Workers' Compensation Fund Background

The Kansas Workers' Compensation Fund, formerly called the Second Injury Fund, was created by statute in 1945. In 1974, the Fund's administration was assigned by the legislature to the Commissioner of Insurance.

The stated purpose of the Fund is to encourage the employment of "handicapped" persons by relieving employers of part or all of the liability for job-related injuries to such persons.

The Fund is financed by a legislative appropriation, which is presently capped at four million dollars; by assessments levied against insurance carriers and self-insured employers, based upon their expenditures for claims; and by a small amount of payments in death claims where there are no dependents.

Liability is imposed upon the Fund for three types of cases:

- (1) Second-injury cases, where the employee has a physical impairment and sustains a subsequent injury that aggravates his pre-existing impairment.
- (2) Insolvent Employer cases, where the employer is either unable to be located or uninsured and financially incapable of paying workers' compensation benefits.
- (3) Reimbursement cases, where the employer and insurance carrier pay compensation pursuant to a valid order, later judicially reversed.

The first of these categories, the second-injury cases, comprise the bulk of all the cases handled by the Fund. Liability is based upon the hiring or retention of a "handicapped" employee by the employer. Knowledge of the "handicap" by the employer is required. The employer may file a notice with the Division of Workers' Compensation which creates a legal presumption of "knowledge". This notice is referred to as a "Form 88".

Procedurally, in second-injury cases, the Fund must be made a party prior to the "first full hearing", where evidence is first presented. The Fund may be found liable for all of the compensation,

Att. #1 3-13-86 H. 4+I what is known as a "but-for" case, or part of the compensation, a contribution case.

The second category, insolvency cases, account for a small, but rising portion of the Fund's budget. Liability is founded upon an uninsured employer's inability to pay. Procedurally, the Fund may be brought in at virtually any time. The entirety of any Award is assessed against the Fund in such cases. A right of action against the employer then is given to the Fund by the statutes. Criminal sanctions are also available for willfull failure to obtain insurance.

The third category, reimbursement cases, account for a small part of the Fund's budget. Employers and insurance carriers may be reimbursed from the Fund for amounts paid pursuant to an Order later judicially reversed. This right is provided by the statutes. Certification by the Director of Workers' Compensation is the only prerequisite to Fund liability.

To administer the Fund, the Commissioner contracts with approximately forty attorneys throughout the state, who serve as defense counsel. Cases are assigned on a geographic basis to the attorneys, almost all of whom have extensive experience in workers' compensation.

At present, the Fund is involved in approximately 2300 open cases, and is brought into about 120 new cases each month.
