The Chairman called the meeting to order and introduced <u>SB 581</u> which establishes an employee suggestion award program. He introduced Charles Dodson who spoke in support of this bill. He pointed out that this bill takes the decision making process out of the hands of the agencies and places it in the hands of the top legislative and administrative leadership. He felt that a suggestion awards program supported by the legislature and executive branches would save the state millions of dollars and gave examples of other states where this had been the case. (Exhibit A)

The Revisor distributed copies of a balloon version of SB 581 and explained the changes therein. (Exhibit B)

The Chairman announced that this bill will be rescheduled again at a later date to be reworked.

The Revisor then distributed substitute bills for $\underline{\text{HB }2153}$ and $\underline{\text{HB }2237}$. (Exhibits C & D) He explained certain rules for giving the tests and also pointed out again that the local units would administer the tests.

Betty Rose presented testimony from the Chairman of the Kansas State Board of Technical Professions explaining that it would be too expensive for the benefits derived and would be philosophically incompatable with their existing functions for them to be used as the licensing and regulatory body for the plumbers and electricians. (Exhibit E)

Inasmuch as there was no more time, the Chairman stated that the discussion would continue at the next meeting.

A motion was made by Senator Winter to approve the minutes of the February 17th meeting. This was seconded by Senator Bogina. Motion carried.

The meeting was then adjourned by the Chairman.

We are definitely in support of SB 581. If properly implemented, the provisions of this bill will give the employees of the state the ability to create their own merit pay program. Increased efficiency and increased productivity save the state money. To the employee - if you suggested the idea that you get paid 10% or \$5000 whichever is less - that's a pure merit program.

We now have a Suggestion Awards Program in Kansas. But, it only works in limited and isolated cases. We believe that if you understand the mentality of bureaucracy, the shortcomings of the existing program become apparent. First, employees in representative government must work in a fish bowl. Every action they take or do not take is held open for public scrutiny. Consequently, whenever they act or fail to act, part of the accompanying performance is the development of a defense for the action or lack of action. This is not something to be condemned,

for it is essential to their survival as a public employee. The system would destroy them if they weren't prepared to defend their actions.

Under the existing Suggestion Awards Program, the agencies are responsible for the approval or disapproval of suggestions. That is, the very people who make the decisions and are prepared to defend them, now are called upon to approve suggestions which impact on those decisions. The reaction is that if it is such a good idea then I should have thought of it as a part of my job. Therefore, if I approve the suggestion, it's an admission of a shortcoming in my performance. So, we reject the idea.

The employees making the suggestions lose faith in the system and stop participating. The result is a suggestion awards program on paper that was doomed from the beginning because it failed to consider the nature of public employment.

The proposed SB 581 however, takes the decision making process out of the hands of the agencies and places it in the hands of the top legislative and administrative leadership. That is, people whose responsibilities require them to seek out ways to increase productivity and efficiency in government.

The very nature which causes agency employees to reject good suggestions would cause the Suggestion Award Board as created by this bill to closely examine the proposals and approve the suggestions with merit and make the awards.

We believe this to be the critical difference and the difference which would cause the Suggestion Awards Program as

proposed in SB 581 to work.

A suggestion awards program which is supported by the legislature and executive branches with proper advertising and encouragement can and shall save the state of Kansas millions of dollars. At the same time, such a program can and will instill a sense of pride and involvement on the part of all employees.

Will a good suggestion awards program work? We believe it can. Where it is encouraged, the savings can be very large. Just a few examples from our files of past experiences in other states prove this point.

For example, in FY 1982, Michigan recorded a first-year savings of \$1,374,420 from 158 adopted suggestions.

In FY 1982, the chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee in Tennessee reported, "the savings this year have already approached \$2 million."

So, the savings generated in a good program can be substantial. The benefits to employees are obvious.

AN ACT

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

New Section 1. (a) The state board of technical professions, on or before March 1 in each year, shall adopt and certify examinations for the determination of the qualifications of persons seeking licensure as plumbing contractors and master and journeyman plumbers. Such examinations shall be written examinations designed to fairly test the applicant's knowledge in the class of plumbing work in which the applicant seeks licensure.

