Dear Sir:

I have noted that HB 2129 is set for hearing in your committee. As a member of the first Pension & Investments Committee established in the House of Representatives and as a member of the Ways and Means Committee which received all pension and retirement bills prior to the establishment of the Pension, Investments & Benefits Committee, I have a continuing interest in the pension and retirement benefits provided public employees in the state of Kansas.

While I am not familiar with the background that leads to the bill's introduction, I might share some observations regarding the KPERS program. The number one consideration has always been to provide a soundly funded program. It has been an overriding concern that all benefits which are promised to and earned by the public employees who are members of the system are backed by real dollars rather than a mere promise.

It has been my observation that if anything, the KPERS system has been funded on a conservative basis, which is better than the opposite. The KPERS actuary, the Martin E. Segal Company, has been largely responsible for these practices through their recommendations. I have found them not only knowledgeable and highly professional in the technical aspect of retirement programs but extremely helpful and candid in providing recommendations and raising issues regarding the direction of our retirement system. Their technical expertise and wide experience has been utilized in the past through their employment by both the legislative and executive branches. They have assisted with many projects regarding employee benefits and retirement, including both the design and funding.

It would seem to be a wrong approach to provide by statute that such an organization must be terminated. If there is some concern regarding the technical correctness of any of their work, there are other approaches that might prove more beneficial. The budgetary authorization for the KPERS system to employ an outside consultant to "spot check" the reasonableness of the assumptions recommended by the Segal firm and the correctness of the data and procedures used in their evaluations might be an

alternative which would be reassuring, objective and beneficial.

I would also like to take this opportunity to comment on the role of the legislature in the process of providing pension benefits. It is not, and should not be, our role to manage the retirement system. We have defined the level of coverage and benefits and given the board of trustees the tools to get the job done. Our interest should be the bottom line.
