Chairman called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m.

A presentation was made by Laurence Kunkel relative to the current telephone service situation and the cost impact to the State as a result of divestiture In the past, where we have had one and rate increases. (Attachment II). major provider of telephone service, we now will have two major providers, SWB Corporation and AT&T. One big change is the fact that SWB will no longer own any of their customer's on-premise telephone equipment. They are now a local utility that provides telephone service only. AT&T now provides all the interstate phone service (KANS-A-N). Kunkel said that long distance service for the State will increase about \$1,600,000 annually and the State will be required to pay circuit by circuit for KANS-A-N service. His department proposes that the State purchase its own phone system and that it be operated by the State.

Chairman turned to HB 2620, an act relating to contracts for personal property and services by the legislative coordinating council; amending K.S.A. and repealing the existing section.

Jim Wilson reviewed the contents of the bill, of which the committee had previously heard testimony on January 17, 1984.

Representative Chronister moved that HB 2620 be reported favorable for passage. Seconded by Representative Louis. Motion carried.

Chairman turned to HB 2696, an act concerning social and rehabilitation services; placement agreement with secretary of corrections.

Representative Turnquist presented a proposed amendment (Attachment III) to HB 2696. Chairman announced that we would allow some time for the committee members to take a closer look at this proposed amendment, and that we would take it up again at a later date.

an act amending the small claims procedure act; concerning the amount of a small claim; amending K.S.A. 61-2703, 61-2706 and 61-2713 and repealing the existing sections.

Representative Duncan moved that HB 2718 be reported favorable for passage.

Seconded by Representative Meacham. Chairman asked if there was any discussion.

Jim Wilson brought to our attention a minor "cleanup" amendment. Page 3, Line 97 "which is the subject to your claim" should read "which is the subject of your claim". Representative Duncan stated he would include this change in his motion for passage.

Chairman subsequently asked Representatives Duncan and Meacham to withdraw their original motion and he asked for a motion on the amendment which changes the Representative Louis moved that this amendment be adopted. word "to" to "of". Seconded by Representative Chronister. Motion carried.

Representative Farrar made the motion to amend HB 2718 as follows: Line 0034 after the word "or" -- "under contract to that person". Seconded by Representative Rolfs. Representative Louis called to the committee's attention that this recommendation was made by Frances Kastner in her testimony on 1-31-84 in support of this bill. Motion carried.

Representative Luzzati raised a question about the fiscal note on HB 2718. Chairman read a portion of the fiscal note as follows: "it is estimated that this increase would require an additional three clerical positions, either additional or equivalent in temporary help -- the cost for this additional staff FY85 would be \$39,300". Representative Luzzati asked what the objections of Joyce Reeves, Clerk of District Court, were. Representative Duncan said he understood from her testimony, that it would increase the work load in her department, thereby causing a real inconvenience.

Representative Heinemann made a substitute motion to amend K.S.A. 61-2501 to read that the filing fee would be consistent with the increase in the dollar limitation. Seconded by Representative Shriver. Representative Solbach said he agreed with the principle but stated there would be an added fiscal note as a result of this amendment. Chairman asked for a vote on this substitute motion made by Representative Heineman. The motion carried.

Chairman then stated that Representative Duncan had recommended HB 2718 be reported favorable for passage, as amended and Representative Meacham had seconded the motion. In asking for discussion, Representative Hoy questioned the proposed amendment, specifically the language that reads "under contract to that person". This raised considerable discussion that ensued for some time. Chairman Bunten then appointed Representatives Solbach, Duncan and Shriver to look into this proposed language change, to study it further, and report back to this committee on Wednesday, February 8, at which time we would take it up again.

HCR 5052, a concurrent resolution relating to institutions and facilities for the state correctional system; requesting a study by the Secretary of Corrections on the current missions and operations of state correctional institutions and facilities to develop recommendations to improve and make more efficient the utilization and operation of such institutions and a study by Secretary of Corrections and SRS on the mission and utilization of Norton State Hospital to examine possible conversion of such facility into an institution meeting needs within the correctional system.

Representative Luzzati stated an objection to HCR 5052 because it would be a hardship on the families of female prisoners in that it would necessitate a lot of travel for those families; i.e. from the urban areas such as Kansas City and Topeka to Norton. Representative Luzzati moved that HCR 5052 be reported unfavorable for passage. Seconded by Representative Wisdom.

