The minutes of March 4 were approved.

The hearing began on SB 667 dealing with nonprofit dental service corporations. Don Hortter, Delta Dental Plan, testified in support of the bill saying that it is a house-keeping measure that makes the dental bill identical to the hospital and medical services bills. He informed the committee that the insurance department had found that an amendment is needed in the bill due to an oversight on his part. It would be a new Section I. (See Attachment I.)

The chairman asked for a definition of "capitation" which is included in the amendment. Mr. Hortter explained that each dentist who agrees to participate in the program gets a flat fee to care for individuals or families. He likened it to a dental HMO.

The chairman noted that staff would need to amend the title and repealer.

Sen. Burke asked why the bill applies to nonprofit corporations only. Mr. Hortter said that those for profit are under a different section.

Mr. Hortter continued saying that the other changes are an attempt to keep it public service oriented and consumer controlled.

Ron Todd, Kansas Ir surance Department, stated that the department had worked with Delta Dental on the language in the bill and has no problems with the bill. It does not change any policy.

Sen. Strick asked for an explanation of the term "nonprofit" noting that dentists do make a profit. Mr. Hortter said that although the dentist does make a profit, the corporation itself cannot make a profit. If the corporation does make a profit, it must be returned to the insureds, and the dentist's fees must be reasonable and customary.

Sen. Burke made a motion to adopt the proposed amendment and that staff make the appropriate addition to the title and repealer. Sen. Werts seconded, and the motion carried.

Sen. Burke made a motion to report SB 667 favorably as amended. Sen. Harder seconded, and the motion carried.

At this time, the chairman expressed his thanks and appreciation to the insurance subcommittee for the long hours they have spent on the study of the availability of and cost of liability insurance.

Sen. Kerr made a motion to discuss further SB 636 dealing with detached auxiliary banking services. Sen. Werts seconded the motion. The chairman was uncertain of the voice vote and called for a show of hands. The motion failed on a tie vote.

The meeting was adjourned.

K.S.A. 40-19a02 is hereby amended to read as follows: 40-19a02. Organization; purposes; function as administrative agent for group programs. Nonprofit corporations may be organized for the purpose of entering into contracts with participating dentists to provide or administer professional service for subscribers on such bases as may be designated in the corporation's contracts with purchasing groups, individuals and government Such corporations may provide service or indemnity benefits. Compensation for professional services shall be either on a scheduled basis, capitation basis or on the basis of usual, customary and reasonable charges. Inherent in the authority provided hereby is the right of any such corporation to function as an administrative agent with respect to any group dental care program installed by a private organization for its employees or members, or with respect to any dental care program initiated by any local, state or federal governmental body.
