Chairman Bunten called the meeting to order at 8:10 a.m.

Others present (Attachment A)

SB 621 -- Limitation placed on number of medical school scholarships. This bill was heard previously in Ways and Means. An amendment (Attachment B) was presented which requires that a recipient of a scholarship who fails to apply for and enter an approved 3-year primary care postgraduate residency training program is required to repay all moneys plus interest at 10%, within 90 days of graduation.

Representative Heinemann objected to the 10% and moved that the bill be amended to reflect 15% interest rate. Representative Solbach seconded. Motion carried. Representative Heinemann also moved that the number limitation be changed from 25 to 50. Representative Rolfs seconded. Motion carried.

 $\frac{On}{SB}$ a motion by Representative Ott and a second by Representative Duncan, $\frac{C}{SB}$ 621, as amended, was reported favorable for passage.

STATE EMPLOYEE PLAN

Jim Wilson explained the bill draft (Attachment C). Ed Ahrens addressed the committee relative to the financing of the plan. Total funding of the plan would be \$13,936,986.

Representative Solbach moved to introduce the bill and recommend that it be referred to the Committee of the Whole. Representative Duncan seconded. Motion carried.

SB 719 -- State Board of Regents authorized to construct and equip a facility for care of clinical research on animals at university of Kansas. Marlin Rein spoke to the financing of the bill. The total cost would be \$5.2M. Representative Chronister toured the animal care facility and her subcommittee considered a renovation project as opposed to constructing a new building. However, after considering the federal funding from the National Institute of Health, it is the subcommittee's recommendation to go with the new construction.

Dr. Roger O. Lambson, Vice Chancellor and whose authority the animal care facility comes under, spoke to the committee. The USDA makes periodic inspection of the facility and the standards are now at a minimum. He urged the committee to approve the new construction measure.

Representative Rolfs made a motion that the loan would include an adjustable interest rate based on the 90-day T-Bill. Representative Teagarden seconded. Motion carried.

On the bill, Representative Luzzati moved and Representative Fuller seconded that SB 719, as amended, be recommended favorable for passage.

 $\overline{\text{MINUTES}}$ Chairman asked for a motion on the Minutes for March 31 through $\overline{\text{April 4}}$, and April 7 through 11, 1986. Representative Teagarden moved that the minutes be approved as written. Representative Ott seconded. Motion carried.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

Representative Rolfs presented for consideration a draft bill that is a "trailer" bill for SB 536, making it effective June 1, 1986 and December 1, 1986. Representative Heinemann seconded. Motion carried to introduce the bill.

Representative Moomaw addressed the committee and requested introduction of a bill relating to raising the eligible age for obtaining an archery permit. This would be a trailer bill to raise the age back to 16. Representative Solbach moved that the bill be introduced and reported favorable for passage. Seconded by Representative Ott. Motion carried.

Following adjournment of the Full House today, Chairman Bunten called a meeting of the committee for the purpose of considering the possible introduction of a bill concerning zoning as it relates to group home locations. On a motion by Representative Duncan and a second by Representative Ott, the committee voted to recommend favorably the introduction of the bill.

On page 6, in line 231, by striking "and" and inserting in lieu thereof a comma; also in line 231, after "(3)" by inserting "and (4)";

On page 7, by striking all in lines 247 to 252, inclusive, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"(2) Any person first awarded a scholarship after December 31, 1985, who fails to apply for and enter an approved three-year primary care postgraduate residency training program shall be required to repay all moneys received pursuant to an agreement entered into for any such scholarship, plus accumulated interest at an annual rate of 10%, within 90 days of graduation from the school of medicine."

HOUSE BILL NO. ______ By Committee on Ways and Means

AN ACT concerning state officers and employees; relating to salaries and compensation; authorizing and providing for certain increases and certain revisions of classification and compensation of positions in the clerical job class series; making appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1987, and authorizing certain transfers and adjustments in expenditure limitations therefor.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

The governor is hereby authorized Section 1. (a) and directed to modify the pay plan adopted pursuant to section 1 of chapter 278 of the 1985 Session Laws of Kansas in accordance with this section and to adopt such pay plan as so modified. existing pay plan shall be modified to provide for an increase of adjusted to the nearest dollar in each monthly step of the schedule of salary and wage ranges and steps of such pay plan or equivalent increase for payroll periods other than monthly. The pay plan adopted by the governor under this subsection shall be the pay plan for the classified service under the Kansas civil service act and shall be effective on the first day of the first payroll period which is chargeable to the fiscal year ending on June 30, 1987. Such pay plan shall be subject to modification and approval as provided under K.S.A. 75-2938 and amendments thereto and to any enactments of the legislature applicable thereto.

