SB 9 -- concerning District Courts, creation of new judge positions. Bill Carpenter, Shawnee County judge testified there is concern about what is happening with civil cases. He feels that one additional judge is a modest request and asked for support of the bill. Chairman Bunten asked if there is space for the additional person. Mr. Carpenter said that at this moment, the space is not there, but the space problem can be solved. Testimony presented by Marjorie Van Buren (Attachment 2)

Judge Walton presented a booklet titled "Tenth Judicial District" as testimony. It is on file in the Appropriations Committee office. He said that Johnson County has the highest case load in the State and that cases are piling up in the courts. He said there is a freeze right now which prevents the transfer of judges into Johnson County.

Judge Fry testified on behalf of Sedgwick County. He is an administrative judge. He said that Sedgwick County has about 20% of all cases in the State. They do have the space for the additional judges.

The total fiscal note on SB 9 is \$328,000. Representative Vancrum moved that SB 9 be recommended favorable for passage. Seconded by Representative Dyck. The motion carried. The vote was close with Chairman breaking the tie.

 $\underline{\text{SB 31 -- Acquisition of historic property for preservation.}}$  Joe Snell appeared on the bill. He said that he is concerned about the increasing attitude in the legislature which requires community financial involvement in historic sites. There was committee discussion concerning the percent of qualified electors of the county that are required to sign the application for acquisition. (Attachment 3)

Representative Solbach moved to delete the language contained in lines 65-70 that deals with local financial assistance. Seconded by Representative Turnquist. Motion failed. He then moved to strike language in Lines 37-40 which specifies 1.5% of qualified electors and put in 500 each qualified electors. Representative Vancrum suggested an alternative plan to say that perhaps 1,000 interested people, but not less than 25 of which would be qualified electors in the county Seconded by Representative qualified electors in the county. Seconded by Representative Teagarden. Motion carried.

Representative Solbach offered a motion to leave the overall figure at 1,000 but require the number out of that to be at least equal to 1.5% in which the property is located, or 250 each, whichever is less. This will protect the Simall counties.

Seconded. Motion failed been transcribed verbatim. Individual remarks as reported herein have not been submitted to the individuals appearing before the committee for addition or corrections.

Representative Brady offered a motion to preclude those that are already on the Register of Historical Sites. Seconded by Representative Dyck.

Representative Brady moved to report SB 31, as amended, favorable for passage. Seconded by Representative Dyck. motion carried.

#### SB 389 - relating to medical scholarship agreement obligations.

The bill was requested by KU Med Center to address some technical problems. Vickie Thomas, legal counsel for KU addressed the committee. She explained the changes that were made in the bill and said that they (KU Med Center) could live with the bill as amended by the Senate, but they would prefer the original version of the bill. She said those individuals who remain in the state have the same obligation for repayment as if they leave the state, so there is no incentive for them to remain in Kansas. What they would like to see in the bill is a provision that if an individual remains in Kansas, then he or she is not required to pay back the tuition portion of the agreement, only the stipend.

Dr. A. J. Yarmat of the Med Center spoke to the issue. He said that many of the so called underserved areas of the state do not offer services in specialized areas. Many of the students are going to other states who offer to pay back the scholarship commitment. If the tuition costs could be waived, then more of our students would remain in the state.

Representative Shirver offered an <u>amendment to waive 50% of the tuition if</u> the chancellor deems it to be a special circumstance. Seconded by Representative Duncan. <u>Motion carried</u>. He then moved that SB 389, as amended, be reported favorable for passage. Seconded by Representative Dyck. Motion carried.

SB 417 - accrual accounting procedures for educational building fund. Art Griggs appeared in support of the bill. It would provide for accrual of receipts from property tax and vehicle tax in July rather than November/December. He said there has been a number of multi year construction contracts and spending down on the fund. This would prevent a problem that would arise otherwise this coming July. (Attachment 4)

Representative Lowther moved to report SB 417 favorable for passage. Seconded by Representative Wisdom. Motion carried.

### SB 426 - waiver of repayment of scholarships granted to studens of certain health care professions.

This bill is in response to the occasional inquiry from a doctor who has received a scholarship/loan from the state who establishes practice in another state, then returns to Kansas to set up a practice and then carrys out his commitment in an underserved area. This bill would provide that the balance of the loan would be written off.

Ted Ayres of Kansas Board of Regents appeared in support of the bill.

An amendment was presented (Attachment 5) and Representative Solbach moved that it be adopted. Seconded by Representative Chronister.

Motion carried. Representative Solbach then moved that SB 426, as amended, be reported favorable for passage.

SB 427 - Would authorize State Board of Regents to sell land in Riley County Mike Johnson of Kansas State University appeared in support of the bill. It would authorize the Board to sell land for construction of a parking lot. Their proposal is to fund \$19,000 in the restricted fee account for upgrade work. Representative Hamm moved to report SB 427 favorable for passage. Seconded by Representative Goossen. Motion carried.

