HB 2882 - School districts, capital outlay levies, asbestos control projects (Local Government)

Following a call to order by Chairman Joseph C. Harder, Senator Arasmith moved that minutes of the Committee meeting of March 3 be approved. Senator Warren seconded the motion, and the minutes were approved.

<u>HB 2647</u> - After calling the Committee's attention to HB 2647, the Chair recognized <u>Representative Eugene Shore</u>, sponsor of the bill. Representative Shore related that when the bill was passed by the House Education Committee, it had been placed directly on the Consent Calendar. stated that the bill is similar to SB 474, sponsored by Senator Hayden, which had been passed by the Senate Education Committee and placed on the Consent Calendar. Representative Shore explained that the purpose of the bill is to allow the Elkhart School District to use federal monies received from the sale of certain mineral rights within the district to defray the cost of a new school. He said that when the district had approved the bond issue for the new school, it was with the common understanding that such monies, when received, would be used to help retire the bond and interest indebtedness. The bill, he added, would have statewide application.

Dr. Richard Funk, representing the Kansas Association of School Boards, stated his support for HB 2647.

The Chairman told the Committee that he had spoken with Senator Hayden, sponsor of SB 474, and Senator Hayden had indicated that he supports passage of HB 2647 by the Senate Education Committee.

When the Chair asked the Committee if it wished to take action on HB 2647, Senator Kerr moved that HB 2647 be recommended favorably for passage and that it be placed on the Consent Calendar. Senator Karr seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

SB 706 - Dr. Martine Hammond, Director of Academic Affairs, Kansas Board of Regents, testified that there has been an increase in both the number of courses offered and institutions seeking information on degree-granting authority in Kansas by out-of-state postsecondary institutions. She stated that the primary concern of the Board is that it has no authority to review for degree-granting purposes those institutions whose main campus is located outside the state of Kansas. She said the Board feels that out-of-state institutions should meet the same standards as in-state institutions to ensure that all programs meet some minimum level of academic credibility. (Attachment 1)

Mr. Robert Kelly, Executive Director, Kansas Independent College Association, stated that he strongly supports SB 706 and that it would close a loop hole in present law.

Mr. John Peterson, Kansas Association of Private Career Schools, also testified in support of SB 706. He stated that the Kansas Proprietary School Law does not affect the degree-granting out-of-state institutions, and they are not under the jurisdiction of the Board of Regents. Mr. Peterson said that he had testified before the 1202 Commission concerning this same anomaly.

Mr. Ted Ayres, General Counsel, State Board of Regents, also mentioned that the concept of SB 706 had been presented previously to the Legislative Education Planning Committee when it was called the 1202 Commission. He said that although the Regents Board has had contact with some of the institutions concerned, they did not respond positively.

When the Chair asked the Committee's pleasure regarding SB 706, <u>Senator Salisbury moved</u>, and <u>Senator Karr seconded a motion to recommend SB 706 favorably for passage. The motion carried</u>.

HB 2882 - The Assistant Director of the Kansas Association of School Boards, Dr. Richard Funk, expressed support for HB 2882 and explained that the bill would allow school districts to make expenditures from their capital outlay funds to help finance the undertaking of the asbestos reinspection and management plans in order to comply with the federal asbestos control requirements. He said that HB 2882 would allow school boards more flexibility in dealing with the problem. (Attachment 2) In reply to a question dealing with the possible cost for such programs, Dr. Funk replied that it would be difficult to determine such costs. Mr. Dale Dennis of the State Department of Education responded that the inspection alone might cost about \$5million statewide and range from between two and a half to seven cents per square foot. He also confirmed that October 12, 1988 is the current deadline for this federal mandate.

The Executive Director of the United School Administrators, Mr. Gerald Henderson, stated that confusion over the seriousness of the problem has made systematic planning and financing of control projects difficult. (Attachment 3) He, too, said that HB 2882 would give added flexibility for financing these projects. Mr. Dale Dennis of the State Department of Education indicated that a similar mandate might very well apply to municipal buildings in the future.

When the Chair called for action on HB 2882, Senator Arasmith moved that the Committee recommend HB 2882 favorably for passage. Senator Salisbury seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

The Chairman called the Committee's attention to several handouts, including written testimony from conferees who were unable to testify at the Feb. 25 meeting. The Chairman then adjourned the meeting. Page  $\frac{2}{2}$  of  $\frac{2}{2}$

Testimony in Support of Senate Bill 706

Martine F. Hammond, Director of Academic Affairs
Kansas Board of Regents

In recent years the number of out-of-state institutions, defined as foreign institutions in Senate Bill 706, delivering courses and degrees in Kansas has escalated. As the lists which I have provided indicate, there has been an increase in both the number of courses offered and in institutions seeking information on degree granting authority in Kansas.

Our primary concern are those foreign institutions offering degrees in Kansas. Current law requires nothing more than course registration for an institution for which the main campus is located outside of Kansas. While we strive to insure that Kansas institutions of postsecondary education are of the highest quality, foreign institutions are permitted to offer degrees of undetermined quality. Unfortunately, it is often those students most unfamiliar with and unprepared to make judgments about higher education who become involved with these programs. The proposed bill does not seek to limit educational opportunities in Kansas but to insure that all programs meet some minimum level of academic credibility.

The Kansas Board of Regents currently reviews for degree granting authority those institutions with the main campus located in Kansas. Why should foreign institutions not meet the same standards?

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, we appreciate the opportunity to appear today on behalf of the 302 members of the Kansas Association of School Boards. KASB supports the provisions found in H.B. 2882.

Local boards of education will incur additional expenses due to the federal asbestos control legislation. It has been opined that local boards cannot use their capital outlay funds for asbestos reinspection and management plans. They may use capital outlay funds for asbestos removal or encapsulation.