Chairman asked for discussion. Representative Duncan stated he opposes the motion saying Norton poses no greater hardship for female inmates than it does for a retarded person, and if we do keep it open, it's a question of what to use it for.

Chairman asked for a vote on Representative Luzzati's motion. The motion did not carry.

Representative Chronister moved that HCR 5052 be reported favorable for passage. Seconded by Representative Meacham.

Representative Heineman said he would like to see an amendment - saying he is not sure of the language on Line 35 "to provide adequate housing and confinement for female inmates". Chairman asked if he has an amendment and Representative Heineman replied that he suggests striking from lines 35 and 36 the wording "converting the Kansas Correctional Vocational Training Center into an institution" and striking the word "female" on Line 37. Representative Solbach seconded the motion.

Chairman stated that he opposes Representative Luzzati's subsequent motion that HCR 5052 be reported unfavorable for passage. Chairman said the committee did look at it this summer and he's sure they thought it out, and for us to make a change at this time may or may not hinder what they were trying to accomplish.

Chairman Bunten asked for a vote on Representative Heineman's substitute motion to amend HCR 5052. Ages were eleven (11). Nays were eleven (11). Chairman broke the tie by voting Nay. The motion lost.

Chairman Bunten then asked for a vote on the original motion to recommend that HCR 5052 be reported favorable for passage. The motion carried.

HCR 5064, a concurrent resolution revoking K.A.R. 88-13-4 and 88-13-11; concerning student assistant programs and HCR 5068, a concurrent resolution relating to the department of health and environment; concerning certain fees; rejecting Kansas administrative regulations 38-43-11, 28-44-11 and 28-45-11, as adopted by the secretary of health and environment and filed with the revisor of statutes on December 15, 1983.

Representative Duncan briefed the committee on the contents of these two resolutions and Chairman asked his suggestion on what disposition we should take. Representative Duncan said that, pending working out whether or not we will ask the agency to simply reject them on May 1, we would ask that you hold them. It may be important at some point to convert them to bills.

Chairman announced we would put a "hold" on HCR 5064 and HCR 5068.

Chairman asked for a motion on the Minutes from January 30, 31, February 1 and 2.

Presentation to House Ways and Means Committee, 6 February 1984

SUBJECT: Cost Impacts Resulting from Divestiture and Rate Increases.

Current Telephone Service Situation

a. Southestern Bell Corporation (SBC).

Services SBC is now permitted to provide the state on a regulated basis are as follows:

- 1. Local Exchange Switched and Private Line Service.
 - (a) Business Main Line service.

(b) PBX trunks.

- (c) Centrex switched service only, including both state business offices and university dormitories.
- (d) Private line miscellaneous telephone and data service.
- Intra-LATA (Local Access Transport Area) switched and private line service (see enclosure).
 - (a) Message Rate (call by call) Long Distance.
 - (b) WATS.
 - (c) Private Line dedicated voice or data.
- 3. SBC no longer owns or provides any Customer Premises Equipment (CPE) and is precluded from doing so on a tariff regulated basis. A separate unregulated subsidiary has been established for the purpose of selling CPE.

b. AT&T

 AT&T provides all inter-LATA and interstate service. All KANS-A-N service is now provided by AT&T, along with all other private line data, voice, or WATS inter-LATA service not routed through KANS-A-N facilities.



2. AT&T now owns all embedded (in-place) CPE and charges rent based on a schedule established by the F.C.C. This schedule establishes rental prices through calendar year 1986 after which it may become completely de-regulated unless the F.C.C. decides otherwise. AT&T is responsible for maintaining this embedded CPE during this period, but is expected to withdraw maintenance support after that time.

Impacts of Divestiture and Regulatory (F.C.C. and K.C.C.) Actions

SBC requested rate increases of approximately \$200 million dollars in 1983 and was granted about half of that amount or just under \$100 million dollars. Costs for SBC services used by state agencies increased less than \$200,000 for the remainder of FY 84 and about \$600,000 for FY 85 for local exchange service only, costs for intra-LATA long distance service were increased by 17%. The K.C.C. considers this to be an interim decision for a one year study period. However, SBC has appealed this decision, the K.C.C. has denied the appeal and SBC is now free to take the matter to court or to file a new rate case. It is believed that the latter course of action will be taken and subsequent increases could result toward the end of calendar year 1984.

b. AT&T.

