Following a call to order by Chairman Joseph C. Harder, the Chairman recognized Representative Mike Hayden, Speaker of the House, and co-sponsor of HCR 5077. Representative Hayden explained the background of the present method for obtaining members of the State Board of Education and outlined the provisions of HCR 5077. Representative Hayden said he felt that there has not been good articulation between the State Board and the Kansas Legislature and that the present method of selection is one of the reasons.

Ms. Elaine Beckers-Braun, Chairman, Kansas Association of School

When the Chairman recognized <u>Representative Denise Apt</u>, who testified against HCR 5077, Representative Apt theorized that if the Governor appoints the State Board of Education and if the State Board, in turn, appoints the Commissioners of Education, the Governor could be influencing public policy on education in Kansas. She, therefore, urged the Committee to oppose HCR 5077 in order that the public policy in education remain public.

Mr. Robert Clemons of the State Board of Education testified against HCR 5077, and his testimony is found in Attachment 1.

Ms. Ruth Ann Hackler, president of the Kansas Association of School Boards, testified in opposition to HCR 5077. Ms. Hackler pointed out that KASB represents 300 of the 305 school districts in Kansas and said the organization is dedicated to the local control of schools. She, therefore, maintained that the State Board of Education should be responsible to the people by whom they are elected and not to one individual. She said that she does, however, support the authority of the State Board being under the control of the State Legislature.

When Mr. Stan Lind, on behalf of the Kansas Association of Community Colleges, took the floor, he requested that an amendment to HCR 5077 be adopted by the Committee, and this amendment is found in Attachment 2. Mr. Lind explained that the amendment would make possible at some future date the creation of a separate governing board for the community colleges. Mr. Lind said he felt that community colleges and vocational education do not lend themselves well to the governance by either the State Board of Regents or

the State Board of Education.

When the Chairman asked if others present in the room wished to testify, Mr. Dale Louis Carney, a member of the State Board of Education from the Third District, stated his opposition to HCR 5077. He maintained that the resolution would sever local control over the school districts and urged the Committee to allow the State Board to remain an elected representative board of the people.

Ms. Elaine Beckers-Braun of Mission, Kansas, who was unable to be present at today's meeting, requested that her name be added to the list of opponents to HCR 5077. A written statement to this effect, as requested by Mrs. Braun, was distributed to Committee members. (Attachment 3)

When $\underline{\text{Mr. Craig Grant}}$ of K-NEA took the floor, he said that K-NEA is in the process of reassessing its position on the concept of HCR 5077, and his testimony is found in $\underline{\text{Attachment 4}}$.

Following testimony by Mr. Grant, the Chairman said the resolution would be taken under advisement, and he adjourned the meeting.

Mr. Chairman, members of the Committee, my name is Bob Clemons. I appreciate the opportunity to appear before you concerning House Concurrent Resolution No. 5077. I am a member of the Kansas State Board of Education, and I am appearing on behalf of the Board. The Board has taken official action to oppose the passage of Concurrent Resolution 5077.

The main concern expressed by Board members is that the Board should continue to be elected by the people rather than appointed by the Governor. Each of the present ten members has been elected by the people. Most of us had opposition in the primary election and then again in the general election. We had to appear before the people in order to be elected, and we must answer to the people while in office and if we are to seek reelection. Each and every one of you are aware of this accountability process as you also must face the same procedure before you can serve in the Senate.

This form of representation is the basic foundation of our democratic government.

The voters have their choice at election time. They have the opportunity to elect those people they wish to represent them.

Attachment 1

The practice of electing state officials to represent the people has been part of the Kansas Constitution ever since the state of Kansas has existed. It has been part of the United States Constitution since the founding of our country.

Kansas State Board of Education members have been elected since 1969. The Kansas Constitution was amended by a vote of the people on November 8, 1966, to allow for the election of Board members. The amendment passed by a vote of 286,400 to 211,027. On August 6, 1974, the people of the state of Kansas were given the opportunity to determine if they still desired to elect the members of the Board of Education. At this election, the people responded by a vote of 130,265 to 141,492 to retain their right to elect the people who would represent them. Now just a short ten years later, the voters are going to be asked again if they still desire to elect these representatives.

I have been trying to determine why State Board members should be appointed rather than being elected. Comparisons have been made of the State Board and the Board of Regents. It has been said that the Board of Regents has an extremely good track record in articulating the concerns of higher education to the Governor and the Legislature. I would point out to you that there is a great deal of difference between the responsibilities of the State Board of Regents and the State Board of Education. The Board of Regents is an administrative board responsible for the operation of the six state universities and the Kansas Technical Institute. The State Board of Education is not an administrative board. Rather, the State Board must work with elected local boards of education of the 305 unified school districts, 19 community college boards of trustees, two special purpose schools, and governing boards of the 14 area

vocational-technical schools. The State Board does not have absolute control over these local units as the Board of Regents has over the state universities. Each of the local units has control over their own schools. Local boards of education are, of course, elected by the voters of their districts. The working relationships of the Board of Regents with the schools they administer is vastly different from the working relationships of the State Board of Education and the schools under its direction. Comparing the Board of Regents to the State Board of Education is simply not a valid comparison. The areas of their responsibilities and their working relationships are entirely different.

