Chair then recognized Dr. Robert Harder, SRS to begin testimony.

Hearings began on HB 2664:--

Dr. Harder gave hand-out to members, (see Attachment No. 2.). He spoke in support of HB 2664, giving background. ## STATE DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL AND REHABILITATION SERVICES Statement Regarding H.B. 2664

- 1. <u>Title</u> Bureau of Child Research of the University of Kansas Act; amending K.S.A. 76-317 and repealing the existing section.
- 2. Purpose Current law permits the Bureau of Child Research to receive aid and cooperation of staff, equipment and research students from state schools, hospitals and institutions in regard to research activities. This bill would extend the opportunity for the Bureau to receive aid and cooperation to any aspect of the administration or operation of any institution upon the request of the Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services.
- 3. Background The Kansas University Bureau of Child Research has had a productive and cooperative relationship with SRS institutions in various research endeavors since the mid 1950's. When the Bureau established the Kansas University Affiliated Program at Parsons State Hospital and Training Center (PSH&TC) in 1972, the nature of the cooperative efforts expanded to include: (1) interdisciplinary staff training, (2) exemplary services for developmentally disabled individuals, and (3) dissemination of research findings relevant to the care, training, and treatment of the developmentally disabled. Those efforts have been exemplified most recently through: (1) the cooperative development of a PSH&TC program for severe behavior disordered mentally retarded individuals (1984), (2) the program for training Qualified Mental Retardation Professionals at all four state institutions for the mentally retarded (1985), and (3) the direct intervention by Bureau staff to remediate active treatment program deficiencies at Winfield State Hospital & Training Center, Kansas Neurological Institute, and Parsons State Hospital and Training Center (1985).
- 4. Effect of Passage This bill will acknowledge the expanded role and positive effects, and promote the continuation of the productive relationship between the Kansas University Bureau of Child Research and SRS state institutions.
- 5. <u>SRS Recommendation</u> The Department of SRS strongly supports legislation promoting the continued and expanded cooperation between the KUBCR and SRS institutions.
