The Chairman called the meeting to order at 1:40 p.m.

Chairman Bunten welcomed the members of the State and Local Government class from Shawnee Heights Senior High School, and their teacher, Mr. Darrell Profitt, to the meeting today.

The Chairman turned to consideration of final action of SB85.

Senate Bill No. 85 -- "An Act concerning certain institutions of postsecondary education; providing for certain payments from the local ad valorem tax reduction fund; amending K.S.A. 1982 Supp. 79-2959, as amended by 1983 Senate Bill No. 24, and 79-2961 and repealing the existing sections."

Chairman Bunten briefly reviewed the provisions of this bill for the benefit of the committee. Representative Miller moved that SB 85 be reported favorable for passage as amended. Seconded by Representative Myers. Motion carried.

Chairman Bunten turned to consideration of subcommittee reports.

House Bill 2140, Section 9, KANSAS DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT FY 84. Representative Louis reported on this section. The subcommittee concurs with the Governor's FY83 and FY84 recommendations with some adjustments. Considerable discussion was held regarding the authorization of federal planning funds in FY84 in the amount of \$108,000.00 to study the feasibility of state takeover of the administrative responsibilities of the federal block grant program. Several of the committee members expressed the opinion of leaving the decisions of how to utilize funds up to the discretion of the local community, inasmuch as they would best be able to determine how the funds should be used. Representative Arbuthnot made a motion that the paragraph on page 2 of the subcommittee report, beginning with "In Addition...", be striken from the subcommittee report. Seconded by Representative Louis. Representative Hamm the subcommittee report. Seconded by Representative Louis. Representative expressed opposition to this motion and indicated that he feels that it is the responsibility of the state to take on these programs. He added that the fact that there are 47 other states who have state control of these programs must be some indication that it works well. Following other committee discussion the motion carried.

Representative Miller moved that item 2 on page 1 be striken from the subcom-Representative Rolfs seconded. Motion lost. mittee report.

Representative Louis moved to adopt the subcommittee report as amended. Seconded by Representative Bussman. Motion carried. (Attachment II).

House Bill No. 2140 -- "An Act making and concerning appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1984, for the commission on civil rights, attorney general, attorney general -- Kansas bureau of investigation, capitol area plaza authority, Kansas public disclosure commission, governor's department, department of human resources, department of economic development, insurance department, Kansas arts commission, lieutenant governor, state board of tax appeals, secretary of state, Kansas soldiers' home, state treasurer, grant -- veterans of world war I, Kansas office of federal energy grants management, and office of the securities commissioner of Kansas; authorizing certain transfers and fees, imposing certain restrictions and limitations and directing or authorizing certain receipts and disbursements and acts incidental to the foregoing."

Representative Arbuthnot moved that HB 2140 be recommended favorable for passage as amended. Representative Farrar seconded. Motion carried.

House Bill No. 2085, Section 19, BOARD OF VETERINARY EXAMINERS FY83. Representative Farrar reported on this section. The subcommittee recommended expenditures less than the Governor's recommendation. Representative Farrar moved the adoption of the subcommittee report. Seconded by Representative Dyck. Motion carried. (Attachment III).

House Bill No. 2085, Section 19, BOARD OF VETERINARY EXAMINERS FY84.

Representative Farrar reported on this section. The subcommittee recommended expenditures less than the Governor's recommendation. Representative Farrar moved adoption of the subcommittee report. Seconded by Representative Dyck. Motion carried. (Attachment IV).

The Chairman announced that there will be no committee meeting tomorrow morning at 8:00 a.m.

House Subcommittee Recommendations

FY 1983. The Subcommittee concurs with the Governor's recommendation, except for the following:

- 1. Delete \$12,000 in state funding for travel costs based on historical data and expenditures to date.
- 2. Reduce the Kansas Industrial Training Program Account by \$25,000 of state funds with the savings reappropriated to the Industrial Development Division in FY 1984.

FY 1984. The Subcommittee concurs with the Governor's recommendation, except for the following:

- 1. Delete the 4.0 percent salary adjustment which includes \$47,056 in state funds.
- 2. Endorse Community Resource Act grants in the amount of \$20,000 with an additional \$19,600 for technical assistance to be financed from the State General Fund and placed in the KDED Administration Division.
- 3. Delete all State General Fund financing of \$44,389 from the Housing Division, thereby reducing the staff by 2.0 F.T.E. positions and substituting in lieu thereof a Univac terminal for CASK and KIPPS systems access at a cost of \$4,320 from the State General Fund. The latter amount is to be an addition to the Administration Division.
- 4. Delete \$12,900 in state funds for publication of the <u>Governor's Annual Socio-Economic Report</u> budgeted in the Industrial Development Division.

- 5. Reduce state subsidy payments to the Fort Scott and Liberal Tourist Information Centers by \$2,000, which will retain funding at the FY 1983 level of \$7,200, in the Travel and Tourism Division.
- 6. Establish an expenditure limitation of \$1,238,816 in place of the \$1,229,795 line item for Housing Assistance program federal fund.
- 7. Delete \$6,500 in state funds from printing and advertising of the Travel and Tourism Division with a further proviso that the expenditures for the printing of the KDED Report and the Ah... Kansas Newsletter be limited to \$10,000.
- 8. Delete the Research Analyst III position being transferred to the Industrial Development Division, resulting in a \$23,562 reduction of state funds.

In addition, the Subcommittee believes that the Legislature should address the question of whether the state should assume administrative responsibility for the federal Community Development Block Grant Small Cities program, and seeks to bring that policy question before this Committee using the Subcommittee report. Congress gave the states the option of either administering the program or allowing HUD to continue to handle this program. All states except Hawaii, New York, and Kansas have opted for state take over of the block grant. In past years, the program has provided funding for community projects involving construction of public facilities and improvements, economic development, rehabilitation and preservation, handicapped activities and barrier removal, and local government administration. In FY 1982, some 43 Kansas cities of less than 50,000 population received federal grants totaling over \$16 million as part of this program. The Subcommittee feels that the Legislature should authorize the state to receive federal planning funds in FY 1984 in the amount of \$108,000 to study the feasibility of state takeover of the administrative responsibilities of the federal block grant program.

The Subcommittee would point out that the state may opt out of the block grant for FY 1985 and therefore does not wish to recommend F.T.E. positions be established at this time. Furthermore, the Subcommittee acknowledges that federal law imposes several requirements on states seeking to administer the block grant. A statement explaining goals and how the money would be spent must be prepared. Several stages of public participation are required, both before and after the announcement of intent. If the state opts to takeover the program, then federal statutes direct the Governor to certify that:

- 1. the state will engage in community development planning;
- 2. the state will provide local governments with technical assistance for community development;
- 3. the state will consult with local elected officials regarding the distribution of federal funds; and
- 4. the state will provide community development funds that are at least 10 percent of the federal funds allocated to the state for the Small Cities program, which may be fulfilled by a soft match.

The state may use federal block grant funds to cover up to half of all costs in administering the program, but the federal share cannot exceed 2 percent of the total state grant amount.
