The minutes of the February 8, 1983 meeting were approved.

Senator Gordon told the Committee there is a problem with 10,000 to 15,000 geese coming over at night from Missouri and eating farmers crops. Chairman Angell appointed a subcommittee to make a recommendation in this regard: Senator Gordon (Chairman), Senator Kerr and Senator Gannon.

S.B. 147 - Forfeiture of hunting license for violation of big game laws.

Bill Hanzlick explained that this bill would provide a legal deterrent for big game violators. The statutes now provide that a license can be revoked only for the remaining period of validity. This bill would provide for loss of hunting privileges for one year for first convictions and two years for subsequent convictions. Mr. Hanzlick said they would like a provision in the bill to increase the two year revocation up to and including lifetime, subject to the discretion of the court.

Ted Cunningham testified in favor of the bill. He pointed out this bill would not deter the habitual poacher but will take care of the once or twice in a lifetime poacher.

S.B. 149 - Restrictions on pursuit of wounded game birds or animals.

Bill Hanzlick testified that the present trepass statutes now allow for the pursuit of wounded game on adjoining land without permission. He said this has been abused. This bill would allow only one person from a hunting party to pursue wounded game. Mr. Hanzlick stated that the bill is an attempt to improve relations between hunters and landowners.

Ted Cunningham testified in opposition to the bill. He said they have no quarrel with what Fish and Game is trying to do, but they do not agree that there is a need for the bill. He said they feel landowners will be just as upset with one person on their land as they would be with five or six. Mr. Cunningham went on to say he feels this bill would encourage leaving wounded or dead game because people are not going to want to make the remainder of the hunting party wait while an individual pursues the game. He suggested that the bill be amended to provide that the entire hunting party may pursue wounded game but only one firearm can be taken. Mr. Cunningham emphasized he feels this bill is a case of limiting good hunters who use good ethics and will not deter actual trepassers.

S.B. 150 - Appearance bonds for fish and game violations.

Bill Hanzlick testified this bill would allow for a wider variety of violations. the law enforcement officer must transport a violator to a county jail. In addition, it is possible for some out-of-state violators to pay less than Kansas residents because nonresidents sometimes just forfeit their bond. This bill would also provide that the violator could be bonded at the nearest post office.

Ted Cunningham said they do not oppose the bill, but suggested perhaps a personal check should be allowed for posting bond.

Senator Kerr moved that S.B. 147 be reported favorably. Senator Werts seconded the motion, and the motion <u>carried</u> 6-3 with <u>Senators Chaney</u>, <u>Gannon</u>, <u>Kerr</u>, <u>Roitz</u>, <u>Vidricksen and Werts</u>

voting in favor, and Senators Angell, Feleciano and Gordon voting against the bill.

Senator Feleciano made a conceptual motion that S.B. 149 be amended to allow all members of a hunting party to pursue wounded game but that only one firearm may be taken. Senator Kerr seconded the motion, and the motion <u>carried</u>. Senator Feleciano moved that the bill be reported favorably, as amended, for passage. Senator Gannon seconded the motion, and the motion carried 9-0.

Senator Chaney moved that S.B. 150 be amended to provide that personal checks of Kansas residents may be used for bonding purposes. Senator Werts seconded the motion, and the motion <u>carried</u>. Senator Chaney moved that the bill be reported favorably, as amended, for passage. Senator Werts seconded the motion, and the motion <u>carried</u> 8-0.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:00 a.m. by the Chairman.
