HEARING ON S.B. 298 - Certain services to be provided to the handicapped.

Sen. Bond said this matter had been brought to his attention by a friend and he had spoken with Sen. Langworthy about it.

Sen. Langworthy said she thought the idea had merit and got together with Sen. Bond and had the bill drafted. It was patterned after Illinois law.

Kent Granger, Attorney, Shawnee Mission, said he had contacted polio in 1953 and was left with limited use of his arms. He is now driving a car with special attachments. His father had been in the truck stop business so Mr. Granger was familiar with that side of the business. As an attorney he has represented oil retailers. He was speaking not in behalf of himself but as a member of the Post-polio Society and support groups throughout the country. He said Amoco Corporation already is providing this service on a voluntary basis. A copy of a letter from Amoco Corporation to Senators Langworthy and Bond dated March 4, 1987 is attached. (Att. 1).

<u>Jim Hunter</u> said he is a paralyzed veteran and they support this bill. He spoke of the difficulty he has in pumping his own gas and said many times the difference between self-service and full-service can be $50\c$ per gallon. He said he would not mind paying a \$1.00 or \$1.50 service charge. They want to be fair to the dealers.

Mr. Ray Petty, Department of Human Resources, said many times someone else would be in the car with the handicapped driver and in that case they should not require the special treatment. If a service charge were to be collected it should be posted.

Charles Nicolay, Kansas Oil Marketers Association, said they were not opposed to the bill and supported the concept. The companies should encourage this service. Phillips and Amoco are already encouraging it and as an industry they will promote the idea. They asked that the implementation should have a smooth transition.

A motion was made by Sen. Frey and was seconded by Sen. Hayden to recommend HCR 5011 favorably for passage. Motion carried.

Dear Senators Langworthy and Bond:

I understand that S.B. 298 is scheduled for hearing by the Senate Transportation Committee on Thursday, March 5, 1987. I regret very much that I will not be able to attend the committee hearing.

As you know, Amoco has been encouraging its dealers to provide gas tank fill-up at self-serve pumps (and therefore at self-serve prices) for the handicapped persons during hours of operation when attendants are available and at stations which offer both full-serve and self-serve. Many of our dealers have voluntarily participated in the program. Our dealers are independent businessmen and women, who are free to make their own decisions about their operation.

As you know, businessmen or women seldom favor any governmental mandate on their business activity. However, I have reviewed S.B. 298 with Amoco management and with some Johnson County area dealers. The concensus seems to be that the approach you have taken in the proposal is a fair and reasonable response to the problems faced by handicapped drivers.

The bill will make available to handicapped drivers gasoline at the self-serve price at certain locations and at certain times when an attendant is available. We appreciate very much your position and certainly would not oppose enactment of this proposal. I look forward to visiting with you when I return to Topeka.

I appreciate the understanding you have demonstrated in developing this proposal, and look forward to working with you on other matters in the future. Since no one from Amoco will be able to attend the hearing, I hope you will feel free to pass this letter along to the members of the Senate Transportation Committee, if you desire.
