SB-569 - Senator Hayden presented the fiscal note, pie charts and a life expectancy chart to the committee for their information. Attachments I, and III. Discussion included the retaliatory tax, the needs of EMS and the people and what would happen to the amount of money not needed. Senator Hayden moved that SB-569 be passed out favorable. Senator Anderson seconded the motion. Division was called for and the vote was 3-5. The motion did not pass.

Senator Francisco asked if a conceptual motion could be made that funds not necessary would be transferred to the general fund. <u>Senator Hayden so moved</u> with <u>Senator Francisco seconding the motion</u>. During further discussion staff stated it would be necessary to state an amount to be transferred. Senator Hayden stated that several sponsors of the bill did not vote for the bill and that he respectfully requested that if he had misrepresented the bill in any way to them as sponsors he would want to apologize to them but he did not feel he had done so, that the bill was exactly as it was when they were approached. There was no indication from any of the committee members that the bill had been misrepresented to them. The pending conceptual motion was changed to read that 20% of the funds would be transferred to the general fund. The question was called, the motion failed and division was called. The vote was 4-5 with the motion losing.

- SB-590 The chairman stated that the committee would not work SB-590.
- SB-625 The chairman stated that this bill was requested by Senator Burke and that there were some amendments. The chairman had been in touch with the House Local Government Committee and their chairman, Representative Sands stated they had a bill co-sponsored by two legislators of Shawnee who would like to have the bill run and it will come to us from the House. committee will take no action.
- $\underline{SB-639}$ The chairman stated there would be no action on $\underline{SB-639}$.
- SB-651 The chairman has requested that this bill be sent to Federal and State Affairs or Ways and Means to be re-referred to this committee. Senator Morris stated that he felt the committee should send a clear message to all concerned that if they don't take steps to get together the committee will take action. The Chairman stated that he would schedule time for questioning and considering amendments.
- SB-670 Senator Morris stated this bill would permit the shifting of funds available. It was moved by Senator Morris that SB-670 be passed out favorable. Senator Salisbury seconded the motion and the motion carried.
- SB-671 Senator Hayden made the motion to pass SB-671 out favorable with a second from Senator Anderson. The motion carried with a 5-4 vote.

Fiscal Note for Senate Bill No. 569 by Senators Hayden, Allen, Anderson, et al

In accordance with K.S.A. 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning Senate Bill No. 569 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

Senate Bill No. 569 creates the Emergency Medical Services Development Fund and provides for revenue to this fund through a .25 percent tax on life insurance premiums. Expenditures from this fund would support Bureau of Emergency Medical Services operations, grants-in-aid and other assistance. Grants-in-aid and other assistance would be limited to agencies providing education or training in emergency medical services (EMS), ambulance services, emergency medical services and Emergency Medical Services Regional Councils.

The Insurance Department estimates revenue generated for this fund at \$1.45 million annually beginning in FY 1988. FY 1987 revenues would be approximately \$725,000. Revenues to the State General Fund would be reduced by at least \$130,000 but possibly as much as \$460,000 annually due to reductions in retaliatory tax receipts. It is also estimated that revenues from annual privilege tax collections will be reduced approximately \$1,500.

The FY 1987 budget for the Bureau of Emergency Medical Services within the Kansas Highway Patrol is recommended at \$333,010 for state operations and \$154,000 for grants-in-aid. Of this amount, \$455,010 would be from the State General Fund. Passage of this act would allow for a reduction in expenditures from the State General Fund by this amount.

Upon passage of this act, state operations would be increased \$30,186 for a Registered Nurse V to initiate and coordinate a program of increased grants-in-aid. units, and grants and other assistance could be increased approximately \$207,804 in FY 1987 and an additional \$725,000 in subsequent years.

In summary, passage of this act would reduce expenditures from the State General Fund, reduce revenues to the State General Fund, and provide for a new fund to support EMS activities which would be funded by revenues generated through a new tax on life insurance premiums. These modifications in revenue and expenditures are not reflected in the FY 1987 Governor's Budget Report.




REVENUE SOURCES


