Chairperson Harper called the meeting to order and welcomed members of the committee for the 1988 session. The purpose of the meeting today was to hear and receive bill requests.

The Chair recognized Representative Carl Holmes, District #125. The Representative came before the committee asking that they introduce a piece of legislation relating to corrupt political advertising. Representative Holmes explained a situation in his area which arose this summer. A copy of the ad which was run in his paper was passed to members, along with a copy of the proposed legislation. Attachments 1 and 2.

A motion was made by Representative Helgerson to recommend the introduction of the above proposed legislation coming from Representative Holmes, and that it be referred back to the Elections Committee. Seconded by Representative Kline. Motion carried.

The Chair now recognized Ron Thornburg, Deputy Assistant, Office of the Secretary of State. Mr. Thornburg came before the committee telling them that his office had two proposals, which he hopes, are very simple and easy bills. The first one deals with federal service ballots, and they are asking for three different sections in the introduction. One, make it mandatory that all federal service ballots be sent 45 days prior to the election. Secondly, asking for a single application for a primary and general election ballot, and again for federal overseas ballots. Thirdly, they would like to change the site on KSA 25 1214 (a), as that reads now, it sites the old federal law, and would simply like to change the site to read with the new uniformed and overseas citizens code that has taken place in the last couple of years.

The second bill is simply to clarify some language on the 1987 House Bill 2039, which deals with precinct boundaries and the changing of those boundaries in the census.

A motion was made by Representative Kline to accept the proposals coming from the Office of the Secretary of State, and that these two pieces of legislation be referred back to the Elections Committee. Seconded by Representative Helgerson. Motion carried.

Meeting adjourned.


