The Chairman called the meeting to order and introduced Dr. Todd Reynolds and his group of government students from Marymount College in Salina. He then introduced Rep. Sandy Duncan who explained HB 2278 which would amend several sections of the rules and regulations filing act. He stated that this bill is a result of the Attorney General's decision to declare unconstitutional the Legislature's authority to modify, reject, or revoke rules and regulations promulgated by executive branch agencies by adopting a concurrent resolution. The Legislative Coordinating Council then directed the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules and Regulations to study alternative ways in which the Legislature could exercise a constitutional oversight of regulations. This Committee recommended that the Act be amended to create as an additional grounds for filing of a temporary regulation, the adoption by the Legislature of a concurrent resolution expressing a concern about a proposed or existing regulation. The concurrent resolution would suggest corrective language and specify a time frame for an agency response.

Testimony from Rep. Rochelle Chronister was then passed out in support of HB 2273 which would set a state policy that recognizes the greater potential effect of rules and regulations on small businesses (those under 250 employees) and says state agencies shall consider the economic effect of their rules and regulations on those businesses. (Exhibit A) Jim Yonally also spoke in favor of HB 2273. He indicated that HB 2273 was requested by NFIB/Kansas because small businesses have trouble dealing with extensive rules and regulations. Gordon Hahn also testified in support of HB 2273. (Exhibit B)

The Chairman then introduced Quentin Hope who spoke in support of HB 2007 which replaces the existing Kansas Public Television Board with the Kansas Public Broadcasting Commission. The Commission would assume the Board's present responsibilities and its jurisdiction would be expanded to include public radio broadcasting. Mr. Hope indicated that he represented Kansas Public Radio which includes KHCC-Hutchinson, KKSU-Manhattan, KANU-Lawrence, KANZ-Pierceville and KMUW-Wichita. Zoel Parenteau also spoke in favor of HB 2007 especially in regard to the expansion of the Commission. (Exhibit C) Bill Kaufman then passed out an Amendment which the Board of Regents is recommending to HB 2007. (Exhibit D) Dale Anderson stated that he also is in favor of HB 2007 but would like to see the membership of the Commission reflect the six highway districts of Kansas.

HB 2273 is a bill which would set a state policy that recognizes the greater potential effect of rules and regulations on small businesses (those under 250 employees), and says state agencies shall consider the economic effect of their rules and regulations on those businesses. When an adverse effect is noted, the agency may take certain steps to reduce that effect if it is not specifically prohibited (as in fire or safety codes) by:

- 1) establishing separate compliance on reports, or
- 2) by exempting small businesses from all or part of the rule or regulation.

The legislature has recognized in the past the problems created for smaller businesses. For instance, at the time that the speed-up of sales tax collections took place two years ago, the state had a sliding scale for the number of times a business must turn in collections based on the size of the business.

1st District Rep. Pat Roberts has called on the federal government to change its rules and regulations on small hospitals in light of the economic problems that are being created in requiring the same regs for St. Francis Hospital in Wichita and Thomas County Hospital.

According to the Third Annual Report prepared by the Small Business Administration, small businesses in Kansas account for 99% of the business establishments and provide 82% of Kansas jobs. More than 35% of Kansas' total employment is provided by firms with fewer than 100 employees. Obviously, the backbone of the Kansas commercial sector is the small businessman. Over 80% of the growth in new businesses is in those with under 250 employees. The agricultural crisis is having a great effect on small businesses in Kansas and anything that we can do to relieve some of the burden on these businesses will help the economic climate of the State.

# **Commentary about House Bill 2273**

## March 26th, 1985

The more than 1,200 members of The Associated Landlords of Kansas, represented through active chapters in more than six Kansas cities, are hopeful about the possible passage of House Bill 2272. We are glad to appear today in support of the bill.