Some media reports have indicated that the State Board of Education has not been providing the leadership necessary for the improvement of education in Kansas. Let me indicate just a few areas where the State Board has been far out in front in this endeavor.

- 1. The State Board has had a certification testing proposal before the Legislature for the past two years. This program would be a valuable means of improving the quality of those teachers entering the teaching profession.
- 2. The State Board has in place a form of permissive inservice education for those teachers now teaching in the public schools. The current Legislature has been asked for funds to allow all school districts in the state to take part in this program.
- 3. The State Board is in the process of finalizing a plan to improve programs in community colleges and vocational schools. This

- program will require legislative changes which will be requested during the 1985 session of the Legislature.
- 4. The Legislature is continually provided information concerning the fiscal aspects of education in Kansas. Mr. Dale Dennis of our staff is on constant call by legislators to provide fiscal information concerning the schools under the jurisdiction of the State Board.

 There is no doubt in my mind that Mr. Dennis is the leading authority on school finance in Kansas and probably the United States. The State Board continually supports Mr. Dennis in his working with the Legislature.

These are only a few of the areas where the Board of Education has exerted leader-ship. I have attached to my statement a listing of some of the activities of the State Board during the past year. I believe this will be enlightening to you as to some of the many activities the State Board has undertaken to improve the educational opportunities of the kids of Kansas.

At the present time the State Board does provide the Legislature with a legislative program. Attached is a copy of these legislative recommendations for the current year. I am sure you have all seen these before. If the State Board becomes an appointed board rather than an elective board, then I am sure that such recommendations would then be the same as the Governor's. If Board members are appointed by the Governor, then it appears to me that the members will be responsible to and obligated to the Governor. The present elected Board is directly responsible to the people who elected them and, thus, can help to provide an educational program consistant with the needs as their electors see them.

Mr. Chairman, members of the Committee, I appreciate the opportunity to appear before you as an elected State Board of Education member. I would urge you to defeat the passage of Concurrent Resolution 5077 so that I or other elected State Board members can continue to testify before you. I would attempt to answer any of your questions.

CHAPTER 465

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 122

A Proposition to amend section 2 of article 6 of the constitution of the state of Kansas, relating to the state board of education, the operation, supervision and control of community junior colleges and the state board of regents.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected to the Senate and two-thirds of the members elected to the House of Representatives concurring therein:

Section 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas shall be submitted by title to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: Section 2 of article 6 of the constitution of the state of Kansas is amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 2. State board of education and state board of regents. (a) The legislature shall provide for a state board of education and for its general supervision of public schools, educational institutions and all the educational interests of the state, except educational functions delegated by law to the state board of regents. The state board of education shall perform such other duties as may be provided by law.

"(b) The legislature shall provide for a state board of regents and for its control and supervision of public institutions of higher education. Public institutions of higher education shall include universities and colleges granting baccalaureate or post baccalaureate degrees and such other institutions and educational interests as may be provided by law. The state board of regents shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by law.

"(c) Any municipal university shall be operated, supervised

and controlled as provided by law.

"(d) Any community junior college shall be operated, supervised and controlled as provided by law."

Sec. 2. The title appearing on the ballot by which this amendment is submitted to the electors of this state shall be the following:

"The constitution of the state of Kansas shall be amended by amending section 2 of article 6 to provide for a state board of education and for its general supervision of public schools, educational institutions and all the educational interests of the state, except educational functions delegated by law to the state board of regents and further, to provide that any community junior college shall be operated, supervised and controlled as provided by law."

Sec. 3. This resolution, if concurred in by two-thirds of the members elected to the senate and two-thirds of the members elected to the house of representatives, shall be entered on the journals, together with the yeas and nays. The secretary of state shall cause this resolution to be published as provided by section 1 of article 14 of the constitution, and shall cause the proposed amendment to be submitted to the electors of the state at the general election in the year 1974 as provided by law unless a special election is called at a sooner date by concurrent resolution of the legislature, in which case it shall be submitted to the electors of the state at such special election.

Craig Grant Testimony Before Senate Education Committee March 23, 1984

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Members of the Committee, my name is Craig Grant and I represent Kansas-NEA. Thank you for the opportunity to speak to the committee on <u>HCR 5077</u>.

As many of you know, the last time the concept of an appointed board was placed before the voters, Kansas-NEA opposed the concept; however, as the newspapers have reported, Kansas-NEA is in the process of reassessing that position with the goal of possible strengthening of our State Board of Education. We believe that we must strengthen our State Board so we can have a strong, viable Board advocating for the changes which must be made if we are to adequately prepare our children and grandchildren. The committees studying the concept and making our decisions will not have finalized our position before this resolution moves through the Legislature.

Kansas-NEAs deepest concerns with the movement from an elected to an appointed State Board of Education will be dealt with in the enabling statutes which will follow. We certainly will express our concerns at hearings in the upcoming weeks. However, our concerns will include:

- 1. Allowing professional educators to serve on the State Board of Education;
- 2. Keeping certification regulations clearly under the authority of the State Board of Education; and
- 3. Keeping accreditation authority under the auspices of the State Board.

These may be dealt with in the enabling legislation. If not, Kansas-NEA will attempt to change such legislation to include such matters.

Kansas-NEA will be making a decision in the near future on our official position. We would hope that the legislation to follow will deal with our concerns.
