREAS, The Kansas Donated Dental Services Program has recently surpassed a landmark goal of supplying \$1 million in donated dental services through the generosity of dentists and dental laboratories throughout the state of Kansas; and

WHEREAS, Two hundred seventy volunteer dentists and 72 volunteer dental laboratories have generously donated treatment for seriously neglected dental problems for disabled and aged individuals throughout the state; and

WHEREAS, The strength, success, vitality and effectiveness of the state of Kansas and its communities depend in great measure upon concerned and devoted programs such as Kansas Donated Dental Services Program: Now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Kansas: That the Kansas Donated Dental Services Program and its volunteers be recognized and congratulated for providing more than \$1 million in dental care to the citizens of Kansas; and

Be it further resolved: That the Secretary of the Senate be directed to send enrolled copies of this resolution to the Kansas Dental Association and the Kansas Donated Dental Services Program, both at 5200 SW Huntoon, Topeka, Kansas 66604.

On emergency motion of Senator Wagle SR 1814 was adopted unanimously.

Senator Wagle introduced and welcomed Dr. Wayne Thompson, Shawnee, Kansas and Dr. Nevin Waters, Olathe, Kansas.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Committee on Assessment and Taxation recommends SB 68, SB 69, be passed.

Also **SB** 39 be amended on page 2, in line 8, before the period by inserting "in an amount or value of \$250 or more"; after line 39, by inserting the following:

"Sec. 2. K.S.A. 2000 Supp. 79-32,197a is hereby amended to read as follows: 79-32,197a. Any for-profit business firm or for-profit business entity not subject to Kansas income, privilege or premiums tax, hereinafter designated the assignor, may sell, assign, convey or otherwise transfer tax credits allowed and earned pursuant to K.S.A. 79-32,196, and amendments thereto. Such credits shall be deemed to be allowed and earned by any such business entity which is only disqualified therefrom by reason of not being subject to such Kansas taxes. The business firm acquiring earned credits, hereinafter designated the assignee, may use the amount of the acquired credits to offset up to 100% of its income, privilege or premiums tax liability for the taxable year in which such acquisition was made. Only the full credit amount for any one contribution may be transferred and such credit may be transferred one time. Unused credit amounts claimed by the assignee may be carried forward for up to five years, except that all such amounts shall be claimed within 10 years following the tax year in which the contribution was made. The assignor shall enter into a written agreement with the assignee establishing the terms and conditions of the agreement and shall perfect such transfer by notifying the director of community development of the department of commerce and housing in writing within 30 calendar days following the effective date of the transfer and shall provide any information as may be required by the director of community development of the department of commerce and housing to administer and carry out the provisions of this section. The amount received by the assignor of such tax credit shall be taxable as income of the assignor, and the excess of the value of such credit over the amount paid by the assignee for such credit shall be taxable as income of the assignee.";

By renumbering existing sections accordingly;

Also, on page 2, in line 42, by striking "is" and inserting "and 79-32,197a are"

In the title, in line 10, before "and" by inserting "and 79-32,197a"; in line 11, by striking "section" and inserting "sections"; and the bill be passed as amended.

Committee on Education recommends SB 6, SB 7 be passed.

Also **SB** 5 be passed and, because the committee is of the opinion that the bill is of a noncontroversial nature, be placed on the consent calendar.

Committee on **Financial Institutions and Insurance** recommends **SB 130** be passed. Committee on **Natural Resources** recommends **SB 87** be passed.
