The meeting was called to order by Chairman Miller.

 $\frac{\mathrm{HB2776}}{\mathrm{grant}}$ - Parimutuel racing act; relating to procedures for the grant or denial of certain licenses.

Representative Roy gave a subcommittee report and explained the proposed substitute for HB2776. The proposed substitute goes back into the parimutuel act and says that grants or denials of organization license, facility license or operator licenses shall not be subject to the Administrative Procedures Act and calls for expedient judicial review of applications.

Representative Peterson made a motion, seconded by Representative Ramirez, to report the substitute for HB2776 favorably. The motion carried.

HB2826 - Preference for Kansas High School and College graduates

Representative Gatlin, co-sponsor of the bill, explained that the intent of the bill is to provide additional points once a person has passed the Civil Service exam for a high school graduate from a Kansas school or a Kansas college graduate. He suggested two changes in the bill. First, a clarification that these points are not cumulative with the veteran's preference points. Second, the points should be reduced to 4 points for a high school graduate or 8 points for a college graduate so that the disabled veteran still receives the maximum number of points. See attachment A.

Representative Rolfs asked Representative Gatlin if he felt that by hiring Kansans you are going to be hiring more qualified people. Rep. Gatlin said he felt much more comfortable hiring someone from their home state to stay as a long term employee.

HB2956 - Temporary membership in certain clubs

Representative Shallenburger explained the bill which would allow temporary private club membership at a parimutuel race track in Cherokee County. A number of people have said that Cherokee County would be a good place for a parimutuel race track. Cherokee county voted against liquor by the drink and it is the feeling of the County Commission that without it there will not be a track. Liquor by the drink failed by 600 votes, parimutuel racing passed by 900 votes.

Randy Burleson, reprensenting the Columbus Chamber of Commerce, testified in support of the bill. Presently, there are two promoters considering building a dog track in Southeast Kansas. Both of them have shown interest in Cherokee County, but have not pursued a location there beacuse of the absence of "liquor by the drink". HB2956 would eliminate this concern and would not open the whole county up to liquor by the drink. See attachment B.

There was discussion of the constitutionality of exceptions like the Wichita airport, hotels and now race tracks. Mr. Burleson said he did not know about the constitutionality They haven't gotten any commitments from a promoter. Cherokee County is a good spot for a race track and this is an avenue to get liquor by the drink.

John Belmont, Chairman Cherokee County Commission, expressed support of the bill and said it will give Cherokee County a more level playing field as they attempt to compete for economic development dollars in new tourism initiatives like parimutuel racing. See attachment C.

Reverend Richard Taylor, Kansans for Life at its Best, told the committee it bothered him that they are talking about the number one drug problem and are tying it in with economic development.

HB2957 - National guard pay and allowances

Tom Becher, Comptroller for National Guard, gave testimony in support of the bill which would raise the minimum pay from \$35 - \$45 for members of the Kansas National Guard ordered by the Governor to active duty. This is the same pay allowed to persons of the same rank or grade and length of service in the armed forces of the United States. See attachment D.

Representative Eckert distributed a pay table of daily rates of basic pay of officer, warrant officers and enlisted members. See attachment E.

Hearings were concluded on HB2957.

SB283 - Real Estate Brokers and salespersons license act

Gene Yockers, Real Estate Commission, testified in support of the bill which deletes language requiring a real estate license of persons who assist in or direct the arrangement for mortgage financing on real estate while not acting in the capacity of a mortgagee or mortgagee's agent. The bill gives the Commission authority to impose Civil fines against licensees for violations of the license act. If litigation is filed, the period of time for commission complaints is extended. The bill allows the commission to use emergency procedures to suspend, restrict or revoke a license when a licensee enters a plea of guilty or nole contendere or has been convicted of a felony charge. The bill also provides for additional fees. See attachment F.

Hearings were concluded on SB283.

The chairman announced there would be a Friday afternoon meeting on the agenda the following week.

HB2007 - Criminal offense to harbor a runaway
HB2950 - parental consent

Representative Sebelius made a motion, seconded by Representative Rolfs, to report HB2007 and HB2950 adversely. The motion carried. A division was called, the motion carried. Representative Roper was recorded as voting "no".