Our members primarily purchase real estate as an investment outside their other employment, meaning they are not "large businesses" with ample resources to employ when addressing requirements placed on them by governmental rules and regulations or other procedures. Most of our members maintain and manage their own properties during nights and weekends. We feel H2273 would be a definite improvement toward reducing the impact of state rules and regulations on small businesses throughout the state.

If impacts in this area can be reduced, it should help our members and other small businesses everywhere hold the line on their operating costs. In the case of our members, this should help restrain at least somewhat the speed with which housing costs for the state's population will rise. Impacts should be just as positive where other businesses are involved.

### Governmental Organization Committee H.B. 2007 March 26, 1985

Outline of testimony by Zoel Parenteau, KPTS, Wichita In support of HB 2007 as amended

### 1. COMPOSITION OF THE COMMISSION:

- a. Larger, more representative body desirable.
- b. Difficulties with current Board:
- (1) All members have other agency responsibilities which may result in potential conflicts or, at least, distractions.
- (2) Share similar (Topeka) perspective Need input from other than station representatives as to effectiveness of stations, and needs of stations from other areas of the state. Present members not able to conduct individual fact-finding into various stations' activities, or into needs or preferences of unserved areas of the state.
- (3) Apparent that the Governor, through the Secretary of Administration, is in a position to direct the policies of the Board. More broadly-based input and shared decision-making from non-bureaucratic, lay representatives should improve on the present arrangement.
- c. Commission composition proposed in HB 2007 would accomplish these objectives, although other configurations which result in (1) citizen and (2) state-wide representation, would also suffice.

### 2. POWERS, DUTIES, FUNCTIONS OF THE COMMISSION:

- a. Agree with all provisions.
- b. Desirability for interconnection.
- c. Inclusion of public radio.
- d. Continued annual support grants to stations.

- 2. POWERS, DUTIES, FUNCTIONS OF THE COMMISSION (CONT'D):
- e. Matching equipment funds for expansion of service to unserved areas from existing stations.
- (1) Suggest consulting unserved areas' leaders and representatives as to their areas' local preferences as to which station's service they would prefer having brought into their communities.
- (2) Assist stations in extending coverage for planning and application for construction permits.
- f. Assistance in extending service when federal funding is not available.
- g. Equipment acquisiton assistance for modification, replacement, expansion, or combination of these.
  - h. Interconnection facilities & services.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 75-4906 is hereby amended to read as follows: 0050 75-4906. There is hereby established the Kansas public television board, hereinafter referred to as the board, broadcasting 0053 commission which board shall consist of three seven members. The membership of the commission shall include: (a) The secretary of administration, or the secretary's designee; (b) the executive officer chairperson of the state board of regents and or the chairperson's designee; (c) the commissioner chairperson of the state board of education are hereby made members of said board or the chairperson's designee; (d) one member of the senate appointed by the president of the senate; (e) one member oosi of the house of representatives appointed by the speaker of the 0062 house; and (f); and (d)[; (d) one member of the senate appointed by the president of the senate; (e) one member of the house of representatives appointed by the speaker of the house; and (f)] 0065 two members of the general public appointed by the governor. Members of the commission who become members by virtue of their offices under subsections (a), (b) and (c) shall perform the duties and responsibilities of membership in person and not by delegation to another person. Members appointed by the governor shall serve for a term of two years following the date of such appointment. Members of the senate and house of representatives first appointed shall be appointed for a term ending on the Tuesday following the first Monday in January in the oddnumbered year next following their appointment. Succeeding members of the legislature shall be appointed for terms of two years commencing on the Tuesday following the first Monday in 0077 January of each odd numbered year. All vacancies in office of members so appointed by the governor shall be filled by appointment by the officer making the original appointment governor for the unexpired term of the [Members of the senate and house of representatives first appointed shall be appointed for a 0082 term ending on the Tuesday following the first Monday in 0083 January in the odd-numbered year next following their appoint-0084 ment. Succeeding members of the legislature shall be appointed 0085 for terms of two years commencing on the Tuesday following the 0086 first Monday in January of each odd-numbered year. All vacan-
