The meeting was called to order by Chairman Crumbaker.

The chairman opened hearings on $\underline{{\tt HB}}$ 2640 concerning community colleges, determination of general state aid entitlements.

Mr. Bill Musick testified in favor of $\underline{\text{HB}}$ 2640. Mr. Musick said $\underline{\text{HB}}$ 2640 updates the definition of assessed valuation to bring statutes into compliance with the implementation of classification/reappraisal. (Attachment 1)

Chairman Crumbaker called on Avis Swartzman to explain an amendment that needed to be made to $\underline{\scriptsize{\mbox{HB}}\mbox{ 2640}}$.

Ms. Swartzman said in order to make the statutes compatible 71-603 needs to be amended into and added to $\underline{HB\ 2640}$. (Attachment 2)

Representative Harder moved to amend HB 2640 by inserting 71-603 into the bill. Seconded by Representative Amos. Motion carried.

Dr. Hill asked the committee to pass HB 2640 as amended.

The chairman closed the hearings on HB 2640.

Hearings on $\underline{\mbox{HB }2746}$ concerning community colleges and determination of credit hours for out-district tuition and state aid were opened by the chairman.

Representative Graeber explained the bill saying it simply changes the way outdistrict tuition billing is done to the various counties and instead of being billed at the time of registration it would be done after the student had completed 9 weeks and one day during a regular semester.

Dr. Hill responded to questions asked by Representative Blumenthal and Representative Bowden at last week's meeting regarding dual enrollments and community college mill levies. (Attachment 3)

Dr. Hill testified against $\underline{\text{HB }2746}$. Dr. Hill said passage of this bill would make community colleges the only higher education entity with a determination date other than the 20th day. Dr. Hill pointed out costs of instruction continue throughout a semester even though several students drop out. (Attachment 4)

My name is Bill Musick, Legislative Chairman of the State Board of Education. I appreciate the opportunity to appear before this Committee on behalf of the State Board.

House Bill 2640 updates the definition of assessed valuation to bring statutes into compliance with the implementation of classification/reappraisal. Current law distributes general state aid based upon adjusted valuation per pupil. House Bill 2640 would use assessed valuation per pupil.

The appropriation for community college general state aid is \$400,000. This bill cleans up statutes and would have very little effect on the distribution of state aid.

The State Board of Education recommends that House Bill 2640 be recommended favorably for passage.

"AN ACT concerning community colleges; relating to the determination of general state aid entitlements; amending K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 71-619 and repealing the existing section."

Be amended:

On page 1, following the enacting clause by inserting a new section as follows:

"Section 1. K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 71-603 is hereby amended to read as follows: 71-603. (a) On or before November 1 and on or before March 1 of each year, the chief administrative officer of each community college shall certify under oath to the state board the total number of duly enrolled credit hours of students of the community college during the current school session who meet the state residence requirement or who are considered bona fide residents of the state. Each November 1 and March 1, certification for payment shall set forth separately the credit hour enrollment for preceding sessions and for the current fall session. The state board may require the community college to furnish any additional information deemed necessary by it to carry out the provisions of this act, and shall prescribe such forms and policies as may be necessary for making such reports.

(b) In November of each year, the county clerk of each county shall certify to the state board with respect to each community college district in the county, the current assessed valuations valuation of:-(1)-Urban-real-estate;--(2)--rural--real estate;--(3)--state-assessed--property;--and-(4) taxable tangible personal property within each such district."

- (1) <u>Dual Enrollments at The University of Kansas and Johnson County Community College</u>: Yesterday, Representative Blumenthal asked about students enrolled at both The University of Kansas and at Johnson County Community College, and I made the mistake of quoting a number without checking my notes from an October meeting of the Legislative Educational Planning Committee. Here's what my notes tell me:
- o When asked by LEPC Chairman Vancrum about the alleged 800 Douglas County residents attending Johnson County Community College, Dr. Del Brinkman, Vice-chancellor for Academic Affairs, responded that, at most, only 400 Douglas County residents were attending Johnson County Community College. Of the 315 Douglas County residents enrolled in the semester on which he was reporting, only five of them were KU students and were also enrolled at Johnson County Community College. He reported that this was a normal kind of pattern.
- Dr. Linda Dayton, Dean of Student Affairs at Johnson County Community College, agreed with the 400-figure mentioned by Dr. Brinkman. She indicated that the Douglas County headcount figure per semester was about 400 enrollees, with another 200 for the summer.

Mr. Chairman, members of the Committee, I am Merle Hill, executive director of the Kansas Association of Community Colleges. Thank you very much for giving me the opportunity to share with you the thinking of our members regarding House Bill No. 2746.

House Bill No. 2746, if passed, would change the date of determination of a duly enrolled student, for reimbursement purposes, from the 20th day of enrollment to one day past the ninth week of enrollment. The community colleges would be the only higher education entity with a determination date other than the 20th day.

Community colleges, like other educational entities, have certain fixed costs associated with offering courses of instruction. The teacher's salary is probably the greatest fixed cost, followed by the cost of facilities (heat, light, and in some cases, rent), costs associated with the enrollment procedure, advising, keeping records, counseling, etc. These costs continue throughout a semester even if several students drop out of a class or stop coming to it.

Perhaps we can compare these fixed costs to the fixed costs of operating a restau-If someone orders a meal for \$10 and decides to eat only one-fourth of rant. it, the \$10 price is still charged because the costs associated with purchasing food, preparing it and serving it, rent, heat, light, water, etc., remain the same whether the meal is completely consumed or not.

A restaurateur assumes that each customer is going to eat and pay for the meal ordered, and college officials assume that an enrollee is going to complete and pay for, or have paid for him/her, a class in which he/she enrolls.

Community college students, like college students everywhere, drop out of class or college for many reasons — a new job, a family move, a loss of employment, a marriage, a divorce, a pregnancy, lack of interest, etc. In 40 years of enrolling students in college—level courses, however, I have never met a single student who intended to drop out. Upon enrolling, all had the intention of completing what they started.

That was my intention when I enrolled for courses at college, although I did drop a few of them along the way. My guess is that most people who attend college do as I did and, for whatever reason, drop a course sometime in their college careers. Those who drop out of community college courses are no different from those who drop out of courses at a state university or a private college. Community colleges should not be penalized financially because their students are like students everywhere.

The members of the Kansas Association of Community Colleges do not believe House Bill No. 2746 is good educational policy and recommend that it be reported adversely.






COMPARISON OF WITHDRAWN STUDENTS TO TOTAL KCKCC STUDENTS 20th Day to 9 Weeks + 1 Day




TOTAL COLLEGE COMPARED WITH LEAVENWORTH COUNTY CREDIT HRS








PROPORTION OF LEAVENWORTH COUNTY CREDIT HOURS TO TOTAL KCKCC CREDIT HOURS

COMPARISON OF OFF-CAMPUS LEAVENWORTH COUNTY CREDIT HOURS TO KCKCC TOTAL




LVCO Off-Campus Total KCKCC



OFF-CAMPUS CREDIT HOURS




