The meeting was called to order by the Chairman.

Representative Sandy Duncan, sponsor of House Bill 2329, appeared to give testimony on the bill. House Bill 2329 would authorize a 100% tax credit for contributions to community facilities for the mentally retarded and to the United Cerebral Palsy Research Foundation of Kansas. He stated that the 100% figure could be adjusted downward but he felt that a 25% credit was too small but a 50% credit would be a good place to start. He did state that the bill could possibly be amended to include language that provides for mentally retarded or sheltered workshops that are non-profit.

Gary Cook, representing the Kansas Association of Rehabilitation Facilities appeared in support of House Bill 2329 and urged adoption of the legislation. (Attachment I)

Ethel May Miller, Kansas Association of Retarded Citizens appeared as a proponent of House Bill 2329 and stated that this bill will encourage private contributions for services for a broad range of disabilities offered through the community mental retardation facilities. (Attachment II)

Howard Hassler, Cottonwood, Inc., appeared to support House Bill 2329 and stated with just the increase in utilities for the operation of these homes, the management of such homes is having to research every possibility for additional funding. This legislation would provide an incentive for contributors to the various homes.

Bill Fansler, Kansas Association of Deaf, appeared in support of House Bill 2329, but stated that the legislation could possibly be amended to deal with other handicapped other than mental retardation or cerebral palsy. There are many other handicapping disabilities that are also in need of help and the incentives provided in this bill could be of benefit to them also.

Bill Edds, Department of Revenue, appeared for the Department and stated that their only concern relates to auditing and tracking of the contributions. He felt it could possibly be taken care of through regulations and requiring of a list of contributors from the recipients of such contributions and would not need additional legislation.

The meeting was adjourned.

- 1.0 Identity and purpose of Kansas Association of Rehabilitation Facilities (KARF)
 - 1.1 KARF is an association of thirty (30) member agencies throughout Kansas that serve approximately 4,900 disabled children 0-6 and adults, annually with a collective budget of approximately \$23 million.
 - 1.2 KARF agencies provide community-based programs and services, such as infant and early childhood development programs, vocational evaluation, work activity, work adjustment, sheltered employment, placement, projects with industry programs, and personal social development group living, supervised living and independent living programs.
- 2.0 Position statement on H.B. 2329
 - 2.1 KARF urges adoption of H.B. 2329 an act concerning the Kansas income tax act; authorizing tax credits for contributions to community facilities for the mentally retarded and to the United Cerebral Palsy Research Foundation.
- 3.0 Justification
 - 3.1 The Bill provides a partial solution to long-range funding needs of community programs.
 - 3.2 Ties private sector more closely to funding of programs in community.
 - 3.3 Assists programs to be more responsive to community interests, needs, and people served in the community.
 - 3.4 Believe that for the first three years of implementation there would be no significant impact on State revenue.
 - 3.5 There is question that such a tax credit would even have any significant impact on State revenue.

3.6 Provides alternative funding for community programs that are alternatives to institutional care and/or places of work, training that can lead to competitive employment.

It is my privilege to represent the Kansas Association for Retarded Citizens, an organization of around 5,000 parents and friends of persons who happen to be mentally retarded and who belong to the some 50 local associations located thruout the state. We appreciate having the opportunity to speak in behalf of those retarded persons who thru no fault of their own, or their families, cannot speak for themselves.

As we hope most of you are aware, our Association is interested in the welfare of all of our state's retar-This includes not only the 1,300 or so who ded citizens. are served by our state mental retardation institutions, but also those served thru public school special education, those in foster and other varieties of services, but especially in those some 3,500 served thru the 29 certified community mental retardation facilities, several of which were actually begun by the ARC's in the early 1960's.

It has always been the philosophy of the Kansas ARC since its beginnings that such needed services as now offered thru the community mental retardation facilities as early training and child development programs, plus adult services of work training and adjustment, adult life skills training, sheltered work opportunities, and community residential homes, should be available, in or near the home community.

Further, that in order for such services to be stable, both philosophically and financially, that they would need to be developed upon a sound fiscal base thru a <u>combination</u> of funds including local (both private and public), state and federal funds.

Thus we urge your support of the concept such as proposed thru H.B. 2329 as we believe such legislation would encourage both individual and corporate private contributions which would in time strengthen the local share of financial support for such services as offered thru the community mental retardation facilities. This in turn would help alleviate the loss of federal funds upon which most centers have become heavily dependent, altho we are in no way implying such potential contributions will lead to a full replacement of those decreasing federal funds.

While as a representative of the Association for Retarded, we indicate our support of the fiscal base of local, state, and federal funds supporting community mental retardation facilities, we call attention to the attached report of statistics of people served therein as submitted to the State Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services which indicates the other types of disabilities served in the 29 certified facilities, especially in the Day and Residential Divisions. (Most of those indicated in the Residential Division are also served in the Day Division.)
