The meeting was called to order by Chairman Miller.

Representative Sughrue made a motion, seconded by Representative Peterson, to approve the minutes. The motion carried.

HB2044 - Pari-mutuel

Charles Belt, Wichita Greyhound Track Partners, gave testimony on HB2044 expressing their concerns with the level of state tax levied on the pari-mutuel handle in Kansas. Three partners in the group are See attachment A.

Bob Runnels, Kansas Catholic Conference, gave testimony in support of an amendment dealing with the operation of a racing facility within a distance of 2500 feet of any school or church. See attachment B.

Reverend Stan Cover, First Baptist Church of Hutchinson, gave testimony in support of Mr. Runnels amendment. The fairgrounds in Hutchinson would be just across the street from a new Catholic Church. The racetrack would inhibit the worshippers on Sunday. There are also nursing homes, an elementary school in the area with only a two lane street. The location of a racing facility should be up to a vote of the people who live in the area.

Reverend Darrell Godfrey, Pastor of the Church of Neal, distributed some proposed amendments to the bill and explained why he felt these amendments were needed. See attachment C.

Albert Becker, representing the American Quarter Horse Association and the American Horse Council, told the committee that the Task Force had the advantage of finding out all the good from other states and eliminating the bad. He told the committee that what they do with this bill during this session will have far reaching effects. He discussed the use of therepeutic medication for racing animals. This is fine, but not while they are running.

Mr. Becker said that Kansas is the fifth largest producer of quarterhorses in the world - 78,924 quarterhorses with 4,487 owners. This industry has worked very hard to get pari-mutuel in the state. A dual facility concept is good for Kansas and would urge this concept. He felt the tax base should be changed to start out at 3%. Developers need a chance to get a good start.

When asked if it were unusual for states to prohibit track owners from having

a financial interest in racing horses, Mr. Becker said it was not unusual and that this could be included in the section dealing with financial interests of commissioners.

When asked about why there had not been a proposal for a freestanding horse track, Mr. Becker said that the cost factor was too great - barns, larger stabling area, more ground needed, more concession areas, etc. Horses take more care - four persons to take care of one horse. Horses eat more and cannot run as often as dogs. The only way Kansas is going to get ahead is to have a dual track facility in the KC area.

Mr. Becker was asked by the Chairman of the sub-committee dealing with medication if he could attend the meeting on adjournment of the Federal & State Affairs meeting today. Mr. Becker said he would attend.

There was discussion about the use of drug testing among employees of a track facility.

Larry Erne, Kansas Independent Greyhound Owners, explained the relationship between his group and the Kansas Greyhound Owners for Economic Development and the reason for the split between the two groups. The tax base is the one major difference between the two groups.

Mr. Erne presented the committee with the membership list that had been requested of him last week. There are currently 131 members. See attach D.

Reverend Richard Taylor, Kansan's for Life at its Best, supported the amendments proposed by Mr. Runnels and Reverend Cover. See attachment E.

The meeting was adjourned.

Mr. Chairman, members of the committee, I am Charles D. Belt, here today representing Wichita Greyhound Track (WGT) Partners who desire to develop a single use, \$16 to \$18 million greyhound track in Wichita.

As with other interests represented here today, we are concerned with the level of state tax levied on the parimutuel handle in Kansas. In regard to the tax rate, I would like to make several points.

First, I believe we should remind ourselves the key reasons the Pari-mutuel constitutional amendment passed a year ago in the legislature and why the voters of Kansas approved the amendment last November. The state needed new revenue sources; and at the community level, new jobs and a tax base would be created. The tax level can be structured so both of these objectives not only will be recognized, but maximized as well.

The task force that was instrumental in developing the bill we are discussing today received input from many

interests and researched a large number of other state's pari-mutuel laws.

It was agreed that greyhound racing could support a 5¢ state tax and horse racing should be taxed at 3¢.

Single use greyhound tracks, such as the WGT proposal in Wichita, can support a 5¢ tax allowing the state, maximum revenue, and providing significant cash flow to a non-profit organization for charitable causes.

There have been proposals to combine horse and greyhound racing into single facilities. If this is a desirable approach for pari-mutuel racing then the tax rate should be consistent with the economics that have been shown - if greyhound racing can subsidize the cost of racing horses, then the state can tax greyhounds at a higher level.

Based on pro formas of greyhound racing in Kansas City and Wichita, the difference of 2¢ in the pari-mutuel tax will mean anywhere from \$3 to \$5 million in tax revenue for the state. This is income the state definitely needs and which the industry of greyhound racing could economically provide.

TESTIMONY KANSAS CATHOLIC CONFERENCE

House Federal and State Affairs Committee H.B. 2044 - February 9, 1987 1:20 P.M.

Mr. Chairman, and members of the House Federal and State
Affairs Committee:

My name is Bob Runnels. I am Executive Director of the Kansas Catholic Conference speaking under the authority of the Roman Catholic Bishops of Kansas.

I come today to speak in support of an amendment to House Bill #2044.

The amendment I propose is as follows:

"No persons who operate a facility for the conducting of races among dogs, horses, or other animals for the purpose of allowing persons to place bets upon the outcome of these races shall be licensed to operate a racetrack facility at any place within a distance of two thousand five hundred (2,500) feet of any school or church, measured from the property line of the racetrack property to the property line of the school or church."

We ask that you consider the following criteria:

Wherever located, a race track, by its very nature, will have a major impact on the surrounding area. It and its related activities will directly affect the quality of living up to a half mile and possibly even more in all directions from the track site.

A track creates a high intensity of activity - noise, traffic, commercialism and other disruptive influences.

