ROADS AND HIGHWAYS COMMITTEE MEETING - MARCH 6, 1972

The Roads and Highways Committee met in room 510 S at 2:45 P. M. on March 6, 1972. Chairman Dierdorff called the meeting to order and all members were present except Gray, Hayes and Ossmann.

Conferees were: On Senate Bill 539 - Senator William Dearth,

Jim Wallace, Al Laudon, Rev. Richard Taylor, Elton Lobban; Senate

Bill 638 - Senator Ted Saar; Senate Bill 679 - Don Pomeroy, Senate

Bills Nos. 735 and 709 - Harold Turntine; Senate Bill 686 - Fred Allen

and Harold Foley.

A roster of others who registered their attendance is attached.

SENATE BILL 539 - AN ACT relating to the operation of motor vehicles; prescribing the procedure for declaring a person an habitual violator of the laws relating thereto; prohibiting certain acts, and declaring any violation thereof to be a crime.

Senator Dearth told the committee he served on a committee studying no-fault insurance and at that time decided one way to lower the cost of insurance would be to get the habitual violator off the highways.

Of the 55,000 who lost lives last year on the highways, over 50% were caused by alcohol and 40% by speeding.

Six states have enacted this law and this one is patterned after Virginia. The primary concern is to save lives.

Jim Wallace spoke in favor of the bill and his statement is attached.

Al Laudon spoke in favor of the bill. He is with Ranger Insurance. Company and they write "hard-to-write" risk insurance. He feels that

the driver who has been arrested one time for DWI is the best risk.

Rev. Richard Taylor spoke in favor of the bill. He feels that if the driver is aware of this he will be more careful.

The question was asked of Mr. Lobban what he thinks of the bill.

He said if the bill is passed the Motor Vehicle Department will

administer it.

SENATE BILL 638 - AN ACT relating to federal aid to counties, cities and political subdivisions; amending KSA 1971 Supp. 68-402b and repealing the existing section.

Senator Saar said this bill was designed by Dick Peyton. It is localized to Crawford County. It would let them accumulate their secondary money.

Mr. Lady asked if this language was written by Mr. Peyton and if it was proposed by him.

Senator Saar said it was not.

SENATE BILL 679 - AN ACT relating to registration fees on certain vehicles; amending KSA 1971 Supp. 8-143, and repealing the existing section.

Don Pomeroy appeared in opposition to the bill. He said there were going to be a lot of unhappy constituents if they have to license little home-made utility trailers.

He suggested perhaps the trailers could be licensed on bill-of-sale and the fee should be \$3 instead of \$5.

SENATE BILL 735 - AN ACT concerning automobiles and other motor vheicles; providing-for-the-mandatory-revocation-of-operator1s-or

chauffeur's-licenses-in-certain-cases;-eliminating-the-minimum-period of-mandatory-revocation, declaring it unlawful to drive while license canceled, suspended or revoked; declaring it unlawful to drive while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drugs; providing for the revocation of the license of anyone so driving; providing for parole upon certain conditions; providing penalties; amending KSA 1971 Supp. 8-254,-8-256, 8-262 and 8-530 and repealing the existing sections.

Mr. Turntine said this will cause the department to go ahead and revoke the license and it will be a burden to the department. It would take additional help and it would cost the department an additional \$10,918.

SENATE BILL 709 - AN ACT relating to the motor vehicle safety responsibility act; amending KSA 8-725 and KSA 1971 Supp. 8-726, and repealing the existing sections.

Mr. Turntine said this bill would reduce their load 21% and they could shift personnel to other departments. This would save the department \$25,280.

Mr. Davis questioned taking "registered or certified" mail from page 2, line 7. He said this would be the only way to prove receipt of the mail.

SENATE BILL 686 - AN ACT relating to the construction and repair of bridges and culverts; authorizing the levy of taxes to pay the cost thereof; amending KSA 68-1126 and KSA 1971 Supp. 68-1103 and 68-1135 and repealing the existing sections.

Mr. Allen said this was one of the requests made in their platform

that was presented to the members of the legislature early in the session - eliminate the 20 years. Numerous counties are getting at the end of their twenty-year limitation and will have no authorization to use it. Many of the bridges will be found inadequate and the counties will need this act.

He said this does not take anything from under the tax lid.

