Senator Norvell moved the March 27, 1984 minutes be approved, seconded by Senator Karr. Motion carried.

SCR 1665 - Senator Kerr called on Senator Montgomery to present SCR 1665. Senator Montgomery stated a number of people had expressed concern relative to the testing of meters and measuring devices used at the point of bulk transportation and delivery of refined petroleum products, so he requested SCR 1665.

Chuck Nicolay stated there is a Division of Weights and Measures under the Department of Agriculture and another such division under the Department of Revenue. He feels it may be more efficient to have coordinating checking services; they are interested in the accuracy of meters.

Don Jacka stated the Department of Agriculture has no problem with SCR 1665 and they would welcome a study investigating activities pertaining to the testing of meters, but they are concerned about the lack of funds for the Weights and Measures Division since they have trucks which are old and need to be replaced, and are understaffed.

Answering Senator Karr's inquiry as to the type of complaints, Mr. Jacka stated it is not with the quality of service but with the frequency of inspections which is impossible to do with their limited staff and equipment.

Senator Kerr called attention to the balloon draft distributed which includes the grain moisture measuring devices also. (See Attachment 1). Senator Montgomery stated he wanted to make sure there would be some way to study having a standard dockage available. Senator Thiessen stated KSU has a number of charts available but they are not all the same.

After further discussion, <u>Senator Montgomery moved the words "and dockage procedures"</u> be inserted in the first block in the balloon draft after "devices" and in the lower block after the word "devices", <u>seconded by Senator Norvell. Motion carried. Senator Allen moved SCR 1665 be reported favorably as amended, seconded by Senator Montgomery. Motion carried.</u>

INTERIM COMMITTEE STUDIES - Senator Kerr called attention to the various areas which have been suggested for interim study--the seed law, and the two subject areas included in SCR 1665, and inquired if anyone in the room wanted to suggest an area to be studied.

Tom Tunnell informed the committee the KFGDA will actively participate in the study of the moisture meters. He had another area which he feels should be considered; that is, the suppliers of fertilizers, chemicals and seeds are now in the third position in collecting bills. They help producers with financial activities and should share priority status with the banks.

Senator Kerr requested Mr. Tunnell to send him a written statement as to what his specific request is to be as to the proposed topics for consideration as an interim study.

John Blythe indicated the Grain Inspection Department does require the posting of their dockage procedure in each elevator. He is very much interested in the International Grains Program and stressing the exporting of grains. He feels the facilities should be expanded and he would like to see it ongoing. He heard the Ways and Means Committee has been speaking about separating the IGP from the KSU budget and he feels that the committee should be following that aspect. He referred to the UCC relative to the priorities in debt payments, stating Illinois and Indiana have addressed this situation.

Senator Kerr also requested Mr. Blythe to furnish him with a written request of his priorities to be studied.

Senator Gannon stated he had been in a number of meetings and that universities are now offering degrees in agri-business and he felt there might be merit in making a study to see if this would be feasible for KSU.

Senator Kerr stated if it is necessary to have another committee meeting to finalize the list of items for interim study he would so inform the members. He thanked the committee members and staff for their dedicated and cooperative efforts in solving a number of problem areas over the last four years.

The meeting was adjourned.
