Barbara Sabol, Secretary, DH&E, distributed to the committee members a summary of the reorganization of the Department of Health and Environment, listing the different bureaus and offices in the department and the changes in each one. (Attachment #1).

She said the purpose of the reorganization was to improve communication and coordination within the department and other agencies, and ensure the best link possible between health and environmental programs. New department-wide programs/functions are: Centralized Policy and Planning Functions; Centralized Public Information Functions; Centralized Management Analysis and Evaluation; Centralized Regulation Promulgation and Review; and Centralized Data Processing. Ms. Sabol stated that she believed that the reorganization will improve the effeciency and effectiveness of the department, and said they did not eliminate any services, just restructured them.

Senator Francisco moved that the committee introduce the bill requested by DH&E. The bill would allow the state to recapture funds expended during a receivership action. Senator Bogina seconded the motion and it carried.

The committee members questioned Ms. Sabol concerning duplication of inspection of food establishments; hazardous waste disposal; public drinking water; funding for local health departments; etc.

In answer to a question by Senator Francisco, Ms. Sabol said that Waste Management, Inc., had applied for expansion of the Furley hazardous waste site to an additional 80 acres, and that the current 80 acres will not reopen unless DH&E is satisfied with the cleanup of contamination coming from four treatment ponds, which is being closely monitored. They are still working with them on this, and there will be hearings on it before a permit is granted.

Ms. Sabol further stated that we all must protect the useable waters in Kansas, and it is necessary to identify problem areas and focus on those areas. As an agency they will never have all of the eyes and ears necessary to solve this problem.

Senator Roitz inquired if they had been in contact with Oklahoma concerning Tar Creek. Ms. Sabol responded that they were working on it now through the Governor's office.

Senator Vidricksen asked if they are recommending this year to start charging fees for inspection of grocery stores. Ms. Sabor replied that this year they had to implement SB 414, and that they were trying to look at the whole concept of user fees. They have been hesitant to propose any new fees and have not proposed any new fees.

Secretary Sabol was questioned by members of the committee about the functions and vacancies on the Food Service and Lodging Board.

Senator Meyers inquired as to the biggest need and problem for DH&E, and what the federal status is in relation to Kansas. Ms. Sabol said that there is a lot that will affect Kansas, and she would like to furnish the committee with a written response.

Senator Meyers asked Ms. Sabol and Dr. Hollowell to come back on Friday, January 20, for further discussion on this.

Senator Morris moved that the minutes of January 17, 1984, be approved. Senator Vidricksen seconded the motion and it carried.

The meeting was adjourned.