(b) The state board shall adopt rules and regulations: (1) Governing the conduct and grading of such examinations; (2) prescribing requirements for passage of examinations; (3) fixing a uniform amount to be charged all applicants for examination and licensure, based upon examinations adopted and certified pursuant to this act; and (4) prescribing a distinctive notation to be made upon the license of all persons successfully passing such examinations.

New Sec. 2. Any county or city requiring the licensure of persons practicing plumbing within the county or city may conduct examinations adopted and certified by the board of technical professions pursuant to section 1 of this act. Such examinations shall be conducted in accordance with the rules and regulations of the board of technical professions adopted therefor. Any license granted upon the basis of the satisfactory passage of an examination adopted and certified pursuant to section 1 shall bear the distinctive notation prescribed by the board of technical professions and shall permit the licensee to practice without additional licensure or fee in all counties and cities of



Such examinations shall be written examinations designed to fairly test the applicant's knowledge in the class of electrical work in which the applicant seeks licensure.

(b) The state board shall adopt rules and regulations: (1) Governing the conduct and grading of such examinations; (2) prescribing requirements for passage of examinations; (3) fixing a uniform amount to be charged all applicants for examination and licensure, based upon examinations adopted and certified pursuant to this act; and (4) prescribing a distinctive notation to be made upon the license of all persons successfully passing such examinations.

New Sec. 2. Any county or city requiring the licensure of electricians practicing within the county or city may conduct examinations adopted and certified by the board of technical professions pursuant to section 1 of this act. Such examinations shall be conducted in accordance with the rules and regulations of the board of technical professions adopted therefor. Any license granted upon the basis of the satisfactory passage of an examination adopted and certified pursuant to section 1 shall bear the distinctive notation prescribed by the board of technical professions and shall permit the licensee to practice without additional licensure or fee in all counties and cities of



the state requiring licensure of electricians.

New Sec. 3. Nothing in this act shall restrict or affect the authority of any county or city to: (1) Provide alternative methods and procedures for determining the qualifications of electricians for licensure to practice only within the city prescribing such jurisdiction of the county or qualifications; (2) adopt and enforce such electric codes regulations as the governing body of the county or city shall deem appropriate; and (3) conduct such inspections and fix such reasonable fees as the governing body of the county or city may prescribe.

TESTIMONY BEFORE THE GOVERNMENTAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

The Kansas State Board of Technical Professions appreciates this opportunity to testify before your committee by way of our Executive Secretary, Ms. Betty L. Rose.

It is our understanding that in your discussions concerning House Bill 2237 and House Bill 2153, you have considered using the Kansas State Board of Technical Professions as a licensing and regulatory body for plumbers and electricians.

The Board would respectfully submit that there are fundamental differences between the professions of engineering and architecture and the plumbing and electrical trades. For example: A building may be designed by a professional engineer and architect but it is constructed by various contractors. In much the same way a mechanical or electrical engineer may $\underline{\text{design}}$ a system that is $\underline{\text{installed}}$ by electricans and plumbers. Contractors are not and should not be licensed by the board, neither should electricans and plumbers be licensed by the board.

The current opposition is pecuniary in nature. Our further administrative budget of the Kansas State Board of Technical Professions is \$189,774 per year. Roughly estimating the number of electricians and plumbers as at least equal to the number of current registrants, it could cost as much as \$142,330 to \$189,774 to provide the services you are discussing.

In closing, we would simply reiterate that using the Kansas State Board of Technical Professions to regulate the two trades in question, would be far too expensive for the benefits derived and would be philosophically incompatable with our existing functions.

Nothing in this act shall be construed to allow any person, firm, corporation, partnership, association or combination thereof to engage in the practice of engineering as defined by K.S.A. 74-7003 without having first received a license or authorization to practice engineering by the Kansas State Board of Technical Professions.