1. CPE

(a) All embedded CPE is now the property of AT&T and is deregulated to the extent that it is governed by an F.C.C. directive over a phase out or transition period of two years through calendar 1986. This CPE is not subject to regulation by the K.C.C. The F.C.C. directive is as follows: "During the multi-line (Centrex, PBX, and key system) transition period the rate which AT&T charges must be the greater of: 1) 70% of the highest statetariffed rate, or 2) the statistical median of the rates in all state tariffs, for that equipment." The immediate impact is very small. However, rates will escalate to a larger amount in September 1984, again on 1 May 1985, and finally, again on 1 January 1986, at which time the rates become stable through calendar 1986.

Thereafter, they may become fully deregulated or otherwise as determined by the F.C.C. Examples of escalation of monthly rental for some high density items are as follows:

- (b) Much of the embedded base CPE is considered obsolete by AT&T. This particularly applies to very old PBX's and multi-line, multi-button telephone equipment and systems. This equipment is trouble prone and expensive to maintain, and we may anticipate efforts by AT&T to abandon support of this equipment. At this time AT&T still maintains and installs it.
- (c) AT&T also has a fully separated subsidiary that sells CPE.

2. Inter-LATA/Intra-state service.

- (a) Long distance message rate, WATS, and private line services are provided by AT&T. All KANS-A-N services are included. All applicable rates were increased by an average of 17%. AT&T requested a large increase, including private line "access" charges of \$25 per month per line but the K.C.C. held them to the same level of increase as SBC. AT&T has requested a rehearing butthe K.C.C has not yet reached a decision.
- (b) On 1 January 1986, AT&T will discontinue "Telpak", a bulk transmission channel offering. We will then be required to pay circuit by circuit for KANS-A-N and this will increase the cost of KANS-A-N by \$1,600,000 annually.

b. Regulatory Agency Actions.

1. Federal Communications Commission.

The F.C.C. directed \$2 per month per Centrex access line charge and \$6 per month PBX trunk or multiline access charge which is to be effective on 3 April 1984. The calendar year 1985 access charge will be \$3 per line and in calendar 1986 the access charge will be \$4 per line. These charges remain imposed for large businesses, even though equivalent charges for residential and single line business customers have been suspended until 1985.

2. Kansas Corporation Commission

The K.C.C. imposed no access charges this year pending further study.

Areas served by Southwestern Bell in its five-state territory will be grouped into 25 regions called Local Access and Transport Areas (LATAs), according to a plan filed in federal district court in Washington, D.C.

Three of the LATAs will be in Kansas, James B. Ellis, assistant vice president-revenues and public affairs in Topeka, said.



AT&T plans to submit its reorganization plan for court approval well ahead of the late February deadline.

> Final approval of the LATAs will not affect authority of any regulatory agency over local and long distance calls, Ellis noted. The LATA plan will preserve existing local calling and non-optional extended area service arrangements, he said.

> "Each LATA includes within its boundaries a number of

communities and local telephone exchanges," Ellis said. "The boundaries of these local exchanges would not be altered under the plan, so its approval by the court would not disrupt the provision of basic telephone service.

"What is considered a local call today will remain local," Ellis continued. "What is long distance will remain long distance." For that reason, six Oklahoma and three Missouri communities are included in the Wichita LATA where local calling scopes cross state lines, Ellis said.

Court procedures allow intervenors 30 days to comment on AT&U's Oct. 4 filing. AT&I and the DOJ have 20 days following that in which to respond. U.S. District Court Judge Harold Greene recently added another step to the process which will allow intervenors a 15 day period for comment on the responses that AI&I will make to the initial round of intervenor comments now under way. After that, the court will begin its deliberation. There are 109 intervenors in the case and Judge Greene said no more will be allowed.

The results of the study and evaluation shall be reported to the joint committee on state building construction and the chairpersons of the committees on ways and means of the senate and house of representatives prior to commencement of the of the legislature regular session, in 1985.";

Also on page 1, in the title, in line 17, preceding "social" by inserting "the department of"; also in line 17, after the semicolon, by inserting the following: "relating to the use of institutions and facilities by other state agencies; authorizing a"; in line 18, preceding the period, by inserting the following: "; requiring a study of facilities and grounds at the vocational rehabilitation center at Salina, Kansas, by certain state officers";
