Re: Subcommittee Recommendations

In the course of there meetings, we reviewed 1988 H.C.R. 5033, which endorsed the recommendations of Kansas, Inc. with respect to EDIF expenditures, received programmatic information from Secretary Bob Meinen (Wildlife and Parks), Charles Warren (Kansas, Inc.) and Kevin Carr (KTEC), and examined agencies' requests and the Governor's recommendation for FY 1990 and FY 1991 EDIF expenditures. Based upon our review and deliberations, we make the following recommendations:

- 1. The House Committee on Economic Development should introduce a concurrent resolution reconfirming legislative support of the three guidelines set forth in H.C.R. 5033 which are supposed to govern EDIF expenditures. In addition, the six pillars of the state's economic development strategy should be listed and all references to recommendations made by Kansas, Inc. should be deleted and adopted as the Legislature's own recommendations. We further propose a few modifications which would make the proposed resolution more concise. (A copy of H.C.R. 5033 is attached to this report.)
- 2. We propose EDIF reductions totaling \$12,416,000 from the Governor's recommendation for FY 1990 and FY 1991. Reductions would be taken from the commercial circuit breaker (\$1,611,000 -- FY 1990), the homestead circuit breaker (\$9,555,000 -- FY 1991) and the Recreational Access program (\$1,250,000 -- FY 1991). While each of these programs may have merit, we believe that the EDIF is not a proper funding source for them.
- 3. With the projected savings of \$12,416,000, we recommend that a portion of those funds (\$5,778,159) be used to restore certain budget reductions or make certain additions to EDIF expenditures recommended by the Governor and that the remaining amount (\$6,637,841) be carried forward into FY 1992. The attached tables illustrate more clearly the recommendations listed below, as well as the resource estimate which would be realized from our recommendations, if they are adopted. As our recommendations will reflect, approximately 82 percent of the

House Eco. Devo, Commettee attachment 1 2/15/90 proposed addition of funds for all agencies for both FY 1990 and FY 1991, or a total of \$4,742,159, has been applied to KTEC's budget because it is our position that the Governor's recommendation, if left intact, would seriously undermine the operations and programs of that agency.

### FY 1990

We recommend that a total of \$1,542,159 from the EDIF be added to the Governor's recommendation for KTEC in the following areas:

- 1. \$76,159 for grant administration
- 2. \$1,166,000 for research matching grants
- 3. \$300,000 for the Industrial Liaison program

Given that \$1,611,000 would be reduced from FY 1990 EDIF expenditures if the commercial circuit breaker were not funded from that funding source, \$68,841 could be carried forward into FY 1991.

#### FY 1991

Once again, we recommend that KTEC be the chief beneficiary of any additions made from the EDIF to the Governor's recommendation. Such additions would total \$4,236,000 for all state agencies listed below but savings realized from EDIF funding deleted for the homestead circuit breaker and the Recreational Access program would exceed those additions by \$6,569,000 and could be carried forward into FY 1992:

### **KTEC**

We recommend that a total of \$3.2 million from the EDIF be added to the Governor's recommendation in the following areas:

- 1. \$1,000,000 for the Centers of Excellence
- 2. \$1,000,000 for research matching grants
- 3. \$400,000 for research equipment grants
- 4. \$300,000 for the Industrial Liaison program
- 5. \$300,000 for special projects
- 6. \$200,000 for the Value Added Center

#### Department of Commerce

We recommend that a total of \$575,000 from the EDIF be added to the Governor's recommendation in the following areas:

- 1. \$75,000 for Small Business Development Centers
- 2. \$500,000 for the Kansas Industrial Training and Retraining programs

## Historical Society

We recommend that \$65,000 from the EDIF be expended for continuation of the Kansas Committee for the Humanities for the Roots and Realities program. The 1989 Legislature provided the same funding level for that purpose in FY 1990.

#### Kansas Arts Commission

We recommend that a total of \$296,000 from the EDIF be added to the Governor's recommendation in the following areas:

- 1. \$20,000 for operations
- 2. \$276,000 for art programming grants

## Wichita State University

We recommend that \$100,000 from the EDIF be expended, as requested, for the Rehabilitation Engineering Center. This would be the same funding level authorized for the Center in FY 1990.

Finally, we realize that the appropriations of most state agencies to be affected by our recommendations are included in senate bills. Therefore, some of these recommendations may be less relevant after the Senate has taken action on those bills. Nonetheless, we believe that the House Appropriations Committee might view our recommendations, should the House Committee on Economic Development endorse them, as a reflection of our funding priorities.

#### CHAPTER 404

House Concurrent Resolution No. 5033

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION endorsing the recommendations of Kansas, Inc. with respect to expenditures from the state economic development initiatives fund and urging Legislatures convened in sessions subsequent to the 1988 session to give careful consideration to such recommendations.

WHEREAS, The state gaming revenues fund was created in the state treasury by act of the 1986 session of the Legislature; and

WHEREAS, A statutorily prescribed percentage of the receipts to the state gaming revenues fund is to be transferred to the state economic development initiatives fund; and

WHEREAS, In the past, Kansas has lacked the resources to compete equally with other states in encouraging the birth, expansion, retention, and recruitment of industries which enhance economic development; but the state economic development initiatives fund offers a unique opportunity to materially improve the state's competitive position with respect to industrial and economic growth; and

WHEREAS, In May of 1987, the Governor requested Kansas, Inc. to recommend priorities for the use of gaming revenues for economic development initiatives; and

WHEREAS, The Governor's request was consistent with the legislative mandate to Kansas, Inc. to oversee the formulation of economic development policy and short- and long-range strategic planning for the state in order to enhance the state's economic advantage; and

WHEREAS, In compliance with its legislative mandate and in response to the Governor's request, Kansas, Inc. developed and submitted to the Legislature and the Governor recommendations to insure that gaming revenues allocated to the state economic development initiatives fund are expended for economic development investment programs; and

WHEREAS, The recommendations of Kansas, Inc. are that: (1) Expenditures from the state economic development initiatives fund should not be used for salaries of permanent personnel; (2) the state economic development initiatives fund should not replace the state general fund as a source of financing established economic development programs since the purpose of the economic development initiatives fund is to provide financing for economic development "initiatives" and to enhance economic development in the state; and (3) expenditures from the state economic development initiatives fund should be applied only to those programs and policies which clearly identify with a pillar of the economic development strategy of the state: Now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Kansas, the Senate concurring therein: That the Legislature, in 1988 session convened, hereby strongly endorses the recommendations made by Kansas, Inc. with respect to expenditures from the state economic development initiatives fund and hereby urges Legislatures convened in all sessions subsequent to the 1988 session to give careful consideration to this resolution and to the recommendations of Kansas, Inc. when deliberating upon matters relating to expenditures from the state economic development initiatives fund; and

Be it further resolved: That the secretary of state is hereby directed to transmit enrolled copies of this resolution to the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate at the commencement of every regular session of the Legislature so long as the state economic development initiatives fund remains extant in the state treasury.
