and mental health organizations. Committee discussion with him followed.

Joan Hamilton testified in opposition to the bill. She feels it is not necessary to redefine the sexual crimes in Kansas. She stated that if improvements were to be made in this area, it should be by making the mandatory sentence laws for crimes committed with firearms apply to rape and aggravated sodomy. She stated she feels that the penalty provisions of this bill are too severe. Committee discussion with her followed.

Judy Teusink testified in support of the bill. She stated the Women's Political Caucus has many concerns in this area. stated she would support the inclusion of sexual offenses in the mandatory sentencing provisions of the law.

Mitch Cooper testified in support of the bill. A copy of his statement is attached. Committee discussion with him followed.

Senator Hein moved that the minutes of February 7 be approved; Senator Hess seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

The meeting adjourned.

Dear Legislator:

I am here on behalf of the National Association of Social Workers, Kansas Chapter. Social workers provide a variety of services in this state, some of which are either directly or indirectly linked to the aid of distressed families who have suffered as a result of sexual crimes.

That the crimes themselves are damaging is indisputable, however, workers in the field report that the situation is generally further complicated by laws that do not adequately deal with sexual crimes. We feel that Senator Hess's Bill would be a positive step in clarifying this problem. It is important that information concerning the chastity of the assaulted woman be considered irrelevant and therefore, be deemed inadmissable as evidence in a court of law. We based our opinion on the idea that the trial should be founded in fact rather than relying on the morality of the complainant. Therefore, NASW would like to go on record as being in support of SB 308.
