The first conferee was Mr. Robert Clester of the Kansas Sheriffs Association. He spoke as a proponent of $\underline{\text{HB }2305}$, concerning fingerprint check of candidates for sheriff or police chief. His prepared statement is part of these Minutes. (Attachment #1) He said the Attorney General had looked this bill over and felt the present law did not eliminate any of the rights of appeal.

The Legislative Chairman of the Kansas Peace Officers' Association, Mary Lou McPhail, expressed the wholehearted support of that organization concerning HB 2305.

Senator Strick moved that HB 2305, be recommended favorably for passage. Seconded by Senator Arasmith. The motion carried.

The Chairman called the Committee's attention to <u>SCR 1606</u>, constitutional amendment for the legislature to regulate the operation of lotteries by bona bide nonprofit organizations. It would allow a constitutional amendment to be placed on the ballot similar to the one concerning lotteries on the November, 1986, ballot. It was a Committee proposal.

Then the Chairman introduced The Reverend Richard E. Taylor, of Kansans for Life at its Best. He said it was his understanding that an Attorney General's opinion concerning casino gambling said that by virtue of the Amendment passed in 1986, the state could operate a casino under certain conditions. The Chairman said it was not the intent to have casino gambling. Mr. Taylor asked if the legislation might be narrowed down to raffles. The Reverend Taylor said that according to discussion in the House the Lottery Commission as now established could operate state-owned casinos without the permission of the Legislature because the Legislature has given them full authority to operate the lottery and the Legislature has not narrowed lottery down. There was more Committee discussion, and Senator Arasmith asked if staff could come up with a definition of raffles to amend this. He said the intent was not to let any nonprofit group do anything it wanted to do. The Chairman asked staff to talk with members of the Attorney General's staff in order to determine any concerns the Attorney General has with this matter

The Chairman asked Mr. Phil Wilkes for his comments on the matter. He said that there would be a lot of people who would get into it who are not legal. Also, it could end up with come competition to the state lottery. The Chairman asked Mr. Wilkes to get with staff to clarify this matter.

The meeting was adjourned at noon.