Mr. Foley said at the present time they are operating under a one mill levy. They are only having available a fourth of the money they had two years ago. They cannot operate under federal statutes. Removing the twenty-year limitation was their idea

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 1138 - A HCR providing for a special committee to make a legislative study of the laws relating to the licensing of motor vehicle operators and chauffeurs, including an analysis of the administrative procedures relating thereto.

Mr. Ratner explained the resolution and said that this is a request from their Judges of Common Pleas.

Mr. Ratner made a motion, second by Dr. Hughes, that HCR 1138 be adopted. The motion carried.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 1132 - A HCR providing for a special committee to make a legislative study concerning the establishment of a state traffic safety and training center in the city of Wichita, Kansas.

Mr. Davis made a motion, second by Mr. Steffes, that HCR 1132 be amended by striking the word "state" on line 4. The motion carried.

Mr. Ratner made a motion, second by Mr. Allison, that HCR 1132 be adopted as amended. The motion carried.

Except as otherwise noted, the individual remarks recorded herein have not been transcribed verbatim and this record has not been approved by the committee or by the individuals making such remarks.

The chairman announced that action would be taken on the Senate bills at the meeting on Tuesday, March 7.

The meeting was adjourned.

Dangerous Drivers File Kayos Chronic Offenders

WASHINGTON — For nearly a decade the federal government has been assembling a blacklist of dangerous motorists to help state

motor vehicle agencies decide whether to issue or renew drivers' licenses.

The list,, maintained by the National Highway Administration contains the names of three million American motorists who have been denied licenses by state authorities or whose license have been revoked.

Nineteen states and the District of Columbia routinely submit all applications for new or renewed driving licenses for comparison with the master list of the nation's high risk motorists.

Twenty-two other states check only names of new applicants. And nine states check only what they deem to be suspected applicants.

Although participation is entirely voluntary, all 50 states now submit for inclusion on the list the names of all motorists whose licenses have been revoked or who have been denied renewal.

99 Million Requests

Since the file was started in 1961 some 99 million search requests have been submitted by state authorities. More than 871,000 of these searches turned up dangerous or irresponsible drivers

There is no record of how many of these were denied licenses on the basis of information contained in the master list. But the two Department of Transportation (DOT) agencies that administer the file claim it "has helped keep thousands of undesirable drivers off the road."

Names of motorists whose licenses have been suspended or revoked are added to the list at the rate or 3,000 a day.

In October a record average of 77,000 search requests per day were run through the 20 reels of computerized tape on which the names of the nation's known high risk drivers are stored.

Last Year's Results

Last year searches uncovered more than 160,000 motorists who had lost their licenses for various driving offenses and subsequently had applied for new ones.

Officials emphasized that DOT does not attempt to rule on whether the dangerous drivers on its list should be denied licenses.

"We turn the information over to the states within 24 hours of the search," a DOT spokesman said, "and it is up to the state agency to decide whether to issue or withhold a new license."

Until the master list was set up, state motor vehicle agencies had no way of knowing whether license applicants had lost thetir driving privileges in other states.

Hurts Reckless Drivers

Although effectiveness of the National Driver Register Service, DOT's formal name for the file, varies with the severity of each state's criteria for issuing licenses, there are indications that it may be taking a heavy toll of chronically dangerous drivers.

Alabama recently reported that it cancels about 70 licenses a month on the basis of information provided from DOT's master tapes. And Virginia estimates it acts against nearly 80 per cent of its applicants whose names are found on the tapes.

Names of motorists who have lost licenses for serious violations such as drunk driving or a traffic fatility remain in DOT's master file for seven years.

Those whose licenses have been revoked for less serious offenses are removed from the file after five years.

Under the law, a DOT spokesman noted, information contained on the driver register tapes may be made available only to state motor vehicle agencies and federal offices that issue auto driver permits.

Voluntary Compliance High

DOT also said there were no plans for making it mandatory for state agencies to act on information contained in its file of dangerous drivers.

"Voluntary compliance is growing at such a rate that we see no need for a low requiring it," one official said.


But other sources indicated another reason for maintaining the voluntary nature of the program.

Required compliance would, in effect, set up federal standards for automobile operators' permits — a politically explosive issue that is periodically advanced as a cure-all for upgrading the proficiency of American motorists.

"There are absolutely no such plans in the works," a DOT spokesman insisted.
