Dr. Harder continued his annual briefing on SRS from Monday, January 26th by distributing an updated Program Overview dated January 28, 1987 and reviewing it. (Attachment 1)

In answer to a question from Senator Gannon, Dr. Harder stated that current plans are to move 48 adults with aggressive behavior from Winfield State Hospital and Training Center (WSH&TC) to Parsons State Hospital and Training Center (PSH&TC). The plan calls for moving 48 persons from PSH&TC to community programs.

Dr. Harder responded to a question from Senator Feleciano by stating the federal team is presently at WSH&TC for their "look behind" survey. He anticipates not having a problem in the two wards which house those individuals with less aggressive behavior, however he does anticipate problems with the survey in the two wards housing the people with more aggressive behavior.

Dr. Harder reviewed briefly a lawsuit against SRS concerning the question of proper reimbursement rates for adult care homes under Title XIX, Americare Systems, Inc. v. Robert C. Harder, et al. (Attachment 2)

Mr. Crowther presented a KPERS overview. He focused his remarks on KPERS investments and their recent performances, the relationship between performance and the rates of contribution that are required, and KPERS real estate program in Kansas and some of the investments which have received some media attention.

Mr. Crowther noted that KPERS has a total combined coverage, including investment members, of approximately 102,000 public employees, either active or about 10,000 who have left public employment but have vested rights. They have about 4,000 retired members and beneficiaries receiving benefits under the various programs. These are long term financial obligations and funding of the system has been particularly important.

According to Mr. Crowther, there are only three sources of funding revenue for the KPERS system, the statutory contribution of the members, the employer contributions, and the earnings of the fund. FY 1985 was the first year in which investment income was larger than the employer-employee contributions combined.

In regard to employer rates of contribution, Mr. Crowther stated that the legislature, and the public at large, need to be aware of the fact that KPERS has had substantial benefit and coverage improvements in all of the

retirement systems. These improvements have taken place because policy makers have been willing to spend some of the exceptionally good earnings by providing benefits rather than simply lowering the rates. Not only have contributions rates gone down, but the coverage and benefits have gone up and the funding situation has improved. This is very positive for KPERS.

 ${\tt Mr.}$  Crowther gave a general picture of how the investment structure works and he also reviewed some of the real estate investments.

Following discussion and questions from the Committee, Mr. Crowther assured the Chairman that he would return at a later date and review and discuss the KPERS annual report as soon as it is back from the printer and distributed to the legislature.

The Chairman adjourned the meeting at 12:10 p.m.

#### Americare Systems, Inc. v. Robert C. Harder, et al.

Americare Systems Inc. has filed a class action lawsuit against SRS concerning the question of proper reimbursement rates for adult care homes under Title XIX of the Social Security Act. The litigation is challenging the authority of the Secretary to make the recent amendments to the reimbursement methodology for adult care homes in response to the anticipated budget shortfalls. The plaintiffs do not appear to be challenging the reinstatement of the fifth cost center limitation.

The litigation alleges that such amendments violate Title XIX of the Social Security Act, K.S.A. 39-708c(k)(x) and the State Administrative Regulations promulgated pursuant thereto.

The plaintiffs are claiming that they are no longer being reimbursed on a reasonable and adequate basis as required by the above-mentioned statutes and regulations. The plaintiffs are further claiming that the Department's actions could cause a reduction in the standard of care afforded to Medicaid recipients and could reduce the availability of covered services to such recipients.

The plaintiffs are also claiming that the class damages will be in excess of \$2,000,000 if SRS is not enjoined from implementing its amendments.

The plaintiffs have filed their litigation in Shawnee County District Court and are requesting the Court to:

- 1. Enter a temporary injunction against the Department.
- 2. Enter a permanent injunction against the Department.
- 3. Enter a writ of mandamus against the Department.
- 4. Award attorney fees to the plaintiffs pursuant to the civil rights laws of the United States (42 U.S.C.A. § 1983 et seq.).
