Chairman Meacham announced that the committee would not take up $\underline{{\rm HB}\ 2421}$ this year.

Hearings were reopened on <u>HB 2442</u> in order to hear Senator James Pearson, Chairman of the Governor's Task Force on High Technology Industrial Development. Printed copies of the Senator's testimony in favor of the bill were presented to the committee. (Attachment 1)

Senator Pearson emphasized that the very heartbeat of technology development now is in research. He felt that the money with the matching funds and partnership concept envisioned by this bill would create a perception which is essential as Kansas competes with other states in this area. The Senator said that the bill seems to be appropriate in its mechanism and structure.

Staff distributed a summary on <u>HB 2259</u>, <u>HB 2311</u>, and <u>HB 2442</u>, along with copies of the amended balloon form of <u>HB 2311</u>. Attachments 2 and 3). Representative Chronister explained that when she had spoken of biotechnical, it had been used as a generic term; what she had intended was that it include biological and technical types of fields in order to give it as broad as possible an interpretation. She then suggested that the term "advanced technology institute" be amended to "Advanced Technology Commission" as indicated in the balloon form. This change would be made throughout the bill. Other amendments were on page 1, letter c; page 3, section 2, page 3, line 112; page 4, line 133; page 4, line 147.

A motion was made by Representative Chronister and seconded by Representative Cobb to adopt the amendments.

Other amendments made by the committee included:

On lines 119 and 123, strike "equipment".
On line 154, strike "equipment and".
On line 155, change "institute" to "commission".
On line 156, strike "and equipment".
Strike all of line 56, following "governor" and line 57 through the comma after "statute".
Strike all of line 51 following "regents,", all of line 52, and the word "development" on line 53 and conceptually insert "Speaker of the House's appointee and President of the Senate's appointee".

The committee asked the Revisor to restructure the sentence which begins on line 147 and say in effect, "for this purpose they shall match, not to exceed . . .".

Representative Chronister moved and Representative Cobb seconded that HB 2311 be passed as amended. The motion carried.

Representative Dean moved and Representative Chronister seconded to amend HB 2442 conceptually to appropriate \$1.5 million under this program to the Board of Regents to fund the Governor's proposal on high technology partnership grants.

The committee made the following additional amendments to the bill:

In section 4, lines 82 and 83, include "or an affiliated research corporation". On line 134, change "section 4" to "section 3".

A vote was taken on the motion and the motion carried.

Representative Friedeman moved the insertion of section (d) of an amendment submitted on March 2 by Bob Kelly which states:

"(d) "Postsecondary educational institution" means
(1) any state educational institution under the control
and supervision of the board of regents, (2) any community college established under the laws of this state,
(3) the municipal university established under the provisions of article 13a of chapter 13 of Kansas Statutes
Annotated, and (4) any accredited independent institution as defined in K.S.A. 72-6107 and amendments thereto."

The motion was seconded by Representative Adam. The motion carried.

Representative Branson moved that on line 49, "related biotechnical processes," be added following "biochemistry,". Representative Chronister seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Representative Dean moved to pass HB 2442 out favorably as amended. Representative Green seconded. The motion carried.

Representative Friedeman made a conceptual motion to amend HB 2293, in that the public television boards would be able to make grants to radio stations that have community licensees and that would not include those who have educational institutional licensees.

Representative Chronister seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Representative Rolfs moved that HB 2293 as amended be reported adversely. Representative Dean seconded the motion. The motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned by the chairman at 4:15 p.m.

Testimony of Senator James Pearson, Chairman Governor's Task Force on High Technology Development

CHAIRMAN MEACHAM AND MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATION, COMPUTERS AND TECHNOLOGY:

I am Senator James Pearson appearing before you in my capacity as Chairman of the Governor's Task Force on High Technology Industrial Development.

The Task Force is currently working to develop recommendations for a comprehensive strategy for high technology development in Kansas. While our work is not yet complete, we have reached a consensus of opinion that basic to all other components of a strategy and <u>critical</u> to high technology development is the quality and quantity of significant research in the several areas of advanced technology in our state institutions.

The workings of technological progress can best be understood in five related phases:

- 1. basic research
- 2. applied research
- 3. testing and refinement to determine commercial practicality
- 4. full-scale production, and
- 5. diffusion of the innovation throughout the economy by replication at other plants.

Clearly, without the basic and applied research components, the technological process is not developed.

There is much good research being done in Kansas, particularly in our three major state universities and the current state of its progress is not to be taken lightly. We have research programs of major significance in the areas of pharmaceutical chemistry, biological sciences, engineering, agricultural science and the aerospace areas.

However, a 1982 survey of 691 high technology firms by the Joint Economic Committee of Congress revealed that among these firms, the <u>perception</u> of the universities in our region (mountain & Plains) rated the lowest in the nation. At the same time, the nationally recognized Gourman Report ranks Kansas graduate institutions among the nation's best.

Our task is clear: to change the commonly held perception among high technology industries.

I urge you to pass House Bill 2442 which established the High Technology Research Partnership Program and to support the accompanying appropriation of \$1.5 million to fund this matching grant program.

This action will speak loudly and clearly to high technology industries across the nation that there is public support in Kansas of high technology development; that we are actively involved in efforts to develop an environment supportive of advanced technology development.

The point is not so much that the \$3 million will make a significant impact on our research capability; advanced technology research is tremendously costly as others before me have attested here and as you know from your visits to the universities. But the symbolic gesture you make in establishing and funding this program will be of significant value as a statement of public policy and as the basis for a high technology development strategy.

I urge your support of this research partnership program and of the trade-offs that are required to fund the program in these economic times. I am convinced of the value of this effort to the people of Kansas.


