Chairman Bunten called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m.

HB 3109 - concerning the state historical society; relating to the transfer and conveyance or closing of certain historic properties;

Larry Rutter, appeared on behalf of Joe Snell for the State Historical Society and provided a written statement ($\underbrace{Attachment\ B}$). The bill proposes to drop five state owned historic sites because of \underline{no} recommended funding. He cited several reasons why they should be retained by the state, and therefore requested that the committee table the bill.

John Myers addressed the committee and supported the bill. He said a review of all historical sites was conducted a few years ago and the report concluded that there was not enough historical significance to warrant keeping them on the state register. He also said that because of needed capital improvements it would be too costly to remodel. Another reason is the two additional sites under consideration this year. He said that in terms of the Governor's recommendations, it's a matter of choices and priorities in light of available funding.

Representative Solbach asked if he would object to this committee tabling the bill and bringing it back to the FY 1987 legislature for a decision. Mr. Myers replied that the study had been done, recommendations made and at some point, everyone has to come to an agreement on funding.

Wendy Schiappa, Chamber of Commerce, Manhattan, Kansas testified in opposition to the bill ($\underline{\text{Attachment C}}$). She said that the Goodnow Museum benefits tourism in Manhattan and that tourists are often more interested in state history than local history.

Chairman turned to HB 3111 - concerning the state conservation commission; relating to grants for conservation structures and improvements.

Ken Kern, representing the State Conservation Commission, appeared before the committee with a proposed amendment (Attachment D). Representative Louis moved that the amendment be adopted. Representative Teagarden seconded. Motion carried.

On the bill, Representative Hamm moved that HB 3111 be recommended favorably for passage. Seconded by Representative Louis. Motion carried.

HB 3116 - concerning the retirement system for judges; relating to membership for district magistrate judges.

Judge Leonard Mastroni, Kansas District Judges Association, testified in support of the bill. He said the bill is needed to bring the magistrate judges into the retirement system, and will be instrumental in attracting quality judges.

Marjorie Van Buren, Executive Assistant to the Judicial Administrator, testified in support of the bill (Attachment E). Supreme Court approves of this legislation. The total fiscal impact of this action would be \$131,899.

Marshal Crowther explained that the original rationale was based on an older age (about 45) for a judge going on the bench - this was considered in the benefit formula.

Chairman turned to HB 3119 - concerning the department of social and rehabilitation; authorizing sale of real property of certain institutions thereunder.

Dr. Robert Harder spoke to this issue. The bill came out of discussion with the subcommittee and it provides a mechanism for the Secretary to sell property not deemed necessary as it relates to SRS institutions. It would be land that is leased out for farm purposes. It was stated that Department of Transportation and Department of Administration have the same authority.

HB 3120 - concerning the requirement that each county have a judge of the district court whose residence and principal office are in the county.

Marjorie Van Buren, representing the Judicial Office, testified relative to the bill. She said that closing some of the courts would greatly reduce efficiency. She presented a handout (Attachment F) which is a ratio of clerical positions per judge-district courts. Attachment G contains other supporting data relative to this issue. She said that if the bill passes, her office could draw up a list of counties and recommend to the Supreme Court where judges could be eliminated. There would have to be a continuing need to provide judicial coverage and other judges would be moved around, and that would be costly. "We are not recommending the bill be passed, neither are we in support of the bill."

Russ Jennings, a magistrate judge from western Kansas, testified in opposition to the bill. He said that passage of the legislation would create a great inconvenience, particularly to his district, and would be costly in extra travel. He stated that many matters require immediate hearing and shifting of judges would restrict efficiency.

Chairman turned to HB 2825 - change of district magistrate judge to district judge in Pratt County.

Representative Hamm explained the bill for the committee. It would allow the present magistrate judge position to change to a district judge. The present magistrate has just resigned, so the position is now open. There has been a 24% increase of cases in Pratt county.

Judge Clarence Renner was introduced and he testified in support of the bill. He said there is such a backlog of unresolved cases, it's a real injustice to the people.

