Sen. Petty said this bill would better assure the safety of private citizens using taxi transportation. The bill had been prompted by several accidents which were alcohol related, involving taxi drivers. A copy of her statement is attached. (Attachment 1).

Cathy Holdeman, City of Wichita, said there were two taxi companies in Wichita and they were concerned and did not want local authority to be taken away.

Mark Wettig, Department of Revenue, said there were approximately 500 cab drivers in the state and it would cost approximately \$36 per year per license for this bill. It would be necessary to check on all convictions and other requirements.

The committee decided to hold this bill.

Hearing on S.B. 274 - Motor vehicles, filing of accident reports.

Terry Heidner, KDOT, said KDOT and the Department of Revenue have been cooperating for over a year in an effort to modernize and improve the state's capabilities in the area of motor vehicle accident data collection, analysis and reporting. This bill would change the responsibility for the printing, dissemination and collection of the state's accident form from the Division of Vehicles to KDOT. This method should be more efficient. A copy of his statement is attached. (Attachment 2). He also had some amendments which were submitted. (Attachment 3).

A motion was made by Sen. Rock to adopt the proposed amendments to S.B. 274. Motion was seconded by Sen. Hayden. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Sen. Rock to recommend S.B. 274 as amended favorably for passage. Motion carried.

Action on S.B. 105 - Citizens'Utility Ratepayer Board (CURB)

Sen. Kerr said he had some amendments to this bill. Without amendments, he felt this bill would encourage the Board to undertake items above and beyond what the Board is doing now. This could encourage additional layers

of bureaucracy. He also felt there should be a sunset amendment in two years so the Board would have to be re-evaluated.

A motion was made by Sen. Kerr to amend S.B. 105 by striking lines 46, 47, 53 and 58. The motion was seconded by Sen. Sallee. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Sen. Kerr to amend S.B. 105 to sunset in two years on July 1, 1991. Motion was seconded by Sen. Hayden.

A substitute motion was made by Sen. Martin to amend S.B. 105 by having it sunset in one year. Motion was seconded by Sen. Francisco. Motion failed.

A substitute motion was made by Sen. Hayden to recommend the Chairman should write a letter to the Legislative Coordinating Council requesting an interim study on this subject. Motion was seconded by Sen. Doyen. Motion did not pass.

The committee reverted back to the original motion on the two-year sunset provision. Motion carried.

The committee discussed the amendments which had been made previously to S.B. 123 which would allow the consumer counsel to appeal orders of KCC through the courts. A motion was made by Sen. Martin to amend this same amendment into S.B. 105. Motion was seconded by Sen. Francisco. Motion carried.

The Revisor had two technical amendments to the bill. A motion was made by Sen. Martin and was seconded by Sen. Francisco to amend S.B. 105 with the two technical changes. Motion carried.

There was committee discussion on what the effect would be in deleting line 53. This would prevent them from going before the KCC.

A motion was made by Sen. Martin to recommend S.B. 105 as amended favorably for passage. Motion was seconded by Sen. Rock.

A substitute motion was made by Sen. Francisco to reinsert line 53. Motion was seconded by Sen. Rock. A division was called for and the motion failed.

The committee reverted back to the original motion to pass S.B. 105 as amended. Motion carried.

Action on S.B. 123 - Citizen's Utility Ratepayer Board (CURB)

Sen. Kerr said that since this committee had just recommended S.B. 105 as amended favorable for passage he would make a motion to recommend S.B. 123 which is a similar bill, adversely. Motion was seconded by Sen. Hayden. Motion carried.

Meeting was adjourned at 10:00 a.m.

#### SENATE CHAMBER

This bill is a public transportation bill which would better assure the safety of private citizens using taxi transportation. The impetus for this bill was several accidents which were alcohol related, involving taxi drivers. The bill merely established a base line for taxicab drivers in terms of their driving record and the level of safety the public can expect.

The intent of the bill is to establish statewide endorsement on the drivers license of those people who are employed as taxi drivers. The endorsement is dependent on their being 18 years of age, having no license revocations in the preceding 5 years, having never had a felony conviction, and as listed under K.S.A. 8-23, not suffering from a mental disease from which they have not been restored to capacity or being a "habitual drunkard, habitual user of narcotic drugs... which renders the user incapable of safely driving a motor vehicle."

In gathering the support data for this testimony, I talked with Lieutenant Ed Klumpp with the Topeka Police Department, who has related that he could furnish me with additional examples of incidences when cab drivers have been found in their cabs intoxicated. He related that while it was not a monthly occurrence that there are three or so taxicab accidents each year involving alcohol.

The intent is to make this uniform law statewide so that any of us traveling within the state or those who arrive in the state and use taxi transportation to move within a city can have some assurance that they will be transported safely. Cities would not be precluded from requiring proof of insurance from taxicab companies or a higher level of licensing for the driver.

The \$3.00 fee for the taxi endorsement would cover the cost of administrating the program.

I would like to suggest a conceptual amendment. After Section 1 b (4) there should be (5) having been convicted of more than one DUI within the previous year.

Chairman and members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 274. My name is Terry Heidner and I am Chief of Transportation Planning for the Kansas Department of Transportation.

KDOT initiated and supports the provisions of Senate Bill 274. KDOT and the Department of Revenue, Division of Vehicles have been cooperating for over a year in an effort to modernize and improve the state's capabilities in the area of motor vehicle accident data collection, analysis and reporting. There are several measures ongoing or in the planning stage to accomplish this improvement. One of those measures requires a change in statutes.

Senate Bill 274 proposes to change the responsibility for the printing, dissemination and collection of the state's motor vehicle accident form from the Division of Vehicles to the Kansas Department of Transportation. believe this change will create some real efficiencies for the State of Kansas in the reduction of paper handling, elimination of redundant data entry operations and improvements in data timeliness.

There are some amendments since the bill was first drafted. I believe you have those in front of you. These amendments were suggested by the Division of Vehicles and KDOT is in agreement with them.

Mr. Chairman, that concludes my comments.

## SENATE BILL No. 274

AN ACT relating to motor vehicles; concerning accident reports; amending K.S.A. 8-1612 and K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 8-1611 and repealing the existing sections.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1 K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 8-1611 is hereby amended to read as follows: 8-1611. (a) Every law enforcement officer who:

(1) who Investigates a vehicle accident of which a report must be made as required in this article,; or

or thereafter by interviewing the participants or witnesses, when thereto. such accident under subparts paragraphs (1) or (2) results in injury or death to any person or total damage to all property to an apparent extent of \$500 or more, shall forward a written report of such accident to the division department of transportation within 10 days after investigation of the accident.

(b) Such written reports required to be forwarded by law enforcement officers and the information contained therein shall not be privileged or held confidential.

(c) The provisions of this section shall be deemed to be satisfied by the submission of consolidated magnetic tape reports prepared by computer and containing the information required to be included in written reports. The format of such magnetic tape reports and the frequency of submission must be acceptable to the division and the secretary of transportation.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 8-1612 is hereby amended to read as follows: 8-1612. (a) The division department of transportation shall prepare and upon request supply to police departments, sheriffs, and other

Sec. 3 K.S.A. 8-1612 and K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 8-1611 are hereby

repealed.

See. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after January 1, 1990, and its publication in the statute book.

(c) The department of transportation shall provide the division of vehicles with the necessary accident reports and accident data to satisfy the division's requirements as in K.S.A. 8-249, 40-3104 and 40-3118, and amendments thereto.