It can have an even greater adverse effect than industrial and commercial activity from which neighborhoods and residential areas are traditionally protected in all communities.

Churches and schools are a vital part of neighborhood and residential living. This is evidenced by the fact that they are and have always been permitted and encouraged in single family residential areas.

People expect churches to be afforded a certain kind of environmental sanctuary which respects its location as a focal place for neighborhood and community worship to Almighty God.

Schools are an integral part of neighborhood and residential living. Much the same as said about churches can be said about schools.

Additionally, special consideration is needed for limiting traffic, noise and maintaining an environment which is not detrimental to the learning process and the safety and education of children.

Many church leaders besides our own have our same concerns and they will have testified to these already today, or later.

I am commissioned to add the support of Bishop Gene Schmidt for the Kansas Missouri Synod Lutheran Church and Bishop Roger Gieschien of the Lutheran ACL.

I have not talked to any church leader who has not expressed his concern and support.

I.

That Paragraphs (3) and (4) of Sub-section (c) of New Section 3 of House Bill No. 2044 be deleted and a new Paragraph (3) reading as follows "No member of the Commission shall ever have been directly associated with either the horse racing, race horse breeding, greyhound racing or greyhound breeding industries." be added.

II.

That Sub-section (a) of New Section 15 be amended to add paragraphs reading as follows: Paragraph (1) "All meetings of the stockholders and/or the governing body of any Non-profit Corporation licensed as a facility owner be subject to the provisions of the Kansas Open Meetings law." Paragraph (2) "The minutes and other pertinent records and all financial records of such Non-profit Corporations shall be open to public inspection." Paragraph (3) "Provisions of this Sub-section shall apply specifically to the Greenwood County Fair Association, The Anthony Fair Association, and The National Greyhound Association of Abilene, Kansas should any of these Non-profit Corporations be granted facility owner licenses."

TTT.

That Sub-section (b) of Section 15 be amended to add paragraphs reading as follows: (1) "That no pari-mutuel racetrack facility used for racing as defined in this statute be located within 2500 feet of any existing church, school, hospital, nursing home, or cemetery. The distance to be measured from the property line of the racetrack facility to the property line of the church, school, hospital, nursing home, or cemetery." Paragraph (2) "Nor shall any such racetrack facility used for racing as defined in this statute and already constructed and in use and which is closer than 2500 feet to any existing church, school, hospital, nursing home, or cemetery be changed, expanded, modified or renovated in any manner not in full compliance with this section. The distance to be measured from the property line of the racetrack facility to the property line of the church, school, hospital, nursing home, or cemetery."

IV.

That Sub-section (a) of Section 25 be amended to add Paragraph (1) which reads as follows: "No County, City or other governing body which authorizes the issuance of Industrial Revenue Bonds to finance, wholly or in part, the construction, renovation, improvement or operation of any licensed facility shall forego, for any reason, the collection of the general property tax on such facility." Paragraph (2) "Furthermore, no tax concessions for personal property shall be granted any of these Non-profit racetracks for construction, equipping, reconstruction, repairing, expanding, modifying, or renovating of facilities."

If the same amount would be wagered a year at Kansas tracks, and if Kansas tracks ran 145 days a year, bets would need to average over one million dollars a day. The public would need to "invest" \$250,000 a day if all winners reinvested only their winnings and if all losers on every race would not make additional wagers. Richard Forglor

\$250,000.00 wagered by the public on the first race. 18% take-out leaves a mutual pool of 205,000.00 returned to the winners of the first race who bet it all on the second race. 18% take-out leaves 168,100.00 returned to the winners of the second race who bet it all on the third race. 18% take-out leaves 137,842.00 returned to the winners of the third race who bet it all on the fourth race. 18% take-out leaves 113,030.44 returned to the winners of the fourth race who bet it all on the fifth race. 18% take-out leaves 92,684.96 returned to the winners of the fifth race who bet it all on the sixth race. 18% take-out leaves 76,001.67 returned to the winners of the sixth race who bet it all on the seventh race. 18% take-out leaves 62,321.37 returned to the winners of the seventh race who bet it all on the eighth race. 18% take-out leaves 51,103.52 returned to the winners of the wighth race who bet it all on the ninth race. 18% take-out leaves 1,156,083.96 Total bets for the day (sales tax exempt) \$41,904.89 returned to winners of ninth race.

34,682.52 Taxes for the state at 3% of total amount bet.

173,412.59 Take out for track operators and owners of winning horses or dogs at 15% of total amount bet. These are consumer dollars now spent on main street.

41.904.89 Amount "won" by the public after spending \$250,000.00 \$250,000.00

The bigger the track, the more damage done to local merchants. The business community of Atlantic City worked hard for casino gambling, thinking it would help. The casinos are doing well, but businessmen have been destroyed because of consumer dollars now lost at the casinos.

Does Johnson or Wyandotte County want a big gambling track that will drain off millions of consumer dollars?

Missouri will not have a dog track. If a big dog track is not built in Kansas, businessmen on b oth sides of the state line will be better off.

Bingo gambling was passed in Kansas for schools and other small time operations. The law was finally cleaned up to do just that.

Will Kansas make the same mistake with parimutuel? This committee could pass legislation that would keep small time parimutuel gambling at county fairs and other small tracks across the state.

Organized crime goes where the big bucks are, the large track near the big city. You have every right to prevent that problem.

Private gambling pays off 100 cents on the dollar. If a person breaks even gambling with friends, he takes home exactly what he started with. Parimutuel gambling takes out 18% of all money bet. If a gambler breaks even picking the winners on 6 races he is wiped out. (6x18%=108%)
