HB-2555 - establishing state board of mortuary arts; providing for powers, duties and functions thereof; establishing the mortuary arts fee fund.

Mack Smith testified briefly stating that the bill would basically change their organization's name from state board of embalming arts to state board of mortuary arts and would raise the maximum fee limits. Attachment I

Senator Hayden made the motion to pass out HB-2555 favorably. Senator Anderson seconded the motion and it carried.

Senator Morris made a substitute motion to strike all references to the unneeded fee increases and recommend the bill favorable. Senator Kerr seconded the motion. The motion failed. The question was called and the original motion carried.

<u>HB-2185</u> - screening tests administered to infants to determine whether conditions exist which cause mental retardation.

Senator Francisco made the motion to pass out HB-2185 favorable. Senator Mulich seconded the motion and the motion carried.

HB-2082 - amends two statutes appearing in the nurse practice act, the act under which the practice of nursing is regulated and registered professional nurses and licensed practical nurses are licensed.

Senator Francisco stated that in checking he had been informed that the House would not have time to take up SB-179 and therefore made the motion to amend SB-179 into HB-2082. Senator Reilly seconded the motion and it carried.

Senator Francisco moved to conceptionally agree to amend lines 67-69 in HB-2082 and pass the bill out favorable. Senator Mulich seconded the motion and the motion carried.

 $\underline{\mbox{HB-2018}}$ - act concerning the Kansas Act against discrimination; relating to discrimination because of a handicap.

HB-2018 was discussed at some length.

Senator Anderson made the motion to amend HB-2018 as recommended in the balloon by the Advisory Committee on Employment of Handicapped. Senator Francisco seconded the motion.

Discussion followed. It was felt that the bill was extremely broad and was not the bill the interium committee agreed on.

Senator Ehrlich and members of the committee:



Dear Senators:

I am writing to briefly summarize my testimony yesterday on HB 2018. In essence, we are neither in favor of nor opposed to the enactment of this bill as it came out of the House. The only reason I rose to testify briefly was to respond to Mr. Ray Petty's suggestion that section 2 of the bill be changed to amend the definition of "handicap" to add: "or is regarded as having such an impairment".

The reason is that this would add a strong element of subjectivity and ambiguity to what I feel is presently a reasonably clear and manageable definition. I fear that the proposed language goes well beyond the problem to which Mr. Petty suggested it as a solution, and in practice its consequences would not be predictable. I respectfully urge the committee not to amend the carefully considered definition of "handicap" proposed by the House committee and adopted by the House.
