Senator Allen reviewed the FY 1989 and FY 1990 subcommittee reports regarding Kansas Technology Enterprise Corporation and Kansas, Inc. Senator Bogina reviewed the FY 1989 and FY 1990 subcommittee reports regarding the Department of Revenue. 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Background Information on Water Structures Fee Fund

The word "dam" brings to mind one of the 24 large and impressive dams in Kansas that are federally funded and operated. This is misleading, because Kansas has the second largest number of non-federally owned dams in the nation, according to a recent survey by the State Association of State Dam Safety Officials.

Beginning in 1972, an inventory of non-federal dams in Kansas was undertaken by staff of the Division of Water Resources. This inventory, completed in 1980, identified 5,030 dams with a storage capacity of more than 30 acre feet as measured at the low point in the top of the dam. This size was chosen because Kansas Statute K.S.A. 82a-301 to 305a, exempts smaller dams from permitting. Estimates indicates more than 100,000 "farm ponds" in the state fall in this exempt category.

Division criteria requires that a permit be obtained from the Chief Engineer whenever a structure will have a storage capacity of more than 30 acrefeet. As a result, more than 10,000 dams have been permitted by the Division since 1929, under the authority of the Stream Obstruction Act, K.S.A. 82a-301 to 305a. Not all of the structures applied for have been built. The following table gives a brief summary of the relative age of these structures.

Almost 45% of the dams were built prior to and during the 1950's and are nearly 40 years of age. The attached bar graph also illustrates the distribution by decade.

Currently, no fee is attached to the filing of an application for a water structure, whether it be for a dam, levee, channel change, etc. The entire cost of the program is borne by the State General Fund. The Water Structures Fee Fund would impose a reasonable fee, based upon the size of the structure, to help support field inspection and enforcement of the current statutes for protection of downstream residents and the general public.