SB 421 - special claims against the state.
Bill Wolff explained the purpose of this bill as a follow up to the full special claims bill (SB 58). Earl Ganaway had previously been authorized to receive 1/2 of the money by way of a diversion agreement in the local court. As a result, SB 421 is to reduce the amount of money by the amount he has The total amount of the voucher for Ganaway is \$2,735.35. 'already received.

Representative Wisdom presented an amendment to SB 421 (Attachment 6). Walter Finkemeier who sustained injuries in the parking garage at KU Med Center in the amount of \$5,450.32. Vickie Thomas, speaking for the Med Center, said she had investigated the circumstances of the claim and does recommend payment out of the appropriate revenue fund. Representative Wisdom moved the amendment be adopted. Seconded by Representative Solbach. The amount of this claim represents the amount of incurred medical expenses not covered by the claimant's insurance coverage.

On the bill, Representative Chronister moved that SB 421, as amended, be recommended favorable for payment. Seconded by Representative Heinemann. Motion carried.

HB 2557 - adjustable annual interest on the Landon office building purchase loan.

This bill was originally heard by this committee and reported favorable out of committee on 3-19-87, however it was withdrawn from calendar and re-referred to this committee. After brief discussion, Representative Shriver moved to report the bill adversely. Seconded by Tepresentative Teagarden. Representative Chronister made a substitute motion to table the bill. Seconded by Representative Miller. Motion carried.

Representative Lowther was recognized for the purpose of speaking in regards to a bill that was introduced recently that would give the Regents authority to sell land for an educational park at Emporia. He urged the committee to consider the bill for passage. He said the amount of funds involved is still being negotiated, but he estimates about \$200,000. Representative Lowther moved and Representative Heinemann seconded to recommend that the bill be referred to the Committee of the Whole. Motion carried.

Testimony on Senate Bill No. 9 by Marjorie J. Van Buren Executive Assistant to the Judicial Administrator

The Judicial Branch budget for FY 1988 includes five district judgeships along with their supporting staff - one for the 3rd Judicial District (Shawnee County), two for the 10th Judicial District (Johnson County) and two for the 18th Judicial District (Sedgwick County).

Although the state as a whole has experienced a rapid increase in the number of cases filed in its trial courts in recent years (an all-time high of 125,356 cases being filed in FY '86), this increase has been especially pronounced in the urban districts of this state. Major case filings in Johnson and Shawnee counties have set new all-time highs while filings in Sedgwick County have again equalled earlier peaks. Nonetheless, it has been nearly ten years since either Johnson or Sedgwick counties have received any additional judicial positions. The additional judgeship that Shawnee County received several years ago has merely moderated the severity of their present need.

SHAWNEE COUNTY - 1 District Judge

FY '86 was the second year in a row that major case filings in this district have increased over 18% with an increase of 39% being realized in the last two years. Year to year increases of over 40% accrued with Chapter 60 cases and misdemeanor case filings. Since this district received additional judgeships several years ago, only one additional judgeship is recommended for this district.

JOHNSON COUNTY - 2 District Judges

Since FY '78, the first year following court unification, Chapter 60 case filings in Johnson County have increased 82%, while the number of Chapter 61 case filings doubled in the same time period. Along with this increase in the number of cases filed, the number of jury trials in Chapter 60 cases has more than doubled since FY '78.

These are especially significant statistics since Chapter 60 cases require a substantial amount of judge time. It is this dramatic increase in the number of civil case filings, along with the increase in other kinds of case filings, that has contributed to the current crisis found in Johnson County. Underscoring the need for additional judges in Johnson County is the fact that nearly 20% of Kansas attorneys are practicing in this county. For ten years there has been absolutely no increase in judicial help in this district despite the fact that it is the fastest growing area in the state.

#### SEDGWICK COUNTY - 2 District Judges

The District Court of Sedgwick County handles more litigation than any court in the state with 20% of the civil litigation in Kansas occurring in this county. Since court unification in 1977, this district has consistently had one of the highest rates of caseload per judge in the state. In this same time period there has been a 46% increase in Chapter 60 case filings and a 40% increase in Chapter 61 case filings. Between FY '85 and '86 there was a 10.8% increase in major caseload in this district. Again, despite caseloads that have increased since unification, no additional judge help has been made available to this district.

I urge the passage of Senate Bill 9.

STATEMENT OF JOSEPH W. SNELL, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, KANSAS STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY, ON SENATE BILL 31 BEFORE THE HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE, April 29, 1987.

Senate Bill 31 amends K.S.A. 75-2726 which provides the mechanism whereby the state of Kansas may acquire historically significant properties.

The State Historical Society drafted the historic properties acquisition law because we were concerned about the increasing numbers of properties being acquired without adequate background information and review of projected future costs. The intent was to provide Kansas with perhaps fewer but more significant properties.

With the passage of time and usage of the law a couple of flaws have become apparent. One of those is addressed in this bill.

