Joint Committee on Legislative Services and Facilities

June 29, 1971

The Joint Committee on Legislative Services and Facilities met Tuesday, June 29, 1971, at 10:00 a.m. in Room 535 of the Statehouse. The meeting was called to order by Representative Carl Ossmann, chairman. Members present were Representatives Moline and Kay and Senators Harder and Smith. Staff present were Mr. William Bachman, Secretary; Mr. Fred Carman, Assistant Revisor of Statutes; Mr. Richard Ryan, Assistant Director, Legislative Research Department. Guests of the committee were Representative Loux; Mr. William Hale, State Architect; Mr. Bob Hougland, Mr. Frank Applegate, and Mr. Ed Marcotte of the State Architect's office; and Mr. Howard Brooks of R.C.A., GRAPHICS Division.

Actions Taken by Legislative Coordinating Council June 28

Mr. Bachman discussed several matters of interest to the Joint Committee which were taken up by the Legislative Coordinating Council at its meeting on June 28. The Coordinating Council confirmed the statement on page 5 of the General Operating Procedures Manual concerning compensation to conferees including legislators for committee hearings. The Council has asked its staff to re-draft the manual to conform with the new statutes and rules and have the re-draft presented to the Council at a future meeting. He stated that the Coordinating Council has authorized the Chief Clerk of the House, the Secretary of the Senate, and the Secretary of the Joint Committee on Legislative Services and Facilities to attend the National

Legislative Conference in Wisconsin August 17-20. He also said the Coordinating Council had made a determination as to numbers of legislators but not the names who will go to the various in-service training seminars during the interim.

Preparation of Minutes for Interim Committees

Mr. Bachman explained that prior to the creation of the Coordinating Council it was the policy of the Legislative Services office to furnish a secretary to take minutes at each standing committee meeting during the interim. Now under H.B. 1084 the Research Department will prepare the minutes for these committees. The Coordinating Council determined at their meeting June 28 that the Research Department would in fact prepare the minutes and only in a very few instances would a secretary be required to take minutes. Mr. Bachman stated that the policy does not apply to this committee. He stated that secretaries are paid three dollars an hour, not to exceed eighteen dollars a day when they are called in for interim work. Senator Smith said that the Research personnel had been preparing the minutes in most cases and that in only five or six cases had the chairmen been using their own secretaries. Representative Loux said that the main reason for this change was so the minutes could be kept up to the high standard of the minutes prepared by the Research Department and mentioned that the Research Department might think about conducting a training session for secretaries. Mr. Carman said that it is very difficult for an untrained person to take minutes of meetings in which the subject matter was unfamiliar to him, and that the Research staff's professional background is the major factor in why they turn out minutes like they do. He said recording equipment (cassettes) would be a great help but that the Revisor does not have any. Chairman Ossmann stated that there is equipment on the market that is relatively inexpensive and could do a good job of recording

meetings. Representative Loux said that because of a case last session over committee testimony of a lobbyist there perhaps was a need for some type of recording equipment in the committee rooms. Senator Harder and Representative Kay both were familiar with the Norelco brand of cassette recorder and said they do a good job and also have a play-back transcribing system. Mr. Carman said it would be a real help to the Revisor's office where the staff members frequently have several meetings to attend, even in the same day, where this equipment could be used to listen to the committee meetings where the staff were not able to be present. He also said that usually committee chairmen would know which meetings should definitely be recorded, such as hearings, controversial meetings, or ones that needed to be reviewed later, rather than try to record all meetings. Senator Smith moved that Mr. Bachman investigate different brands of recorders and their prices and report back to the committee on his proposed purchase of three to five recorders. Senator Harder seconded the motion, and the motion passed.