 $\underline{\mathtt{SB366}}$ - Classes of felonies and terms of imprisonment

Representative Roy made a motion, seconded by Representative Rolfs, to amend the provisions of HB2714 which includes unanimous consent of parole board for granting paroles into SB366.

There was discussion of current bills which would expand the parole board. Representative Roy said he had been tracking these bills and he saw no apparent move to expand the size of the parole board. The unanimous vote effects very few people. It needs to be clarified and put in statute.

The motion carried. A division was called, the motion carried.

Testimony on House Bill 2826

Thank you Mr. Chairman for this opportunity to testify on House Bill 2826. This is a bill that I have introduced with the help of several members of the House to address what I see as a problem for high schools and colleges in Kansas.

This problem was brought to my attention by a constitutent whose son recently graduated with a degree in accounting and sought work. Among the jobs he applied for were positions with the state of Kansas. Repeatedly both the state civil service and in private industry, he was told that he could not be hired because he did not have experience and it seemed to become a catch-22 situation very quickly. If you don't have experience, you can't be hired. In order to get experience, you must be hired.

The intent of this bill is to provide additional points once a person has passed the civil service exam for a high school graduate from a Kansas school or Kansas college graduate. I see this as a means of dealing with what Governor Hayden has spoke of as the "brain-drain" in Kansas.

We have two problems as I see in that area. One, is those who leave the state to further their education and continue to reside outside the state, the second being those who leave the state as a result of the job hunt to find a job outside the state.

I would suggest two changes in the bill. First, a clarification that these points are not cumulative with the veterans preference. Second, that the points be reduced to four for a high school graduate and eight for a college graduate so that the disabled veteran still receives the maximum number of points. I am aware of concerns within the Department of Administration about the possible problems of constitutionality of this bill. I would point out that the preference for veterans has been upheld in Kansas courts. see a difference that they apparently do between this preference and the veteran preference that would make these points unconstitutional. It would be my wish that you could recommend this bill favorably.

Testimony of Randy Burleson Past President and Board Member of The Columbus Chamber of Commerce On House Bill 2956 Before the Committee on Federal And State Affairs February 23, 1988

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee, my name is Randy Burleson. I am here representing the Columbus Chamber of Commerce in support of HB 2956. I am a current officer of the Columbus Chamber and have attached a copy of a resolution passed by the Board of Directors in support of this issue.

HB 2956 will open a crack in the window of opportunity for Cherokee County Kansas. As the attached information depicts, our situation in the Southeast corner of the State is bleak. We feel a parimutuel facility, located in our county would help turn this around.

Presently there are two promoters considering building a dog track in Southeast Kansas. Both of them have shown interest in Cherokee County but have not pursued a location there because of the absence of "liquor by the drink". HB-2956 would eliminate this concern and would not open the whole county up to "liquor by the drink". It would treat the dog track just like the other exemptions in the statutes.

A dog track located in Cherokee County would be closer to the population centers the promoters wish to tap and would also be more assessable to I-44, a vital 4 lane Highway adjacent to our Southern boarder. It would seem to make sense to be as close to the Southeast corner as possible with the facility to take full advantage of the opportunity.

We understand that one of the important criteria the racing commission will consider when they grant a license is, which location will realize the greatest economic impact from a parimutuel facility? The attached information points out our position in relation to our neighboring counties. Our economic picture along with the demographics of being closer to I-44 and the population centers could be important factors to the racing commission if HB 2956 were to pass. Even though out county may be the best choice from an economic development point of view it is very unlikely that a track could be as successful operating as a private club.

We know there is not much time left before the commission makes a decision and grants a licence. It is our hope this bill can be passed in time for Cherokee County to be considered for the race track. Representatives from both promoters felt Cherokee County had the best potential but could not be considered because of the liquor issue. If in fact our county is the best site, then passing this bill is also in the best interest of the State.

Thank you very much for the opportunity to appear and I would attempt to answer any questions.




CHEROKEE COUNTY


Public School Envollment to 1983

CHAIRPERSON MILLER AND COMMITTEE MEMBERS:

As Comptroller and in behalf of the Adjutant General and the Kansas National Guard I am testifying in support of House Bill 2957.