While I do not disagree completely with Senate Bill 31 as it now stands, I am concerned about the increasing attitude in the legislature which requires community financial involvement in historic sites of state-wide significance. It has always been my understanding that the state has an historic properties program because the properties therein were important for the education of <u>all</u> our citizens and were significant in the state's, not just the community's, history. If a site were of community significance only then the state should not acquire the property; that would be the community's job.

Senate Bill 31 provides that 1.5% of the qualified electors of the county in which the historic property is located must sign the application for acquisition. I do not understand why, if a site is important to the

heritage of all of Kansas, only those citizens who live in the county in which it is located may apply for the state to acquire and preserve it. In my opinion any Kansas elector should be able to sign the application.

In the law as it now stands only ten persons must sign the application. Obviously this is too small a number and I agree that more persons should sign and I would suggest a number like 500 or 1,000 but I would also suggest that any Kansas voter or taxpayer be allowed to sign.

I would further suggest that in the future the state should not acquire any property unless it is already on the National Register of Historic Places or eligible for listing on the register. As you know, any place on the National Register is also automatically on the Kansas register.

During much of this legislative session, and of three others in recent years, we have been involved in a policy determination involving a half dozen of the state's already owned historic sites. You have heard me say time and time again that I believe that the state should acquire only properties significant to all of Kansas and once acquired the state should preserve and interpret them to the best of our ability.

The happenstance that a property of state significance rests within a certain county or city should not require that community to participate in the operational costs of maintaining a property. Does the state require Beloit to help with the operational costs of the youth center there? Do communities over the state pay part of the utilities for the various

highway maintenance shops, or hospitals, or prisons? Why are historic properties singled out for community support? Is this a new state policy that has been thoughtfully reviewed and its long range impact studied? I think not.

We have been told by some Kansans that about all the state history they know comes from visits to historic sites. Moreover properly maintained and interpreted historic sites become a potent economic factor because they draw visitors into Kansas, visitors who spend money.

Finally the historic properties, when properly maintained and interpreted, instill pride in the hearts of Kansans because we care enough to elevate the appreciation of our heritage above the commonplace. I know this is true because countless Kansans have told us the new Kansas Museum of History and its outstanding exhibits make them proud to be Kansans. Goodness knows the state could use a lot of that sentiment.

If subsequent to such commencement of practice, the person fails to satisfy such obligation, the person again shall be subject to repayments, including interest thereon, as otherwise provided in this section.
- (b) Except as otherwise provided in this section, if the person first entered into an agreement under K.S.A. 76-374 and amendments thereto prior to January 1, 1982, the person shall make 10 0332 equal annual installment payments totaling the entire amount to be repaid under all such agreements for which such obligations are not satisfied, including all amounts of interest at the rate 0335 prescribed.
- 0336 (c) If the person first entered into an agreement under K.S.A. 0337 76-374 and amendments thereto after December 31, 1981, the 0338 person shall repay an amount totaling the entire amount to be 0339 repaid under all such agreements for which such obligations are 0340 not satisfied, including all amounts of interest at the rate pre-0341 scribed. Except as otherwise provided in this section, such

o342 repayment shall be in installment payments and each such o343 installment shall be not less than the amount equal to 1/5 of the o344 total amount which would be required to be paid if repaid in five o345 equal annual installments.

- (d) All installment payments under this section shall commence six months after the date of the action or circumstance that causes the failure of the person to satisfy the obligations of such agreements, as determined by the university of Kansas school of medicine based upon the circumstances of each individual case. In all cases where the person first entered into an agreement under K.S.A. 76-374 and amendments thereto after December 31, 1981, if an installment payment becomes 91 days overdue, the entire amount outstanding shall become immediately due and payable, including all amounts of interest at the rate prescribed.
- (e) The total repayment obligation imposed under all agreements entered into under K.S.A. 76-374 and amendments thereto may be satisfied at any time by any person who first entered into an agreement under such statute prior to January 1, 1982, and at any time prior to graduation from the university of Kansas school of medicine by any persons who first entered into an agreement under such statute after December 31, 1981, by making a single lump-sum payment equal to the total of (1) the entire amount to be repaid under all such agreements upon failure to satisfy the obligations under such agreements to practice in Kansas, plus (2) all amounts of interest thereon at the rate prescribed to the date of payment.

The university of Kansas medical center is hereby authorized and directed to pay the following amount from the hospital revenue fund for the payment and reimbursement of the claimant for medical expenses incurred as a result of injuries sustained on December 17, 1985, by the claimant in a fall on ice in the parking garage, to the following claimant:

- Sec. 4. (a) The director of accounts and reports is hereby authorized and directed to draw warrants on the state treasurer in favor of the claimants specified in this act, upon vouchers duly executed by the state agencies directed to pay the amounts specified in this act or by the claimants or their legal representatives or duly authorized agents, as provided by law.
- (b) The director of accounts and reports shall secure prior to the payment of any amount to any claimant a written release and satisfaction of all claims and rights against the state of Kansas and any agencies, officers and employees of the state of Kansas regarding such claimant's claim.";
