Senator Vidricksen welcomed the Kansas State Nurses' Association, the Board of Nursing, members of the Kansas Hospital Association and other members of the nursing profession to the Senate Governmental Organization Committee.

The Research Department gave a brief review of the conditions and requirements of the Kansas Sunset Law as it relates to the Board of Nursing.

Dr. Lois Sabetta then addressed the committee on behalf of Senate Bill 44 and stated that the absence of the Board of Nursing would result in serious harm to the public and she felt this bill should be reinstated as is.

Lynelle King introduced some of the officers of the Kansas State Nurses Association and made brief remarks to the committee stating that she felt the Board has carried out its mandates and regulations and would like to see it continued.

The committee then heard testimony from Naomi Nibbelink who stated that the KSNA believes strongly that the Board of Nursing should be re-established in law with the same functions and powers that it has now. It was felt that the State Board of Nursing has done a very creditable job in relation to complaints that have been filed with them considering the frequent turnover of Assistant Attorney Generals that have been assigned to advise the Board of Nursing. KSNA was concerned about the possibility of combining the Nursing Board with other Boards and urged that the Board of Nursing continue to be the agency regulating nursing licensure and practice as well as accrediting schools of nursing. It was recommended that the Nursing Board be continued as now constituted with its current powers, responsibilities and composition. (Exhibit A)

The three conferees then answered questions from the committee.

Kay Hale spoke to the committee on behalf of the Kansas Hospital Association expressing their support for Senate Bill 44 stating that they felt the state's regulatory function over nurses and mental health technicians should be continued as elimination of the regulations of these occupations would place an added burden on employers to protect the public from improper health care. (Exhibit B)

Senator Hein made the motion for a substitute amendment to delete the Board of Nursing from the Sunset Act. Senator Meyers seconded this. The Chairman then explained what this would do. After considerable discussion the motion carried.

A motion was then made by Senator Johnson and seconded by Senator Francisco to pass Senate Bill 44 favorably out of committee. Motion carried.

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# KSNA the voice of Nursing in Kansas

Statement of the Kansas State Nurses' Association before the Senate Governmental Organization Committee By Naomi Nibbelink, R.N., M.S., Chairperson, KSNA Task Force on Sunset of SBN

February 22, 1983

In support of SB 44, Continuing the Board of Nursing with the same powers

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee, my name is Naomi Nibbelink and I am the Chairperson of Kansas State Nurses' Association's Task Force on Sunset of the Board of Nursing. As you know, KSNA is the professional organization for Registered Nurses in Kansas. I was privileged to have served as President of KSNA from 1979 - 1981 as well as serving on the Board of Directors of KSNA for several years and have been active at all levels of the organization. I am Instructor, Department of Nursing Staff Development of Stormont-Vail Regional Medical Center here in Topeka.

As no doubt each of you has heard from nurses in your districts, reinstatement of the Board of Nursing is top priority for KSNA. I will be brief because I believe you are well aware of the issue and it is easily summarized: KSNA believes strongly that the Board of Nursing should be re-established in law with the same functions and powers it has now. Professional nurses, as the largest group regulated by this Board, have had ample opportunity to experience and observe the work of the Board of Nursing. KSNA believes the Board of Nursing has conscientiously and competently carried out their legislative mandates.

The performance of the Board of Nursing is all the more remarkable when one recognizes the size of their task (approximately 30,000 licensees, approving the programs of 52 schools of pursing and mental health technique) and yet they must accomplish all this with a relatively small staff and budget.

Because the auditors have raised the issue, I would like to speak to the issue of complaints filed with the Board of Nursing and their handling of this. KSNA believes the SBN does a very creditable job in relation to this responsibility. Factors which have resulted in less-than-

expected reporting to the Board include advice given to hospitals by their attorneys. Often health care agencies, including nursing homes and hospitals, fire employees they discover to be incompetent or drug abusers but are advised by their attorneys against making a formal report to the Board of Nursing. KSNA has had concern about attorney's knowledge about current professional and legal roles of nurses and passed a resolution at our October, 1982 Convention proposing some solutions to providing improved education to attorneys regarding nursing practice. (The resolution is attached). Through our publications and meetings we frequently advise nurses about their legal and ethical responsibilities to report violations of the law to the SBN, and will continue to assist in this effort.

