The meeting was called to order by Chairman Don Crumbaker.

The chairman opened hearings on  $\underline{\scriptsize HB}$  2540, an act concerning school districts, relating to interlocal duties.

Mr. Ted Vannocker testified in support of  $\underline{\text{HB }2540}$ . Mr. Vannocker said the enactment of  $\underline{\text{HB }2540}$  would provide a vehicle to govern the cooperative effort already established between the USD's and the teacher education program of Emporia State University and allow this effort to move forward.

Dr. Harold Hosey seconded the testimony given by Mr. Vannocker in support of  $\underline{\text{HB 2540}}$ . Dr. Hosey said there are presently 21 schools wanting to work together and he believes continuing the effort of cooperation will deliver a better education program for the children of the State of Kansas.

Mr. Jack Skillet spoke in support of  $\underline{\text{HB }2524}$ . Mr. Skillet said there is a need for a governance body separate from the university to be the vehicle for carrying out the cooperative effort between the USD's and the teacher training program of the university. Mr. Skillet feels it's imperative for a teachers college to be intricately involved with public schools.

Mr. John Koepke raised some concerns about  $\underline{HB}$  2540 in its present form and suggested an interim study to look at some areas of the bill relating to the governance body.

Chairman Crumbaker said he was planning to ask for an interim study concerning interlocal controls and closed the hearings on  $\underline{\mathtt{HB}}$  2540.

The chair opened hearings on  $\underline{SB}$  64, concerning homeless children, residence for school attendance.

Ben Barrett gave a review of  $\underline{SB}$  64. Mr. Barrett said  $\underline{SB}$  64 was introduced to insure compliance with federal law, i.e. the Stewart B. McKinney Act. Mr. Barrett said pressure is being put on states to provide education for homeless children.

Mr. Craig Grant spoke in support of <u>SB 64</u>. Mr. Grant said it is the philosophy of public education to utilize the talents and resources of all children. (Attachment 1).

Ms. Pat Baker testified in support of  $\underline{SB}$  64. Ms. Baker said the enactment of  $\underline{SB}$  64 will ensure Kansas' compliance with Federal law for the receipt of Federal funds. (Attachment 2).

 $\underline{\text{Ms.}}$  Kathleen White testified in support of  $\underline{\text{SB 64.}}$  Ms. White pointed out the bill is needed to update the residency law to comply with the Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act. (Attachment 3).

Hearings on SB 64 were declared closed by the chairman.

The chairman opened hearings on  $\underline{SB}$  99, concerning professional negotiation, statutory declaration of impasse date.

Ben Barrett gave a briefing of <u>SB 99</u>. Mr. Barrett explained the changed impasse date to be June 1 or 10 days after sine die adjournment of the legislature, whichever is the later date. Mr. Barrett said the change was prompted by concerns having to do with delays in reapppraisal information.

Mr. Norman Wilks testified in support of <u>SB 99</u>. Mr. Wilks spoke in favor of the changes to extend the statutory impasse date, if required. (Attachment 4).

Mr. Craig Grant testified in favor of <u>SB 99</u>. Mr. Grant suggested June 19 as a possibility for a deadline date.

Mr. Gerald Henderson spoke in favor of  $\underline{SB}$  99. Mr. Henderson said since there are so many unknowns it seems reasonable to delay statutory declaration of impasse until school districts and employee bargaining units have had reasonable time to react to school finance decisions. (Attachment 5).

Chairman Crumbaker closed hearings on SB 99.

The chairman opened hearings on  $\underline{SB}$  113, concerning school districts, procedure for disposition of unneeded property.

Mr. Ben Barrett explained  $\underline{SB\ 113}$  as allowing boards of education to dispose of property by a majority vote of the members of the board instead of a unanimous vote as the law now reads.

Mr. John Koepke spoke in support of  $\underline{SB}$  113. Mr. Koepke said legal questions could arise as to what constitutes a "unanimous" vote. Mr. Koepke favors changing "unanimous" to "majority". (Attachment 6).

Mr. Gerald Henderson spoke in support of  $\underline{SB\ 113}$ . Mr. Henderson feels the rule of four ought to apply to most issues addressed by a board of education. (Attachment 7).

Ms. Kathryn Dysart testified in favor of  $\underline{SB}$  113. Ms. Dysart said USD #259 would benefit by the enactment of this bill.

Mr. Joe Zina favors  $\underline{SB}$  113. Mr. Zina pointed out under the provisions of this bill the public could show its disapproval before buildings could be sold.

The chair closed the hearings on  $\underline{\mathtt{SB}}$  113.

Chairman Crumbaker announced hearings on  $\underline{SB}$  13 are set for tomorrow's meeting. The chairman reminded the committee that  $\underline{HB}$  2349 contains portions that might be incorporated into  $\underline{SB}$  13 and asked them to be ready to consider such action. The chairman also announced testimony will be given from organizational groups regarding school finance on Wednesday and Thursday.

The meeting was adjourned by the chair at 4:22 p.m.

The next meeting will be March 14, 1989 in Room 519-S at 3:30 p.m.


Craig Grant Testimony Before The House Education Committee Monday, March 13, 1989

Mr. Chairman, members of the Committee, I appear before you in support of Senate Bill 64. It is unfortunate that we are here to discuss the residency of homeless children, but necessary to recognize the needs of this segment of our youthful population.

While we believe that the current law would probably be interpreted to require education of homeless children, the inclusion of the definition in our residency statute will clarify for school districts the obligation for providing educational services. The enactment of S.B. 64 will ensure Kansas' compliance with Federal law for the receipt of Federal funds.

My name is Kathleen White, State Board of Education Member from Shawnee Mission. It is a pleasure for me to appear before this Committee on behalf of the State Board.


The State Board of Education supports the amendment of K.S.A. 72-1046a to clarify that students who are living in the district, including homeless youth, have access to a free, appropriate public education. The new Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act (P.L. 100-77) requires that (1) each state educational agency shall assure that each child of a homeless individual and each homeless youth have access to a free, appropriate public education which would be provided to the children of a resident of a state and is consistent with the state school attendance laws; and (2) in any state that has a residency requirement as a component of its compulsory school attendance laws, the state will review and undertake steps to revise such laws to assure that children of homeless individuals and homeless youth are afforded a free, appropriate public education.

Senate Bill 64 is requested by the State Board of Education to update the residency law to comply with the Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act.

We recommend that Senate Bill 64 be reported favorably for passage.


Mister Chairman and Members of the Committee:

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee, on behalf of the 301 unified school district boards of education which are members of the Kansas Association of School Boards, we wish to express our appreciation to the Committee for hearing our request regarding S.B. 113. The change which we are proposing to the statutes regarding disposition of property would address a problem that has become a matter of increasing concern to our members.

The provision which was written into statute several years ago requiring a unanimous vote when disposing of property for less than 3/4 of its appraised value was a matter of concern at that time, since we have no legal history of what constitutes a unanimous vote of a board of education. This statute is the only one of its kind which requires more than a majority vote of the board to take an action. We believe that public pressure and the prospect of board elections constitute a sufficient safeguard against a capricious board action in matters of this kind.

We would appreciate your favorable consideration of the request of our members in this matter and I would be happy to answer any questions you may have about our proposal.