(b) (1) The governor, in the governor's discretion, is hereby authorized to modify or authorize the modification of the salaries of state officers and employees who are in the unclassified service under the Kansas civil service act and whose salaries are subject to approval by the governor under K.S.A.

75-2935b or 75-2935c and amendments thereto to provide for an average increase of 3% adjusted to the nearest dollar for each monthly payroll period or the equivalent increase for payroll periods other than monthly, effective on the first day of the first payroll period which is chargeable to the fiscal year ending on June 30, 1987.

- Except as otherwise provided by this subsection (b)(2),each elected state official of the executive branch of state government, including the state board of education and the board of trustees of the Kansas public employees retirement system, in such official or board's discretion, is hereby authorized to modify or to authorize the modification of the salaries of the state officers and employees of such official or board who are in the unclassified service under the Kansas civil service act and whose salaries are not subject to approval by the governor under K.S.A. 75-2935b and amendments thereto, to provide for an average increase of 3% adjusted to the nearest dollar for each monthly payroll period or the equivalent increase for payroll periods other than monthly, effective on the first day of the first payroll period which is chargeable to the fiscal year ending on June 30, 1987. The provisions of this subsection (b)(2) shall not apply to any state officers or employees under the jurisdiction of the state board of regents who are in the unclassified service under the Kansas civil service act.
- Sec. 2. (a) Upon recommendation of the director of the budget, the state finance council, acting on this matter which is hereby characterized as a matter of legislative delegation and subject to the guidelines prescribed in subsection (c) of K.S.A. 75-3711c and amendments thereto, except paragraph (3) of such subsection (c), is hereby authorized to increase expenditure limitations on special revenue funds and accounts established for the fiscal year ending on June 30, 1987, for the purpose of paying from such funds or accounts the proportionate share of the cost to such funds or accounts, including associated employer contributions, of: (1) The salary increases provided for by

adoption of the pay plan under subsection (a) of section 1; (2) the salary increases for unclassified state officers and employees provided for under subsection (b) of section 1; and (3) the revision of the classification and compensation of positions in the clerical job class series which is chargeable to payroll periods ending after December 31, 1986.

- There is hereby appropriated from the state general fund for the state finance council, for the fiscal year ending on June 30, 1987, the sum of \$12,572,921 to be used for the purpose of paying the proportionate share of the cost to the state general fund, including associated employer contributions, salary increases resulting from adoption of the pay plan under subsection (a) of section 1; (2) the salary increases for unclassified state officers and employees provided for under subsection (b) of section 1; and (3) the revision of the classification and compensation of positions in the clerical job class series which is chargeable to payroll periods ending after December 31, 1986. To pay the proportionate share of the cost to the state general fund of each state agency of the executive branch of state government for such salary increases and such revision, upon recommendation of the director of the budget, the state finance council, acting on this matter which is hereby characterized as a matter of legislative delegation and subject to the guidelines prescribed in subsection (c) of K.S.A. 75-3711c and amendments thereto, except paragraph (3) of such subsection (c), is hereby authorized and directed to transfer moneys from the appropriation made by this subsection to proper accounts created by state general fund appropriations for the fiscal year ending on June 30, 1987.
- (c) Each state agency of the executive branch of state government, which employs officers and employees who are (1) receiving salary increases provided for by adoption of the pay plan under subsection (a) of section 1 or by adoption of the salary increases for unclassified state officers and employees provided for under subsection (b) of section 1 or (2) in

positions subject to the revision of the classification and compensation of positions in the clerical job class series, shall prepare and submit a budget estimate for such salary increases and such revision, and all amendments and revisions of such estimates, to the director of the budget. At the same time as each state agency submits such estimate, and all amendments and revisions thereof, each such state agency shall submit a copy of such estimate, and all amendments and revisions thereof, directly to the legislative research department.

This letter is to document the information I provided to you by telephone yesterday.

My Office has reviewed the Animal Welfare Assurance submitted on behalf of the University of Kansas Medical Center. The acceptability of your Animal Welfare Assurance is dependent on the adequacy of the plan for improvements included in the Assurance.

A critical component of the plan which you submitted is the completion of a new animal care facility. If it is decided that your animal care facility will not be built, your plan then becomes fatally flawed and your Animal Welfare Assurance not acceptable for meeting the requirements of the Public Health Service Policy for the Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals by Awardee Institutions and the NIH Guide for the Care and Use of Laboratory Animals.

Please keep me informed on this matter.
