H.B. 3105 - concerning county health funds; relating to tax levies therefor.

Staff reviewed the statutes and recommended some amendments that might clarify the law, such as, counties may levy up to 2 mills without an election and anything above that would be subject to a protest petition election or you could simply make any amount over what they were authorized to levying in 1974 subject to a protest petition rather than a mandatory election as it is now.

Staff was asked to get a copy of the Attorney General's Opinion concerning this law for the committee to review.

Elizabeth Taylor spoke in support of the bill and she stated (Attachment I) her organization could support the recommendations made by staff.


Fred Allen spoke in support of the bill and presented a letter from the Butler County Board of Health supporting the bill, also, a brochure listing the services available from the Bi-County Health Department serving Butler and Greenwood Counties. (Attachment II) Mr. Allen also stated he could support the amendments recommended by staff.

Ernie Davis stated he could support the recommendations of staff.

Beverly Gaines, R.N., Administrator/Health Officer, for the Bi-County Health Department supported the proposed amendments.

After committee discussion, Senator Gaines moved to use staff's recommendations and conceptually amend the bill and pass the bill as amended. Senator Boginia seconded the motion. The motion carried.

RE: House Bill 3105

Thank you for the opportunity for the Kansas Association of Local Health Departments to support the changes provided for through House Bill 3105.

The KALHD, with membership of approximately 75 local health departments, represents 80% of the public health needs of Kansas.

The KALHD unanimously supports the ability for the local health departments to receive additional funding through the levying of funds at the local level. Because of the statutory limitations imposed in 1984 freezing the mill levy lid, this ability has been severely hampered. Currently, the local governments are not allowed the same level of flexibility which they would be allowed under passage of House Bill 3105 to increase the mill levy limit.

Again, thank you for the opportunity to offer our support of House Bill 3105.



COMMUNITY SERVICES

HOMEMAKER/HOME HEALTH AIDE

- * Staff assists weekly with household chores, errands, respite care, bathing, etc. Must be 60 years old to qualify. (Butler County only)

CASE MANAGEMENT

- * Help people wade through red tape and lack of information to obtain services they need.
- * Provide home visits, assessments, care planning, referrals to community programs, and ongoing monitoring.

KANSAS DEPARTMENT ON AGING

VOLUNTEER CARE GIVER PROJECT

Dear Senate Local Government Committee Members:

The purpose of this letter is to request your support for HB 3105. The Butler and Greenwood County Commissions are the Board of Health for the Bi-County Health Department. The Board of Health is concerned about providing public health services to the community.

As you are probably aware, these services are essential during increases in unemployment and a declining economy. Federal cutbacks and increased local match from the State Health Department and Medicaid denial of home visits are also contributing to the need for additional local funds.

HB 3105 would amend KSA 65-204 to allow the cap (limited in the year 1974) for a county health mill levy for the funding of local health departments to be raised to 2 mills with a protest petition.

It is unfair and arbitrary that counties are limited to the year 1974; no other laws are based on specific years that we are aware of. We feel it is not a good precedent to opt out under home rule when the existing law needs revision.

We would sincerely appreciate assistance in moving this legislation because we are concerned that additional health funds will be needed in 1987. Thank you for your consideration of this matter.