Representative Wunsch briefly stated his support, saying there would be a real advantage in service performed and it would really be getting a district judge for half price.

Supreme Court stated their support of the bill as long as it goes through the Legislature, the funding will follow.

STATEMENT OF JOSEPH W. SNELL, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR,
KANSAS STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY,
BEFORE THE HOUSE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE,
REGARDING HB 3109, MARCH 27, 1986.

If my understanding is correct, House Bill 3109, which authorizes and directs the State Historical Society to transfer five state owned historic sites to local units of government or other organizations was introduced as part of the governor's recommendation that those same sites receive no state funding in FY 1987.

This is the second time the governor has recommended no funding for four of these sites (the first attempt did not include Pawnee Rock). In 1982, after conducting public hearings, the legislature determined to continue funding of all four properties.

Eighteen months ago I was asked by the Division of the Budget to contact every legislator who had one or more of the four properties in his or her district to obtain their opinions regarding continued state operation. I visited with all but one of the legislators, plus a few others who I knew were interested, and without exception they, senator and representative, republican and democrat, were emphatic in their support of continued state operation.

I reported the results of this survey to the Society's budget analyst verbally at the beginning of the 1985 session.

This year, as you know, the House of Representatives already has not agreed with the Governor's recommendation and has restored funding for all five of the properties for FY 1987.

It is my understanding further that these five properties were chosen because of an in-house study which the State Historical Society conducted in 1978. I was then the newly appointed executive director of the Society and had applied for a self study grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. The grant was to allow us to examine ourselves minutely in an effort to become more efficient and responsive to the historical needs of the people of Kansas.

Several staff teams were appointed, one of these being the "Historic Sites-Field Programs Team." That team visited each property, studied its history and legislative background and made recommendations for developing "a rationale for the operation of historic properties by the Historical Society" and "criteria for the acquisition of additional historic properties" by the

state. It was also to prepare "specific recommendations and a detailed analysis of needs to upgrade the sites and to recommend retention, removal from the state system, or alternative uses for each site."

There were other tasks assigned to the team but they do not pertain to the issue contained in HB 3109.

I might say at this point that when the study was being conducted we did not have a central staff to care for the historic properties. Their management was relegated as additional duty to several employees of the Society whose primary responsibilities were far removed from battle grounds, Pony Express stations and Indian missions.

We now have an Historic Properties department with two able persons well trained in historic preservation and interpretation techniques managing the physical and historical requirements of the 18 sites out of a headquarters in the Research Center here in Topeka.

But back to the team which reported to me in January, 1979, and recommended, among other things, that the five properties now in question be transferred to a local unit of government, a local historical society or closed. The report was intended for my use as executive director and was never intended to be a policy statement of the State Historical Society. I was seeking information and advice only. What seemed as a good management exercise in 1978 has haunted me ever since.

As executive director I never agreed with the philosophy of eliminating those five properties or any others from the state system for several reasons.

First, all, to me, have historical significance enough to justify retention. I was, and still am, convinced that Pawnee Rock, a Santa Fe trail landmark; the Frederick Funston Home, where Maj. Gen. Frederick Funston, the Eisenhower of his day, grew to manhood; and the Isaac T. Goodnow Home, where the first superintendent of public instruction lived, are of statewide if not national significance. The John Brown Cabin has rare physical associations with that abolitionist leader and Highland Indian Mission, though duplicative as an Indian mission, is unique in location and association.

Secondly, I know how much these historic sites mean to the local citizenry. Often these sites are their chief evidence of the state's historical presence. They do not have ready access to the larger state owned historical complexes situated in Topeka. Local pride runs high and for that we are thankful.

Thirdly, because four of the five properties were donated to the state and accepted by legislative authorization it seems to me we have a moral obligation to maintain them forever. I realize that what the legislature does it can also cause to be undone but we made a pact with the donors and I believe strongly that we should continue to honor that pact.

Lastly, most of these properties are located in small communities or in rural areas where neither the local unit of government or a local historical orgaization has the financial means or professional expertise to care for them. When authorizing their acquisition the legislature generally cited outstanding historical significance. Are we now saying that we have rethought their history and the properties no longer have statewide importance?