Regular Committee Meeting Date

Senator Smith proposed that the Joint Committee set a regular meeting date on the Tuesday following the regular Coordinating Council meeting date since it would be a good opportunity for close coordination between the two committees since the Joint Committee is an adjunct to the Council. The committee agreed, and Representative Kay moved that the Joint Committee on Legislative Services and Facilities set a regular date for their meetings on the Tuesday following the fourth Monday of each month and that the time of the meetings be set for 10:00 a.m. Senator Smith seconded the motion, and the motion passed.

Report by State Architect

Mr. Hale said his report was in the nature of a progress report

on the various projects of interest to the committee on the 3rd and 5th floors of the Statehouse. Mr. Hougland handed out sheets containing estimates of proposed projects and an accounting of funding and expenditures (62 account) for the Capitol building, copies attached. After discussion of these items, Mr. Hale told the committee briefly what work is being done on each of the new projects for the Statehouse. The basement snack bar will be similar to the one in the basement of the Shawnee County Courthouse. Services for the Blind will provide the equipment for the serving line. He said the original estimate for the project was much less than the actual cost because of the addition of new plumbing and flooring which was unforseen. Mr. Hale stated that it was his understanding that the plans for the two new elevators and smoke proof tower stairs were to be drawn up so that they could take bids on them during the coming session. On the subject of the fifth floor legislative committee room maintenance, he said they have approximately \$51,000 to spend, but will try to use state personnel as much as possible to get as much for their money as possible. He mentioned that they want to repatinate the dome and roofs of the east and west wings to match the dome since they are brown in color. He mentioned that this was bid upon two years ago and the bid of \$27,500 was turned down as too expensive, and he said he hoped they would have more competition for the bid this time and were estimating around \$30,000 for the job. told the committee that work on the Senate lounge is underway. said that the drawings for the document room are virtually complete and that they are proceeding with the graphics right now. Mr. Ossmann asked Mr. Hale if he would be able to get all the items accomplished that appear on the second page of the second handout sheet (5th and 3rd floor legislative room maintenance, Senate lounge, document room, legislative graphics, winter air conditioning, and dome and roof

patination) since he has only \$60,000 in the allowance for special maintenance funds and \$42,000 total funds for renovation. Mr. Hale said that hopefully everything there could be completed. Mr. Ossmann said the first priority was the fifth floor committee room maintenance, the Senate lounge and the document room. Mr. Hale stated that he could get started on the fitth floor work right away. Mr. Hougland said that they plan to use unit pricing on plastering and woodwork since it has been done effectively on other state jobs this way. Mr. Hale said they would take the renovation as far as they could on the fifth floor with unit pricing and use state personnel to do things not able to be done with unit pricing. Mr. Hale said the snack bar on the third floor has the winter air conditioning and a good exhaust system for next session. He said that on the fifth floor the quadrant offices were too cold, but this will be corrected by changing the venting of the attic. Mr. Hale said that he understood the will of the committee that they start on these projects immediately. He stated that the bulk of this could be done by September 1. He said he would work with Mr. Bachman to reserve the committee rooms for maintenance work and would try to schedule the work so the meetings would not be interrupted if at all possible.

Legislative Services Employees

Senator Smith said that H.B. 1084 which created the Coordinating Council had left the management of the Legislative Services and Facilities Committee with final responsibility for salaries to the council itself. The Coordinating Council determines the salaries of the Research Department, formerly done by the Legislative Council, and the Revisor of Statutes, formerly under the Supreme Court. The Coordinating Council had been studying the salaries and were trying to adjust them so they would be relatively comparable from the top position on down. Senator Smith recommended that Mr. Bachman,

Secretary to the Joint Committee, be given an increase in salary comparable to an Administrative Officer II. Senator Smith moved that Mr. Bachman's salary be raised to \$10,272.00 effective July 1 which is the Administrative Officer II classification, Range 24, Step A, and that Pat Theno and Helen Marshall receive a five percent increase effective July 1. Representative Kay seconded the motion, and the motion passed.

