SENATE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Minutes of the Meeting April 15, 1965

The meeting was called to order at 9:25 a.m., April 15, 1965, by Chairman Sanborn. All members were present.

The Committee met pursuant to a call by the Chairman to consider items for the omnibus appropriation bill to be introduced by the House Ways and Means Committee. Each section of the bill was considered in detail. (See the attached resume for description and purpose of each item.)

Several amendments were offered to the bill:

- 1. Upon motion of Senator Saar, seconded by Senator Warren, the Committee voted to include an appropriation item in the amount of \$650 from the general revenue funds to the Kansas Boys State, Inc.
- 2. Upon motion of Senator Arthur, seconded by Senator Bell, the \$100 item included for Margaret Gentry, secretary to the House state affairs committee, was deleted.

The meeting recessed at 11:20 a.m., and reconvened at 1:10 p.m.

Further amendments offered:

- 3. Senator Saar moved that the operating expenditures for the Capitol Area Planning Commission be increased to \$2,500 in section 29 of the proposed bill. Senator Liebert seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- 4. Upon motion of Senator Bell, seconded by Senator Van Sickle, the Committee voted to delete the appropriation for the Adult Education Coordinator.
- 5. After discussion, Senator Arthur moved that the Senate Committee concur with the House recommendations concerning the payment of extra compensation to members of the Revisor of Statutes for work in connection with the preparation of Kansas Statutes Annotated. Senator Liebert seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- 6. Mr. Bibb pointed out that the House had just passed Senate Bill 317 placing the Data Processing Expert as an unclassified position under the Director of Administration. It amended the bill to allow the expert and the Director to have final approval of data processing systems utilized in the State departments. However, it was moved by Senator Van Sickle that the omnibus bill be amended to line item appropriations for data processing equipment in the State Highway Commission as proposed in amendments to House Bill 1090, which were later deleted. Senator Woodard seconded the motion. Motion carried.

- 7. Senator Woodard moved that no additional funds be allotted to the Attorney General's budget to allow additional staff and operating funds for investigative duties in conjunction with private clubs, that the 1965 supplemental appropriation to the Alcoholic Beverage Control agency proposed in the omnibus bill be deleted, and an additional \$31,000 for fiscal year 1966 be allowed to the Alcoholic Beverage Control for investigative purposes. Senator Bell seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- 8. Senator Arthur moved that the President Pro Tem of the Senate be directed to order 500 business calling cards for each member of the Senate; each card to have imprinted the Senator's name and Senatorial District, his home address, and the seal of the State. Senator Woodard seconded the motion. Motion carried.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, it was adjourned at $3:30~\mathrm{p.m.}$

SENATE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE Subcommittee Report

STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY (Page 420)

Fiscal Year 1966

Mr. Chairman:

Your subcommittee assigned to the STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY has examined the budget and is submitting this report for committee consideration.

The Governor's recommended budget for FY 1965 includes \$5,575 for Old Shawnee Mission for two items: \$4,000 for tree work; \$1,575 to replace five gang-mowers. An amount of \$2,300 is also recommended for the Memorial Building to replace an air-conditioning tower which was installed in 1955 and has rusted out so badly that it is no longer serviceable.

The budget as recommended by the Governor for FY 1966 totals \$466,474. This budget includes the following proposal concerning the John Brown Park made by the City of Osawatomie to the State of Kansas:

- The State would deed or lease (99 years at \$1.00) to the City of Osawatomie all the land in John Brown Park except that land on which the museum rests.
- 2. The State would continue to operate and maintain the museum.
- 3. The State would sell to the City of Osawatomie for the consideration of \$1.00 all the equipment and facilities which it now owns for the operation and maintenance of the park facilities.
- 4. The City of Osawatomie would maintain and operate the park (except the museum) at no cost to the State, except as stated in section (5) and section (6).
- 5. The State would reimburse the City of Osawatomie for one-half of the initial cost of installing new street lights and resurfacing the streets in the park.
- 6. The City of Osawatomie would carry out and pay one-half of the costs described in item number (5) and stand itself all future costs.

By accepting this proposal, the annual cost of supporting the park would be reduced appreciably and better recreational facilities would be provided for park users.

The budget as recommended by the Governor for the Administration Activity for FY 1966 provides funds for the continuation of 30 existing positions and two new positions: Assistant Archaeologist (Executive II); Cataloger.

Your subcommittee recommends that the following items totaling \$8,768 be added to the Governor's recommended budget for FY 1966 for the Society: book purchases, \$1,000 (Administration); pickup truck, \$1,768 (Old Shawnee Mission); to finance a field crew for excavation work at Pike's Pawnee Indian Village, \$6,000.

Thus, a total budget of \$383,790 for FY 1965 (as recommended by the Governor) and \$475,242 for FY 1966 is recommended by the subcommittee for the State Historical Society.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE HEARING A. H. Cromb, Chairman Building Committee Board of Regents, State of Kansas February 19, 1965

Senator Smith, Chairmen Sanborn and Conard, members of the Committee on Ways and Means of the Senate and House. It is my job here this morning to give a quick review of the recommended building program for the next blennium as adopted by the Board of Regents and as recommended in the Governor's Budget. Fortunately, they are one and the same thing, since our recommendations have been accepted and are a part of the recommendations made by the Governor.

