Senator Bogina distributed Attachments A and B, and explained to the committee that the figures shown are estimated cuts in various budgets if there is no tax increase this year. He noted that these figures present the worst possible scenario at this point. He added that, since the House of Representatives defeated the measure authorizing a 1-cent sales tax increase, this may be the end result.

There followed an extended discussion concerning the possibilities of some tax increases, whether they be on income, motor fuel, or sales. Senator Talkington said he is hopeful that everything will fall into place, but it is necessary to face the eventuality that this will not happen. He stressed that, even if the 1-cent sales tax should be enacted and become effective on July 1, 1986, there would still be need for spending cuts.

Senator Bogina concluded this part of the meeting by stating that he wanted the committee to be aware of the problem facing the Legislature.

## INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

Mr. Coldsnow appeared to bring the committee up to date on a continuing problem at the University of Kansas Medical Center resulting from a defective electric meter at the hospital following some construction there. He briefly reviewed the history of the claims by the Board of Public Utilities of Kansas City, Kansas, and payment by the state. He said an amount of \$133,000 was paid upon release of all claims by the BPU against the State of Kansas. Subsequently, the BPU brought a claim of \$3.075 million. Following a series of motions, etc., there has resulted a settlement offer of \$1.5 million. The proposition is to settle the first \$500,000 during FY 1986, and the final \$1 million in FY 1987 with interest at 10% on the \$1 million until paid. This, according to Mr. Coldsnow, would be approximately \$17,000 for two months.

Senator Bogina explained that this would involve introducing a multi-year appropriations bill to provide payments as described by Mr. Coldsnow. Following a short discussion, motion was made by Senator Gaines and seconded by Senator Harder to introduce the appropriations bill to provide for the settlement, and to request that the bill be sent to Committee of the Whole. The motion carried by roll call vote.

The Chairman said two additional bills have been presented to the committee for introduction. They are: (1) Bill Draft RS 2856, concerning applying the provisions of the sunset law to the public disclosure commission; and (2) an amendment to the law concerning claims against the state, providing that certain payments be made from petty cash. (Bill Draft RS 2858)