Another factor impeding complaint handling is the frequent turnover of Assistant Attorney's General assigned to advise the Board
of Nursing. There has been approximately 8 different Assist. A.G.s
working with the SBN within the past 2½ years. Additionally,
the case load for these Assistant A.G.s appears to be very heavy,
resulting in a backlog of cases and a time lag of perhaps a year
from the time the complaint is filed and the time of the first
hearing about the matter. While that is a serious matter, it is
one that the SBN can have only indirect effect on. The solution
to the problems surrounding adequate legal advice to the SBN
lies elsewhere.

A matter of great concern to us is the Legislative Post Audit's suggestion of possibly combining the Nursing Board with other Boards. We urge that the Board of Nursing continue to be the agency regulating nursing licensure and practice. Already it has an extremely large number of licensees (more that 30,000) to regulate. In the states where nursing has been placed under an "umbrella" or combination board there has been continual controversy and discontent. Our nursing colleagues in those states report such problems as having nursing regulated by a board which contains few if any nurses and where the board has very little understanding of nursing standards. Because of its large numbers, we doubt that economies would result from combining the Board of Nursing with other Boards.

Another matter of importance is that the Board continue to accredit schools of nursing. While other non-nursing boards do not have this function to the same degree that the Board of Nursing does, yet every other state nursing board across the country also accredits schools of nursing. Nursing education programs are diverse, some are hospital (diploma) programs, some are Associate Degree (in community colleges) and some are Baccaulareate (in universities). Yet some minimum standards must be upheld and presently the graduates of all 3 type programs must pass a nationally-

standardized examination. Therefore it is important that single agency - the Board of Nursing - accredit the schools nursing.

In summary, KSNA is most concerned that the Nursing Board be continued as now constituted with its current powers, responsibilities and composition. It is vital that professional nurses provide their expertise in regulating nursing practice in this state, both as members of the Board of Nursing and as staff of that Board.

### #9 Attorney Education Regarding Professional Nursing Roles Submitted by Steering Committee of Advisory Council

WHI REAS, professional nurses function autonomously within the legal framework of the Nurse Practice Act which allows for nursing diagnosis and treatment, and

WHEREAS, professional nurses are experts in nursing, and

WHEREAS, professional nurses are responsible for patient advocacy, and

WHEREAS, the legal profession needs more knowledge of the scope of professional nursing practice and newer roles of nursing, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that nurses should preent expert testimony in courts of law using present established standards of nursing care and Interpret nursing roles and scope of practice, be it further

RESOLVED, that KSNA work with the Kansas Bar Association to offer information and/or education on professional and legal roles of Registered Nurses to the attorneys of Kansas.

### Rationale for Resolution:

Many attorneys in Kansas, including those working with hospitals, are not informed about nurses' professional roles and scope of practice.

# TESTIMONY OF THE KANSAS HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION ON SENATE BILL 44

My name is Kay Hale. I am a registered nurse currently employed by the Kansas Hospital Association. I want to thank you for this opportunity to testify on behalf of the Association.

We want to express our support for Senate Bill 44 which would re-establish and continue the Board of Nursing until July 1, 1991. The Association agrees with the basic conclusion as stated in the Sunset Audit Report. We feel that the state's regulatory function over nurses and mental health technicians should be continued. To eliminate the regulation of these occupations would place an added burden on employers to protect the public from improper health care. We support the Board of Nursing as the agency to carry out this regulatory function.

The Sunset Audit Report recommends that the Legislature consider several statutory changes in regard to the regulation of nurses and mental health technicians. We are concerned about the issue of mandating employers to report disciplinary action taken in regard to unprofessional conduct or resignations in lieu of disciplinary action.

The Association agrees that employers have the responsibility to report unprofessional conduct to the licensing agency. We would like to take this opportunity to suggest that the mechanism for reporting unprofessional conduct should be further studied and refined. We strongly suggest that the Board of Nursing and the Legislature seek input from the employers of nurses and mental health technicians in order to improve the reporting procedures.

The Association emphasizes the need for adequate resources and staff to enable the Board to investigate all complaints of unprofessional conduct in a timely manner.

In summary, we support passage of Senate Bill 44.