Perhaps. I should start with a short resume of how the Board of Regents formulates building requests. In the spring prior to each regular session of the legislature, the Board asks each school to re-examine its stated priorities of building needs. These priorities have been listed for many years back and are examined each year and re-stated each biennium. Then when the current priorities have been established, the Board compiles all requests into a document which is known as the long range building program. This listing is never formally adopted as a long range building program but it does serve as a check against the stated priorities from year to year, and also as a guide when the building committee gets to work on the job of recommending allocations from the Educational Building Fund. The Building Committee next starts a series of meetings with the administrators of the institutions to determine the actual need for the buildings which are listed as top priorities. Estimated costs are studied; the overall need of the institution in the areas of request is considered and of

just how much of the requests can be recommended. After many meetings and much consultation, the building committee recommends a two-year program to the entire Board. After the Board adoption of the program, it is then recommended to the Budget Division in the legislative requests to that division, the Governor, and the legislature. In most cases the requests of the Board are honored by these groups. This is the process through which the present requests for appropriations have gone. If there are questions as to the reasons for the particular sequence of requested appropriations, or as to the need for individual buildings, I would be happy to answer such questions.

I would like to point out to the members of the committees on Ways and Means that the Board of Regents is presently asking the legislature to amend the Educational Building Fund statute to include Wichita State University in the eligibility for the distribution of such funds. This will mean, naturally, that with one more campus to provide for, the dollars will not go quite as far. This comes at a time when our bulging enrollments are making demands on the building fund at a rate much greater than the incoming tax dollars can provide. There is some hope that re-assessment currently being done in the various counties will increase the revenue from the 3/4 mill levy. So far, there has been no appreciable gain in revenue from this process.

There is one reduction in our building requests which I feel needs discussion. The Board has requested an amount of \$660,000 from the General Revenue Fund to replace the out-dated power

plant and boilers at the School for the Deaf. The Board postponed this request two years ago when it was determined that the need for additional boilers at Kansas State Teachers College was critical. We now feel this need is critical at Olathe and would urge that funds be appropriated for this project. We would again point out that y the boilers at the School for the Deaf are approaching obsolescence and could fail. If complete failure occurred in bad weather, the officials at that institution would be faced with the proposition of caring for over 300 students with no stand-by heat. Since neither the School for the Deaf, nor the School for the Blind represent higher education, the Board has always had the feeling that buildings at these institutions should be financed from General Revenue Funds.

In the presentation of the Building Committee's requests at the Governor's Budget Hearing, it was pointed out that there is considerable lag between the time appropriations are made from the Educational Building Fund and the time that construction can begin. The Board again urges that this matter be considered seriously by the legislature and the state officials to determine whether some remedy could be applied. The lag occurs for several reasons. First, there is no opportunity to coordinate the building program accurately with the appropriations finally made by the Legislature. Generally, the appropriations have been made as requested by the Board, but this has not always been the case. Even when appropriations are made as requested, there is no real committment until the

legislature acts. If, when the Board makes its decisions on building needs in the spring of the year, it could be guaranteed that appropriations would follow as requested, the process of planning could be scheduled much better. It would be possible under this arrangement for firm planning to start much earlier and for bids to be taken at a much earlier date. Second, there is need for additional planning money which would be available at an earlier date so that the planning discussed just a moment ago will be financed. Quite often the planning money for a building must be taken from the building appropriation and this precludes that much planning could be done so that when the appropriation is available contracts could be let.

The Regents feel that this matter is important and would urge that the Legislature, and state officials involved, consider ways by which we could spead up the process of planning and reduce the time that funds lie idle waiting for construction to actually start.

Several years ago the Legislature provided an amendment to the statute governing the distribution of the Dormitory Fund which sped up the use of this money. Originally, the statute provided that the Regents had to make all allocations of this fund to the schools on the basis of enrollment. Under this plan the smaller schools had to go through several years of allocations before they could accumulate enough money to finance a new dormitory. The amendment removed the clause which required allocation on the basis of enrollment, and this meant that when an institution became eligible for a project the money could be allocated and used. We

got rid of the idle money and sped up the process of contraction. The Regents are still following the idea of allocating on the basis of enrollment, but they don't have to make the division on that basis at each allocation.

I feel that Kansas has done an excellent piace of work in providing EBF funds for our institutions of higher education.

I wouldn't go so far as to say this fund has provided all of the funds needed, but I would say that the Regents have been appreciative of this method of financing buildings and have also appreciated the other sources of building funds which the legislature has provided. I would also say that I feel the present Bears, as well as former boards, have been judicious in the recommendations for the use of these funds and that the campuses show an orderly plan of development as a result.

Your subcommittee recommends the total expenditures of \$2,322,661 as recommended in the <u>Governor's Budget Report</u>. In addition to these expenditures, the following amounts are recommended, which are in addition to the <u>Governor's Budget Report</u>:

Your subcommittee recommends the adoption of this report to provide an expenditure of \$2,383,886 for fiscal year 1966 and the request for the study.

Dear Senators:

I am extremely interested in the Barber County State Lake problem. Barber County is a part of the Thirty-Fifth Senatorial District which I serve.

I am extremely anxious that there be appropriated an amount of \$35,000 for the purpose of pumping water from Elm Creek over into the Barber County State Lake, a distance of approximately three-quarters of a mile. This \$35,000, to be a part of the dedicated funds of the Forestry, Fish and Game Department.

The Barber County State Lake was built at an initial cost of approximately \$150,000. It comprises approximately 77 acres and is adjacent to the city of Medicine Lodge, County Seat of Barber County, Its population is approximately 3500 people. It is, therefore, adjacent to the population center of that area and can serve many people. I respectfully point out to you that there is no state lake in adjoining Harper and Commanche Counties. The people of these south central Kansas counties must use this lake for their outdoor recreation.

The people of Barber County, through their civic leaders, are urging this appropriation. Mr. George Moore, Director of the Fish and Game Department, has approved this item of expenditure. I certainly concur in these people's request and ask that you give this matter the best consideration possible.