Current Law, K.S.A. 1979 Supplement to 48-214 authorizes a minimum pay of \$35 for our members when they are called to State Emergency Active Duty by the Governor; otherwise members receive the rate of pay as listed in the armed forces pay table. A copy of this table is included with your hand-out.

I should immediately call attention to the fact that due to the emergency nature of life-saving and property protection missions by these willing and dedicated Kansas National Guard personnel, their daily pay is not calculated based on an hourly wage but on a daily rate. Their duty day is 24 hours, and if the need exists Guard Personnel perform duty the full day. Except for leadership, no other distinction is made by grade or duties. This is in contrast to other state duty assignments which are forecasted and usually performed during a normal 8-hour period.

In 1979, when the state law was amended, it established a minimum pay rate which was comparable to other public safety employees serving in the emergency area. It was provided to assist to recoup some of their income loss while serving gallantly away from their full-time civilian employment. Since that time in the 9-year span, state employees received cost of living increases of about 31%. Increasing emergency duty pay to \$45 is approximately a 29% increase.

In the hand-out we compiled salary costs for FY 1987 to give you some statistics for comparison. We displayed periods of emergency duty, personnel and man-days involved, actual salary costs when the minimum pay of \$35 was in effect, and compilations if a minimum pay of \$45 had been in effect. It should be noted that there were 426 man-days when \$45 was applied, and the cost would have been \$3,253 for that year. In our budget submission we stated "based on past historical data a pay differential average is \$12, if a minimum pay of \$45 is established, and would apply to 84% of the man-days utilized in emergency duty". The increase request is \$2,419.

I should point out to the committee that in FY 1987 the duty performed involved a large number of pilots and the difference was only applied to 60% of the salaries. Based on past historical data the minimum pay would generally apply in about 84% of the man-days.

In closing let me express the Adjutant General's appreciation for your past legislative support. Our men and women serving in your Kansas National Guard are dedicated to serving their State and Nation. I can assure you their service and performance will continue with or without a pay increase, however in all fairness they deserve your support, and we ask favorable consideration of this House Bill.

Mr. Chairman and members of the Commitee:

My name is Gene Yockers, and I am the Director of the Kansas Real Estate Commission.

Senate Bill 283 is a carry-over bill. It passed the Senate 40-0.

Section 1 (lines 69-72). Deletes language requiring a real estate license of persons who assist in or direct the arrangement for mortgage financing on real estate while not acting in the capacity of a mortgagee or mortgagee's agent.

This provision has been in the license act for eight years and has been of no value. Other provisions of the license act are not applicable to activities related to arranging mortgage financing.

Section 2 (lines 112-113). Relates to the application fee which is requested under section 4. Sets the time when the application fee would be paid.

The application fee will be used for background searches concerning new applicants.

Section 3 (lines 170-175). Gives the Commission authority to impose civil fines against licensees for violation of the license act. What this does is give the Commission a little latitude between a letter of censure and suspension or revocation. Or a fine may be used as a combination with suspension or revocation. Section 5 provides that all fines imposed by the Commission go to the state general fund with no part being retained by the Commission.

Section 3 (lines 182-184). To extend the period of time for commencing complaints if litigation is filed.

Under the current law, it may be too late to commence a complaint after the conclusion of a civil action. Extending the time will allow more flexibility in pursuing a disciplinary action.

Section 3 (lines 199-216). When a licensee enters a plea of guilty or nolo contendere to or has been convicted of any felony charge, this amendment will allow the Commission to use emergency proceedings to suspend, restrict or revoke a license.

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Section 3 (lines 217-227). To give the Commission the authority to deny continued use of a licensee's name in a real estate brokerage name when revocation of the individual's license is in effect.

Section 4 - provides for additional fees:

\$15 (maximum) application fee to be used for background search of applicant. (Nebraska reported they turned up numerous false applications by searching court records.)

Company address and name changes presently at \$15 per license or maximum of \$100. The amendment provides for \$7.50 per license with no maximum.

\$10 for issuance of a duplicate license (issued when license is lost).

\$10 for certification of licensure to another state.

Fees for registering courses and instructors: \$50 for first-time approval \$15 for renewal the next calendar year

The Commission respectfully requests that SB-283 be passed out of the House Federal and State Affairs Committee favorably.
