### SCR 1615 - Revoking a 1978 SCR requesting a United States Constitutional Convention

Senator Harder moved, Senator Salisbury seconded, to report SCR 1615 as not adopted. The motion carried on a roll call vote.

#### SB 180 - Use of restrictive drug formularies by state agencies prohibited

Senator Gaines moved, Senator Hayden seconded, to report SB 180 favorably for passage. The motion carried on a roll call vote.

# SB 323 - Transfers of money from state gaming revenues fund to county reappraisal fund for costs incurred by counties in maintaining property valuations

Information was distributed concerning the Economic Development Initiative Fund, FY 1990 Demand and the State Gaming Revenues Fund Distribution. (Attachments 1, 2 and 3)

Concern was expressed regarding the underfunding of the state's economic development effort as well as the frustration of not knowing the amount necessary at this point for ongoing reappraisal costs. It was suggested that rather than dedicated funds which does not provide controls, a transfer should be made from the State General Fund.

Senator Hayden moved, Senator Allen seconded, to report SB 323 favorably for passage. Following discussion, the motion failed on a roll call vote.

#### SB 207 - Economic impact study for state capital improvement programs

Senator Feleciano moved, Senator Doyen seconded, to amend SB 207 to exempt the SRS campuses. The motion carried. Senator Felecian moved, Senator Doyen seconded, the report SB 207 favorably as amended. The motion carried on a roll call vote.

## SB 349 - State agencies authorized to enter into contracts with individuals attending schools of nursing

Following discussion, no action was taken on this bill.

A motion was offered by Senator Winter and seconded by Senator Gaines to strike Douglas County from the bill and add language indicating relocation of the Hall of Fame could be relocated only upon approval of the Legislature. The motion carried.

Senator Gaines moved, Senator Winter seconded, to report HB 2493, as amended, favorably for passage.

### HB 2513 - State construction projects, architectural services, claims procedures, defects recovery fund expenditures

<u>Senator Doyen moved, Senator Hayden seconded, to delete Section 2 from HB 2513. The motion carried.</u>

During discussion, it was suggesed that arbitration be allowed and then any further action go to the Special Committee on Claims Against the State. It was further suggested to make sure the state does not waive its immunity to court. Concern was expressed regarding claims against 3rd parties. It was a consensus to delay further action on  $\underline{HB\ 2513}$ .

<u>Public Transportation</u>. This includes administration of the funds apportioned and allocated to the Kansas Department of Transportation through the Urban Mass Transportation Act (UMTA) of 1964, as amended. Each section of the UMTA stipulates specific objectives; all are generally directed toward capital, administrative and operating assistance to local entities for transportation of the elderly, handicapped, and general public. The principal sources of funding are through Sections 8, 9, 16(b)(2) and 18 of the Act. A summary of FY 1989 and FY 1990 funding is:

Section 8 funds were established in the Urban Mass Transportation Act for the planning, engineering, designing and evaluation of urban mass transportation projects and for other technical studies involving coordinated public transportation in urban areas. These are discretionary funds distributed by the Urban Mass Transportation Administration primarily on the basis of population. Additional expenditures of Section 8 funds are shown in the Local Aid Program Plan.

Section 8 provides federal transit planning funds that are utilized by KDOT for statewide public transportation planning. Wichita, Kansas City, Topeka, and Lawrence each apply directly to the Urban Mass Transportation for these planning funds.

Section 9, which was created by the Surface Transportation Assistance Act of 1982 to replace Section 5, began as a modified program in FFY 1983. It is also a formula block grant program for urbanized areas and provides funding assistance to public transit operators. The initial program in FFY 1983 provided only for planning and capital assistance, but operating assistance was also provided beginning in FFY 1984. Since neither Lawrence nor Elwood currently has a public transit operator, these previous years' funds have not been utilized for capital or operating assistance. Since these funds may also be used for planning, both the Lawrence metropolitan planning organization and KDOT could use some of these funds for planning. The Surface Transportation Assistance Act of 1982 also provided that Section 9 funds could be transferred to other Section 9 programs or to Section 18. Approval of a transfer of \$450,000 from Section 9 to Section 18 has been given.

Section 16(b)(2) provides capital assistance to private nonprofit organizations that provide transportation to the elderly and handicapped. The program involves numerous small operators who are typically the social service agencies of the community and who are only providing transportation as a means of access to their principal programs. A portion of Section 16(b)(2) funds are used for planning and administration in the Planning and Development Program. A portion (up to 10 percent)

of these funds may be used for administration of the program. The 80 percent federal share is used to reimburse the Highway Fund for salaries and other operating expenses.

Section 18 funds provide capital (Not to exceed 80-20 match) and operating (Not to exceed 50-50 match) assistance for public transportation in areas under 50,000 population. A more complete explanation of the Section 18 program can be found in the Local Aid program. Up to 15 percent of the state's annual apportionments can be used for planning and administration. Eligible expenses are reimbursed 100 percent.

Section 18 provides capital, administrative and operating assistance for public transportation in areas under 50,000 population. Eligible applicants include local units of government and private nonprofit organizations willing and able to make their transportation services available to the general public. Section 18 funds reimburse the Highway Fund for state operation expenditures in the Planning and Development Program for administration and planning associated with the program.
