Senate Bill 138 - Disposition of fines imposed for driving under influence of alcohol or drugs.

Senator Chaney, the sponsor of the bill, explained the bill to the committee. The chairman reported Senate Bill 121 and Senate Bill 151, which deal with this subject, are scheduled for hearing next Tuesday. Committee discussion followed.

Jim Clark testified his association does support this bill. He said since the crack down on DUI, some of this burden seems to be falling strictly on the county general fund; counties have to bear the cost. It is having an impact on large and small counties. He explained this measure would allow the counties to cover some of that cost. Since July 1, a lot of the traffic cases haven't really been felt yet. It is too early to come up with direct figures.

Marjorie Van Buren testified her office supports Mr. Clark's statements. She said they are just beginning to collect the money from some of these cases. A committee member inquired if the court were collecting that information. She replied, not on fines; they can calculate what docket fees will be. The chairman reported they will get a fiscal note on it. Marjorie Van Buren reported she does have a copy of what was turned into the budget division. They estimated those fines to be \$1,200,000; 44,000 cases resulted in someone paying the fine; two-thirds of this are first-time offenders; the other one-third is at least 500.

Colonel Hornbaker reported there were 5260 DWI cases in the state of Kansas; their agency filed 3,254; their 62% resulted in fines of \$317,333 collected.

Senator Burke moved to approve the minutes of February 7 and February 8, 1983; Senator Werts seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Kathleen Sebelius presented a request for introduction of a committee bill that related to civil procedure. She explained the proposal to the committee. Following committee discussion, <u>Senator Gaines moved that the bill be introduced as a committee bill; Senator Winter seconded the motion, and the motion carried.</u>

The chairman presented three proposals that amend the Kansas Consumer Protection Act and were requested by the attorney general. The first proposal would provide a three-day cooling off period for health spa contracts. Senator Feleciano moved that the bill be introduced; Senator Mulich seconded the motion, and the motion carried. The chairman explained the second proposal relates to the implied

warranty under the Kansas Consumer Protection Act. Following committee discussion, Senator Gaines moved that the bill be introduced; Senator Winter seconded the motion, and the motion carried. The chairman explained the third proposal is designed to deal with a gray area where certain activities that some thought were covered in the securities act; it would delete in the exception of the definition of consumer transaction the words "and securities" and "federal". Senator Gaines moved that the bill be introduced; Senator Werts seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

Senate Bill 7 - Filing of security interests in farm products.

The chairman explained the proposed substitute bill embodies the prior decisions made by the committee. A staff member explained the proposed substitute bill to the committee. The chairman then read the two amendments proposed by Jon Josserand (See Attachment #1). The chairman recognized Mr. Josserand for questions by the committee. A committee member inquired why he wants to eliminate sections (3) (a) and (3) (c). Mr. Josserand replied it was to eliminate any implication that his office would provide this information on the telephone. Another committee member inquired if he had any objections from the farm organizations. Mr. Josserand said they support it.

The chairman recognized John Crofoot. Mr. Crofoot stated there will be a method worked out for immediate access by computer or by telephone down the road; it is not too important the first or second year but more important in later years for immediate access. Considerable discussion was held regarding providing instantaneous information to the public. Mr. Josserand stated no state has service that includes instantaneous access. He feels with centralized filing, people will be able to get information within a reasonable time frame. Considerable committee discussion followed. John Crofoot suggested the filing be made first at the secretary of state's office and then filed back at the register of deeds. Further committee discussion was held.

Consideration of Senate Bill 7 will be continued at a later date.

The chairman presented a proposal to be introduced as a committee bill that was requested by the State Board of Tax Appeals that would provide that appeals from their decisions would be to the court of appeals. Senator Steineger moved that the bill be introduced as a committee bill; Senator Gaines seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

The chairman presented a request for a committee bill from Judge Coffman that would permit the court to decide whether summons could be issued for a defendant instead of an arrest warrant. Senator Werts moved the the bill be introduced; Senator Winter seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

The meeting adjourned.

Dear Senator Pomeroy:

I have reviewed the draft of a proposed substitute for Senate Bill 7. I offer the following amendments which are also supported by the Kansas Grain and Feed Dealers Association, the Kansas Livestock Association and the Kansas Committee for Farm Organizations.

- Delete section 3(a) and 3(c).
- 2. Include K.S.A. 84-9-407 pertaining to fees and change the fee from \$3 to \$5 for the first ten information listings provided.

The second amendment would not affect the revenues of the division. It would create a flat fee, instead of a variable fee for 80% of the information searches currently made. It would help to eliminate the paperwork associated with the necessity of continually billing requesting parties for \$1.00 or \$2.00 of additional fees.
