The meeting was called to order at 12:45 p.m. by the Chairman, Senator Wint Winter, Jr..

House Bill 2538 - An act concerning the community resource act; transferring administration thereof from the secretary of commerce to Kansas state university; prescribing powers, duties and functions for the state board of regents and assistant provost of the division of continuing education of Kansas state university.

Thomas Scearcy, UFM, Inc. at Kansas State University, appeared before the Committee in support of $\underline{\sf HB}$ 2538. He said that the Community Resource Act was passed in 1979, and since that time forty-four communities have been served. He passed out a form showing the thirty-six communities which are still active and noted that currently only ten are under the funding provided by the Act. (Attachment I) The remainder, he said, found alternative methods of funding after the three year funding period had lapsed. He listed some of the programs which are offered as typing, shorthand, recreation, arts and crafts, and humanities. He said that the total funding for this is \$41,000 per year. Out of that, \$21,000 goes for the salary and expenses of the coordinator and the remaining \$20,000 is used as the grant money for the three year granting period.

Don Gragg, Community Development Director of the Kansas Department of Commerce, said that KDOC supports the transfer of the administration of the Community Resource Act from KDOC to Kansas State University as provided in HB 2538.

House Bill 2529 - An Act concerning the Department of Commerce; requiring the establishment of a clearinghouse for information on educational and vocational training programs of value to economic development.

Senator Feleciano offered a conceptual motion that HB 2529 be amended to basically follow the intent of the Interim Joint Committee on Economic Development that a clearinghouse, and solely a clearinghouse, of information be set up. The motion died for lack of a second.

Senator Salisbury expressed concern over whether or not HB 2529 basically reflects the intent of the recommendation by the Task Force on Business Training to the Legislative Commission on Economic Development. She said that the Task Force felt, in recommending that a clearinghouse be set up, that it was appropriate for the KDOC to have information on educational and vocational training programs to give not only to existing businesses but to businesses who want to move into the state. She stated that it could be a policy decision of the Committee as to whether or not information should be given on all postsecondary education and training programs or whether the information should focus on programs of a more vocational and technical nature. She stated that she feels that it was the intention of the Task Force on Business Training to have information pertaining to vocational and technical training available rather than including all postsecondary education degree

programs. Senator Salisbury noted that the concern addressed by the Task Force was that Kansas does not have a skilled work force, people with specific skills to meet specific needs of either existing industries or of new industries coming into the state.

Senator Karr moved to amend HB 2529 Section 1(i) by providing, in lieu of the present language in that subsection, that the Department of Commerce establish a clearinghouse to collect information on vocational and technical educational programs. The clearinghouse should provide data on the number and location of public and private postsecondary vocational and technical educational programs in areas critical to economic development. Senator Feleciano seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Senator Feleciano moved that HB 2529, as amended, be recommended favorably for passage. Senator Salisbury seconded the motion. The motion carried

House Bill 2075 - An Act establishing the Kansas training information program.

Staff passed out copies of a letter from Eugene Lundgrin, Director of the Salina Area Vocational-Technical School, concerning $\underline{\sf HB}$ 2075. (Attachment $\underline{\sf IL}$)

Senator Feleciano moved that HB 2075 be amended by the addition of language to insure the confidentiality of students and to insure that reports will be given in aggragate. Senator Salisbury seconded the motion. The motion was withdrawn.

The matter of maintaining confidentiality in $\underline{\mathsf{HB}}\ 2075$ while using social security numbers was discussed by Committee members. Ben Barrett, Legislative Research Department, said that the social security numbers would be matched up initially with the wage information collected through the employment security system. Consequently, he stated, to prepare initially the information for the program set out in $\underline{\mathsf{HB}}\ 2075$ the social security number match is absolutely essential.

The Chairman announced that the Committee would continue its discussion of $\underline{\rm HB}\ 2075$ at its next meeting.

Senator Vidricksen moved that the minutes of the March 24, 1987, and March 25, 1987, meetings of the Committee be approved. Senator D. Kerr seconded the motion. The motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:30 p.m. by the Chairman.

Dear Representative Aylward:

I am writing in reference to HB-2075; a Bill establishing a Kansas Training Information Program. This Bill presents some problems to me.

I am not opposed to finding out information about placement rates and average salaries earned by people completing vocational programs. I do not have enough information, but am basing this on some information that I have heard. It is my understanding that they would publish names, social security numbers and salaries as well as places of employment. I think this deprives the individual of privacy. I do not believe that it would be right to publish the names along with this information.

As you know, the Area Vocational-Technical Schools have had to do a follow-up report each year. This is due in the State Department by February 15. I would hope that this Bill, if passed, would tie into the existing follow-up study that Area Vocational-Technical Schools have to do now. The date of December 31 would be too far in advance for us to tie the two (2) follow-up studies into one.

Please see that the two (2) existing dates could be compromised for reports that are already due on placement and follow-up of vocational students in Area Vocational-Technical Schools.

Secondly, I would like to see that the <u>privacy</u> of students be recognized and therefore reports only give the average salary, placement rates and the vocational program students were enrolled.

Your help on this matter pertaining to HB-2075 would be greatly appreciated.