I believe this is a bad bill for several reasons.

One of those deals with the bill's practicality. We are directed "on July 1, 1986, . . . [to] close and cease operating" the five sites. What becomes of the structures, all of which are on the National Register of Historic Places, between July 1 and the time we successfully transfer them? What happens to the structures if we aren't able to transfer them at all? Windows will be broken, roofs will leak, lawns will need to be mowed and so on. With no staff and no money how do we handle that?

I question, too, whether anyone has asked the local governments or organizations whether they would be interested in owning and managing these properties. Some of the properties, because repairs were made with federal historic preservation dollars, bear a covenant which requires they be maintained in perpetuity and open to the public at least 12 non-consecutive days a year. The new owner will be required to accept this covenant.

All in all, ladies and gentlemen, I think this is an extremely illogical move not only because of our proposed reneging on earlier promises but also because, at a time when we are attempting to develop the Kansas economy through increased travel and tourism, we close five parks which attract tourists. These properties also help instill pride in Kansas and few will argue that we don't need more of that.

I request that this committee table the bill and let it die.

The Manhattan Chamber of Commerce would like to urge you to not cut state funding for the Goodnow Memorial Home in Manhattan. There are three reasons we believe the Goodnow Home deserves state funding.

First, and foremost, Isaac J. Goodnow is a person of state historical significance. Mr. Goodnow helped to advance the cause of freedom in Kansas, and was one of our foremost educators, having served as state superintendent of public instruction and founder of the Kansas State Teachers Association and Bluemont Central College. The history of Kansas State University, of which Goodnow was an integral part, is of importance to the history of Kansas. Mr. Goodnow was also elected to the Kansas House of Representatives. We believe, therefore, that it is the responsibility of the state, not local government or private enterprise, to fund, preserve and promote the Goodnow Home.

A second reason we are interested in retaining state funding for this site is that the Goodnow Museum benefits tourism in Manhattan. Tourists are often more interested in state history than local history. The Manhattan Convention and Visitors Bureau promotes the fact that the Goodnow Home is a state historical site and lists it in our "Visitor Guide." We distribute more than 20,000 Visitor Guides annually.

Finally, before the Legislature considers cutting funds for a historical site that has been so designated since 1969, we believe you should also give serious consideration to sites you are considering adding (Topeka Curtis Home, HB2587 and LeCompton Constitutional Home, HB 3047.)

We sincerely hope you will continue to fund this historical site.

The Kansas District Magistrate Judges' Association requested, and the Supreme Court approved, that this year's budget provide for including DMJ's in the Judges' Retirement System. District magistrate judges are the only class of state judges who are not included in the Judges' Retirement System. In the interest of equity, it appears they should be provided for under this plan.

At the time of court unification, magistrates came under KPERS. Under the current KPERS plan, the state pays 4.3% of the cost and the employee pays 4.0%. Under the Judges' Retirement Plan, the state pays 8.7%, the employee 6.0%. Were the magistrates to come under this plan, the rate of employer costs would be 9.2%. The total fiscal impact of this action would be \$131,899.



REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

MR. SPEAKER:

Your Committee on Ways and Means

Recommends that House Bill No. 3111

"AN ACT concerning the state conservation commission; relating to grants for conservation structures and improvements; amending K.S.A. 1985 Supp. 2-1915 and repealing the existing section."

Be amended:

On page 1, in line 24, by striking "the construction of"; in line 28, before "water" by inserting "enduring"; also in line 28, by striking "structures or"; in line 29, by striking "improvements" and inserting in lieu thereof "practices installed"; in line 31, by striking all after "cost"; in line 32, by striking "construction"; also in line 32, by striking "structure or improvement" and inserting in lieu thereof "practice"; in line 37, by striking all preceding the period and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "for the planning and installation of such practices";

In the title, in line 18, by striking the following: "conservation structures and improvements" and inserting in lieu thereof "enduring water conservation practices";

And the bill be passed as amended.
