Sully, Chairman (Attachment 5); Letter from City of Holyrood, Kansas by Vella Mae Jantz, City Clerk (Attachment 6); City of Lyons, KS. Resolution 248 with attached letter signed by Norma Miller, City Clerk, City of Lyons (Attachment 7).

Minutes from February 21, 1989 and corrected minutes from February 7, 1989 were also handed out. The February 7 correction is the addition of Attachment 7 to show distribution of the Guidelines and Criteria for the committee. Representative Adam has some changes for the minutes of January 24, 25, 26, 30, and February 7, 1989. She will present them in tomorrow's meeting. Approval of minutes delayed until tomorrow.

Chairman Snowbarger announced that today's meeting was called because time is short, staff is "going crazy" and there is an awful lot of work left to be done in the sub-committees. Research, Revisors and Legislative Counsel can't do their job without input from the sub-committees. Legislative Counsel must have reports from the sub-committee chairmen similar to the 1979 report which explains reasons for district lines.

Chairman Snowbarger called for reports from the sub-committees. Representative Shore reported on the Southwest-West area, comprising approximately the western one-third of the state from Hays, south through Pratt and the Kingman area. The map is completed with the exception of two districts in Garden City where it is just a matter of making the numbers match. There was no dissenting minority report.

Representative Roe reported on the Central area. Details for north of Hutchison and East of Great Bend still need work. This area will have two districts less than under existing law. Problems are mainly the shortage of people and the medium size cities and rural areas. They are trying to keep the communities of interest, and to preserve as many county subdivisions, and political lines as possible. Representative Whiteman reported expectation of another map by late Friday of this week. Chairman requested map by Thursday. Mr. Ensley reminded members they are dealing with over 3,000 parcels of election tracts. To check something like this will certainly take longer than a week-end. The loss of one tract brought down the entire plan last time around. Mary Galligan advised that Research has proposals from Representatives Shore, Roe, and Miller. They also have

proposals for Wyandotte, Johnson, and Sedgwick counties. Shawnee County is included in Representative Miller's proposal. They have some materials that are still in the formative stage in the computer from Representative Freeman's southeast Kansas area. Research is generating the reports on which the Revisors are basing the bill draft. This two-step process is delayed even further when data is not provided to Research. From this point forward Research will be amending what they now have.

Representative Williams reported on Sedgwick County. They have reached tentative agreement on two alternative plans. Both he and Representative Grotewiel feel these plans meet the Guidelines and Criteria for redistricting. Another plan has been submitted to them for consideration. Rep. Grotewiel stated that essentially they have been in agreement for about a month. Finalization depends on what happens around them. Both plans go outside of Sedgwick, but in a limited manner.

Representative Freeman stated they are still waiting for a Southeast map proposal from Representative Whiteman. She reported she is awaiting a checkoff of numbers and is working with Research. Representative King reminded members of the problem with Andover and the need to coordinate figures.

Chairman Snowbarger expects finalized map on Johnson County by tomorrow. Representative Reardon anticipates getting a map to Research and will have something to present tomorrow on Wyandotte County.

Representative Miller's Northeast sub-committee has had an extremely difficult time because so many other areas impact on this one. They have drawn maps, made proposals, and had counter-proposals. Representative Bunten has put together a Shawnee County map. What happens in Shawnee County affects the rest of the Northeast area. Everyone is working on maps. They expect to have something by tomorrow.

Staff again urged prompt submission of data. Chairman Snowbarger outlined the new schedule. Now the plan is to meet again on adjournment tomorrow and bring out available maps. Sub-committees should meet and have maps by tomorrow morning. Public hearings will be scheduled for Friday. We may have public hearings on Saturday, if we are scheduled to work. Final action must be taken on the bill as soon as possible next week; hopefully, on first adjournment Monday. If not then, on second adjournment Monday. Public hearings will not be held tomorrow. The committee will look at Representative Adam's proposed changes in the minutes tomorrow and consider sub-committee reports and maps.

Meeting adjourned at 1:15.

However, we will continue to research, monitor and disseminate information to those persons affected by the inaccuracies of the State Census. Wyandotte County, a densely populated area for ethnics and minorities appears to have little participation in the pre-planning, advisory or follow-up of the census.
