Representative Kenneth Francisco, key sponsor of $\underline{\text{HB }2170}$, testified in support of the proposed legislation. He said the intent of the bill was to exempt citizens 65 years of age or older from paying the newly established annual camping fee at state parks. The fee was established by the Park and Resources Authority and effected July 1, 1982. He said the added cost of this \$2.00 per night overnight camping fee or \$25.00 annual camping fee, in addition to increases in other camping fees, might prevent some senior citizens from being able to utilize state parks (see attachment 1).

Charlie Millikin, a Kansas senior citizen, testified in support of $\underline{\text{HB 2170}}$. He said he thought the additional charge of an overnight camping fee would prevent many senior citizens from having the opportunity of using state park facilities.

Gary Petz, representing the Department on Aging, testified in support of $\underline{HB\ 2170}$. He noted that senior citizens hold 24% of the park vehicle permits in Kansas, and this additional camping fee might keep some of them from enjoying the recreational opportunities available at state parks.

Lynn Burris, director of the Park and Resources Authority, testified in opposition to HB 2170. He said the Authority had established a goal, that by 1985, 50% of their financing would come from revenues generated by park operations, making th Authority less dependent on the state's general funds. To achieve this goal, the Authority considered fee increases at the state parks and held five hearings across the state to discuss these proposed increases with Kansas citizens. At the hearings, the Authority received no negative responses to the fee increases. Mr. Burris said several citizens requested that in lieu of the \$2.00 per night overnight camping fee, the Authority establish an annual camping fee of \$25.00 so anyone desiring to camp more than 12 nights throughout the camping season could have the cost-saving benefit of an annual fee; the Authority adopted this suggestion. Mr. Burris noted that approximately 2500 annual camping permits had been sold during the past camping season.

A brief discussion period followed each presentation of testimony on $\underline{{\rm HB}\ 2170}$.

Representative Kathryn Sughrue, sponsor of \underline{HB} 2134, testified in support of the bill. She said passage of \underline{HB} 2134 would authorize the Kansas Fish and Game Commission to issue an annual institutional fishing license to facilities under the jurisdiction of the Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS) rather than issuing individual licenses. The fee for the institutional fishing license would be \$100 for 20 individuals fishing at any one time while on a group activity (see attachment 2).

Gerald Hannah, a representative of Mental Health and Retardation Services, SRS, testified in support of $\underline{\text{HB 2134}}$. He said fishing is very therapeutic and a popular activity for both young and old patients at state institutions under the jurisdiction of SRS. During the past summer, Mr. Hannah estimated that approximately 360 patients had enjoyed the therapy of fishing.

Kent Jackson, Fish and Game Commission, spoke to the committee in support of $\underline{\text{HB 2134}}$. He said the Commission felt the proposal was not only an investment in providing therapeutic benefits to institutionalized patients, since once the patients had been exposed to the sport of fishing, they might purchase an individual fishing license at some future date if the opportunity arose.

A brief discussion period followed each presentation of testimony on $\ensuremath{\mathtt{HB}}$ 2134.

There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting adjourned at 4:20~p.m.

The next meeting of the committee will be held February 10, 1983.

H.B. 2134 relates to Institutional fishing licenses for facilities under the jurisdiction of the Secretary of S.R.S.

Those of you who have served on energy last session will remember I introduced similar legislation, since then the bill has been researched and hopefully is a bill that meets the needs of those wishing the legislation introduced.

The bill authorizes the Kansas Fish & Game Comm. to issue an annual institutional fishing license to each facility that applies for the license. The fee shall be \$100 for 20 individuals fishing at any one time while on a group activity which is supervised by the facility.

Individuals fishing will be subject to all laws and regulations of the Kansas Fish & Game Commission.

Advantages of H.B. 2134

- 1. Offers an opportunity for therapeutic as well as recreation benefits for a possible 360 "in" patients.
- 2. For those who enjoy fishing, the potential for individuals purchasing their own license is increased.
- 3. Of the 18 centers the institutional license fees will be a help to the Fish & Game Commission since license revenue is the major funding for the Commission.
