The Chairman called the meeting to order and attention was turned to $\underline{\text{SB }654}$ which related to certain state employees; concerning the personnel of the State Board of Indigents' Defense Services; the Division of Printing and the Division of Architectual Services.

Mr. Flentje addressed the committee in support of the bill explaining that it would move three groups of state employees into classified service and protect the interests of the affected employees. He recommended that the architectual staff be brought into classified service and distributed a balloon version of the bill recommending an amendment and new language to place the employees of the Division of Printing on a monthly payroll. (Exhibit A) It was was also recommended that the clerical employees in the Indigents' Defense Services be brought into classified service.

Ron Miles spoke in support of the amendment in lines 70-78 saying this would help to keep clerical people in the Department. As it is now there is quite a turnover because of the way they are classified.

Judy Pope spoke on behalf of Local Unions 23B and 49C in opposition to <u>SB 654</u>. She pointed out that this bill would affect pay cuts, allow for no overtime, change hours and the way they are paid. She stated that in her opinion this bill was not legal, it would deprive the people of their rights and would go into enforce without a proper hearing as well as take away their rights to collective bargaining.

Some questions were raised and discussed but no action was taken on \underline{SB} 654.

Meredith Williams spoke in support of <u>SB 661</u> explaining that it would cut down on the audits that had to be done by Legislative Post Audit. A chart was distributed to show the changes this bill would effect. (Exhibit B) T.C. Anderson addressed the committee in support of SB 661 stating that the new language proposed in this bill would insure that an audit presence in each state agency is maintained and that these engagements can be performed by all Kansas CPA firms. (Exhibit C)

A motion to approve the minutes of the February 22 meeting was made by Senator Strick. This was seconded by Senator Hoferer. Motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned by the Chairman at 2:33 p.m.

Mr. Chairman, members of the Committee, I am T. C. Anderson, Executive Director of the 2,000-member Kansas Society of Certified Public Accountants.

I appear today to discuss SB 661 relating to audits of federal financial assistance to state agencies and other audit work.

It is our understanding the federal government has imposed an annual audit requirement on those state agencies receiving federal funds. This requirement negates the current language contained in K.S.A. 46-1106 which calls for a financial compliance audit of those agencies once every three years.

I have circulated SB 661 to the CPA firms, that I am familiar with, which currently perform the audits required under the Legislative Post Audit Act.

While most would prefer the status quo, they realize the proposed change is being generated by external forces. They concur that an annual single audit of the entire state is the best avenue for the state to pursue.

They understand that the intent of the new language in Section 1(b) beginning at line 35 is to insure that an audit presence in each state agency is maintained and that these engagements can be performed by all Kansas CPA firms.

They also understand individual audits will still be necessary for K.P.E.R.S., the Department of Transportation and the Kansas Lottery.

Mr. Chairman, the profession appreciates the efforts of the Post Auditor and his staff to keep it informed of the issues involved relating to SB 661 and for discussing various alternatives available for legislative consideration.
