A question and answer period followed.


The committee requested information on the Job Training Program and on Contract Labor. The secretary said he would furnish updated information at a future date.

## JOB INSURANCE CLAIMS

WEEKLY HIGHLIGHTS

The insured unemployment rate for Kansas for the week ended December 28, 1985 jumped to 3.3 per cent from 2.8 per cent the previous week. The rate for the corresponding week of 1984 was 2.5 per cent. The number of initial claims filed during the week ended January 4, 1986 fell nearly 11 per cent from the prior week but remained almost 22 per cent above the level of a year ago. Several manufacturing layoffs occurred during the week, but the number was sharply lower than last week's unusually high levels. Most involved smaller groups of workers and were of short duration. Continued claims, however, rose 17 per cent as additional claimants from the previous week's heavy layoffs began receiving benefits. All payment activities increased significantly as the amount of benefits paid was nearly \$1,000,000 higher than total paid the prior week. The average weekly benefit amount of \$144.74 was just slightly higher than the previous week's level.
