#### FIFTEENTH DAY

HALL OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, TOPEKA, KS, Monday, February 4, 2008, 11:00 a.m.

The House met pursuant to adjournment with Speaker Neufeld in the chair.

The roll was called with 118 members present.

Rep. Johnson was excused on verified illness.

Reps. Colyer, Dillmore, Garcia, Hodge, Huebert and Peterson were excused on excused absence by the Speaker.

Prayer by Chaplain Brubaker:

There being no objection, the following remarks of Rep. King are spread upon the journal:

Thank you Mr. Speaker. Today, I have the honor of recognizing an historic event for Independence and Kansas athletics by honoring not one, not two, but three 2007 state championship teams from Independence High School. We have 62 state champions from the Independence soccer and the boys and girls tennis teams in the gallery.

The Independence High School Tennis Teams have been a study in excellence for many decades. With me today, we have girls' coach Jean Lundt, boys' coach Ken Brown, and the assistant coach for both teams, Gina McLenon. Through their efforts, and the hard work of their student - athletes, Independence tennis has reached unprecedented heights with back-to-back boys and girls state titles. These accomplishments include a boys doubles team that ended the season an amazing 33-0, two girls doubles teams who played each other for 3rd and 4th in the state, and the boys and girls state runners-up in singles.

It's also fitting that we honor the Independence soccer team the day after one of the greatest Super Bowl upsets in history. The Independence soccer team, in only its 7th year of existence, played the role of Cinderella perfectly this fall, knocking off two-time defending state champion Kansas City Christian in the semifinals and winning an overtime thriller against perennial powerhouse Buhler to bring home the state crown. With me at the front of the House today are the coaches of the Independence boys' soccer team, Eric Hazlett and Nick McBride.

In short, you know that a school has accomplished much when its state champions from one year can barely fit in the House gallery. Please turn around and join me in giving a hearty congratulations to the state champion athletes from Independence High School.

#### FINAL ACTION ON BILLS AND CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS

**HB 2622**, An act relating to motor vehicles; concerning the display of license plates; amending K.S.A. 2007 Supp. 8-133 and repealing the existing section, was considered on final action.

### COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

On motion of Rep. Siegfreid, Committee of the Whole report, as follows, was adopted: Recommended that committee report to **SB 366** be adopted; also, on motion of Rep. Watkins be amended on page 1, by striking all in lines 17 through 43;

On page 2, by striking all in lines 1 through 38 and inserting the following:

"Section 1. K.S.A. 2007 Supp. 8-2110 is hereby amended to read as follows: 8-2110. (a) Failure to comply with a traffic citation means failure either to (1) appear before any district or municipal court in response to a traffic citation and pay in full any fine and court costs imposed or (2) otherwise comply with a traffic citation as provided in K.S.A. 8-2118, and amendments thereto. Failure to comply with a traffic citation is a misdemeanor, regardless of the disposition of the charge for which such citation was originally issued.

(b) In addition to penalties of law applicable under subsection (a), when a person fails to comply with a traffic citation, except for illegal parking, standing or stopping, the district or municipal court in which the person should have complied with the citation shall mail notice to the person that if the person does not appear in district or municipal court or pay all fines, court costs and any penalties within 30 days from the date of mailing notice, the division of vehicles will be notified to suspend the person's driving privileges. The district or municipal court may charge an additional fee of \$5 for mailing such notice. Upon the person's failure to comply within such 30 days of mailing notice, the district or municipal court shall electronically notify the division of vehicles. Upon receipt of a report of a failure to comply with a traffic citation under this subsection, pursuant to K.S.A. 8-255, and amendments thereto, the division of vehicles shall notify the violator and suspend the license of the violator until satisfactory evidence of compliance with the terms of the traffic citation has been furnished to the informing court. When the court determines the person has complied with the terms of the traffic citation, the court shall immediately electronically

notify the division of vehicles of such compliance. Upon receipt of notification of such compliance from the informing court, the division of vehicles shall terminate the suspension or suspension action.

- (c) Except as provided in subsection (d), when the district or municipal court notifies the division of vehicles of a failure to comply with a traffic citation pursuant to subsection (b), the court shall assess a reinstatement fee of \$50 for each charge on which the person failed to make satisfaction regardless of the disposition of the charge for which such citation was originally issued. Such reinstatement fee shall be in addition to any fine, district or municipal court costs and other penalties. The court shall remit all reinstatement fees to the state treasurer in accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments thereto. Upon receipt of each such remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in the state treasury and shall credit 50% of such moneys to the division of vehicles operating fund, 37.5% to the community alcoholism and intoxication programs fund created by K.S.A. 41-1126, and amendments thereto, and 12.5% to the juvenile detention facilities fund created by K.S.A. 79-4803, and amendments thereto.
- (d) The district court or municipal court shall waive the reinstatement fee provided for in subsection (c), if the failure to comply with a traffic citation was the result of such person enlisting in or being drafted into the armed services of the United States, being called into service as a member of a reserve component of the military service of the United States, or volunteering for such active duty, or being called into service as a member of the state of Kansas national guard, or volunteering for such active duty, and being absent from Kansas because of such military service. In any case of a failure to comply with a traffic citation which occurred on or after August 1, 1990, and prior to the effective date of this act, in which a person was assessed and paid a reinstatement fee and the person failed to comply with a traffic citation because the person was absent from Kansas because of any such military service, the reinstatement fee shall be reimbursed to such person upon application therefor. The state treasurer and the director of accounts and reports shall prescribe procedures for all such reimbursement payments and shall create appropriate accounts, make appropriate accounting entries and issue such appropriate vouchers and warrants as may be required to make such reimbursement payments.
- (e) The reinstatement fee established in this section shall be the only fee collected or moneys in the nature of a fee collected for such reinstatement. Such fee shall only be established by an act of the legislature and no other authority is established by law or otherwise to collect a fee."; and **SB 366** be passed as amended.

Upon unanimous consent, the House referred back to the regular order of business, Introduction of Bills and Concurrent Resolutions.
