HB 2801 - Department of Transportation

Committee members were given the opportunity to ask questions following Senator Doyen's review of the subcommittee report.

HB 3026 - Section 2 - Department of Transportation

Senator Doyen presented the subcommittee report on Section 2, and committee members were given the opportunity to question him.

Motion was made by Senator Doyen and seconded by Senator Johnston to adopt the subcommittee report. The motion carried by voice vote.

HB 2801 - Highway Patrol

Members of the committee were given the opportunity to question Senator Doyen following his review of the subcommittee report.

HB 2758 - Section 3 - Highway Patrol

Senator Doyen reviewed the subcommittee report on this section. Senator Kerr asked if there is a problem regarding patrol of Kansas highways during the night. Senator Doyen said it is a problem, particularly in more populated areas. He noted that, in some areas, the state has city police backup. Members of the subcommittee agreed that there is need for more troopers, and explained that there has been a net gain of one trooper since FY 1985. They further agreed that troopers need to be added each year.

Senator Gaines observed that perhaps the Superintendent of the Highway Patrol needs to look at a redistribution of troopers across the state. He suggested that metropolitan areas, such as Kansas City, and Interstate 70 need more patrol people.

Senator Bogina stated that the City of Kansas City has issued a letter to the Highway Patrol that the city will not be responsible to patrol interstates within Wyandotte County. He added that Sedgwick County has never assumed that responsbility.

Col. Moomau said that, in some isolated areas, there are people patroling until 3:00 a.m.. He said that, in order to have patrolmen on duty 24 hours a day, it would be necessary to rob day shifts.

There was discussion about the need for additional troopers, with Highway Patrol representatives explaining that a recent study suggested the need for 137 additional troopers over a period of several years. Answering a question from Senator Johnston, Senator Bogina said that distribution of troopers over the state is based on a number of factors, including mileage and population.

Motion was made by Senator Doyen and seconded by Senator Gaines to adopt the subcommittee reports on Highway Patrol. The motion carried by voice vote.

Motion was made by Senator Doyen and seconded by Senator Gaines to report $\overline{\rm HB}$ 3026 as amended and $\overline{\rm HB}$ 2758 as amended favorably for passage. The motion carried by roll call vote.

ACTION ON BILLS PREVIOUSLY HEARD

SB 643 - Relating to the university press; exemptions for certain contracts

Senator Bogina reminded the committee that they had requested the Director of the university Press and the Department of Administration to work out differences and report back. He stated that he had received a letter from Mr. Woodward, Director of the University Press, and had spoken to Secretary Shields of the Department of Administration. There is now agreement on the bill, with the deletion of certain language in New Section 1, as follows:

Delete all language in line 24 after the word "Kansas" and in line 25 before "shall"; and the word "not" in line 25. (See Attachment A)

Motion was made by Senator Feleciano and seconded by Senator Johnston to report SB 643 as amended favorably for passage. The motion carried by roll call vote.

SB 168 - Community Corrections Act; relating to chargebacks to counties

The Chairman then called the committee's attention to certain amendments needed for SB 168. (See Attachment B)

Motion was made by Senator Feleciano and seconded by Senator Johnston to amend SB 168 as noted in Attachment B. The motion carried by voice vote.

Motion was made by Senator Werts and seconded by Senator Harder to report SB 168 as amended favorably for passage. The motion carried by roll call vote.

 ${\tt SB~681}$ - Joint Council on Recreation designated as official state agency to accept certain federal funds

There was conversation concerning this measure, and it was noted that there has been agreement between the Fish and Game Commission and the park and Resources Authority. Therefore, the bill is not necessary.

Motion was made by Senator Werts and seconded by Senator Doyen to report SB 681 adversely. The motion carried by roll call vote.

Dear Senator Bogina:

At the conclusion of the 5 March hearing on Senate Bill No. 643, you urged me to meet with Nicholas B. Roach, Director of Purchases, to discuss how the Division of Purchases might accommodate our unmet purchasing needs. Accordingly we met in Topeka on the 14th of March, and yesterday I received a letter confirming our discussion. Hence, I am pleased to state that the University Press of Kansas no longer seeks a statutory exemption from the competitive bid requirement (K.S.A. 75-3739). With Mr. Roach's cooperation, the proposed changes in purchasing procedures, if satisfactorily implemented, should correct the deficiencies that have made our operation less economical, less efficient, and less effective than it could have been.

Consequently, I am requesting that Senate Bill No. 643 be amended (as indicated on the attached copy) to provide an exemption only from K.S.A. 75-1005. Since the 5 March hearing, I have spoken twice to Secretary Alden K. Shields about the proposed statutory exemption. In light of my requested amendment and with the understanding that we will give KU's Printing Service the opportunity to bid on appropriate work, Secretary Shields has indicated his support for the amended Senate Bill No. 643. I believe that he will affirm this to you directly.

Accordingly, I hope that the Senate Committee on Ways and Means is able to reconsider the amended Senate Bill No. 643 at its earliest opportunity and to take favorable action. Of course I plan to be at any hearing to answer questions that may arise.

SENATE BILL No. 643

By Committee on Ways and Means

AN ACT concerning the university of Kansas; relating to the university press; providing bidding and other exemptions for certain contracts for services; amending K.S.A. 75-1005 and repealing the existing section.

0021 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

New Section 1. Contracts entered into by the university of Kansas for the acquisition of typesetting, printing, binding and related services for the university press of Kansas may be negotiated and shall not be subject to the competitive bid requirements of K.S.A. 75-3739 and amendments thereto and shall not be subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 75-1005 and amendments thereto.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 75-1005 is hereby amended to read as follows: 75-1005. The division of printing shall do all of the public printing and binding required by the legislature, the supreme court, the governor or any state agency. Any state institution where a printing plant is already established may be permitted to do printing for the institution when approved by the director of printing. When the director of printing is of the opinion that a particular printing job should be obtained in the commercial market, such director(, unless otherwise instructed by the secretary of administration), may authorize any state agency to so obtain such printing in accordance with laws relating to purous chasing. The provisions of this section shall not apply to contact tracts entered into under section 1 or as otherwise provided by the law.

0043 Sec. 3. K.S.A. 75-1005 is hereby repealed.

OO44 Sec. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and OO45 after its publication in the statute book.