Report on Computer Demonstration in Denver

Representative Moline reported on his attendance at the computer demonstration held in Denver by Data Retrieval Corporation. Harder, Bill Bachman, Fred Carman and several people from the State Printing plant also attended the demonstration. He discussed the five components of the entire Data Retrieval system: (1) update-system that maintains a statute data base; (2) search-the research arm of the system; (3) alter--the bill drafting system which includes terminals with automatic typewriters which are used to type codes which produce desired changes; (4) type--automated techniques for printing of bills; and (5) locate--system for journal indexing. Mr. Moline said the limitations of this system are that the legislative research required could not be computerized, security was a problem because of people using the computer and erasing or destroying information. Earlier he said that advantages were time saved in researching specific subjects in statutes and in bill drafting and indexing. He said that Data Retrieval had said they had installed their equipment in Wisconsin, Colorado and four or five other states. Representative Moline said it was an interesting system, but he felt also that Kansas has a great number of priorities above it. He mentioned viewing the equipment in the office of Mr. Jim Wilson, chief of Colorado Bill Drafting Department, and a tour of the Colorado Legislature which gave him the impression that they are not long on facilities,

committee rooms, offices or storage and work space for individual legislators.

Mr. Carman handed out copies of bill drafts printed by the Data Retrieval system which included the coding the secretary had typed. (Copies attached.) He said that the state of Kansas already has a search system whereby they mail questions into the statute data base in Pennsylvania and receive answers back. He then turned the discussion over to Mr. Brooks of R.C.A. who told the committee that his company is involved with graphics, which is electronic typesetting that creates characters from images projected from a television tube onto film or photographic paper. By this method a statute book can be printed in a matter of hours instead of months as they are done now. Chairman Ossmann asked Mr. Books to appear at the next committee meeting to make a presentation of his company's system.

Representative Moline showed the committee several printed reports done by Data Retrieval. The committee was not impressed with the particular style of printing. Representative Moline said Colorado had an interesting way of printing reports—one side of the page had the regular bill draft with the other side containing an explanation of the legal terminology, and minority reports were also printed.

Mr. Carman said for this system to be practical, the transition phase will be very severe since new personnel would be needed to operate the automated equipment. This would rule out many of their older women employees who might not be able to take the intensity of the work. He said what may save a very substantial amount of money in printing causes problems—in order to print this way we must have one machine for use of the operator and one in reserve for possible break—downs, and the State Printer must have people skilled in use

of this type of equipment. He said the State Printer felt it would be a mistake to put this kind of equipment in a plant that might be moved because of the Capitol Area Plaza Project. Mr. Carman said there should be a withholding of any possible agreement until this matter was decided. Also the Printer would need about half of the printing in the state to make the purchase of the equipment pay for itself. There would be no saving to the state unless the printing was in quantity. All the other state agencies who use the printing plant would have to purchase the equipment and hire personnel to operate it in order to utilize the system properly. He mentioned the great saving for the printer would be in the type-setting and said that the re-keying would help his office greatly in printing amended copies of bills. The committee agreed that they would like to look into the matter again and had Mr. Moore's presentation placed on the agenda for the next meeting Tuesday, July 27.

Meeting adjourned.

February 6, 1969 — Introduced by COMMITTEE ON REMEDIAL LEGISLATION, by request of Department of Agriculture. Referred to Committee on Agriculture.

AN ACT to amend 94.38 (19) of the statutes, relating to the definition of "pure seed", "germination", "hard seed" and other terms used in labeling (suggested as remedial legislation by department of agriculture).

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This proposal was reviewed by the committee on remedial legislation and approved by the committee for introduction. In presenting the proposal to the committee, the department of agriculture gave the following explanation:

Wisconsin case law (Waukeen case) and Attorney General's opinion would seem to prohibit adoption in future of changes to official publications or other matter incorporated in Wisconsin Statutes by reference. Terminologies could best be defined by department rule. Rules could incorporate existing materials by reference and adopt future changes by amendment to the rules. Rules can be amended more readily than statutes and allow for changes in basic references.



The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:
